In the evening there gathered over one hundred representative men and women of Kerrville, with several from Center Point and nearby country, at the St. Charles Hotel, where Mr. Bryan was introduced by Judge W. C. Baker and others to the visitors.

The large crowd then assembled in the dining room, where Judge Baker presided. He introduced Judge Lee Wallace, who made a short address of "Cheer'O Club." welcome to the distinguished guest and also told him about our own citizenship, as he pertinently remarked, that we know more about Mr. Bryan than he does about us, so thought it proper that the latter should be told something about ourselves, and Judge Wallace acquitted himself most cred-

Judge Baker then formally presented Mr. Bryan, who made an impromptu talk on varied subjects-in fact an epitome of the many things about which he has for many years expatiated at length, learnedly and entertainingly.

Without a verbatim report of Mr. Bryan's talk it is impossible to do him justice, and even that would not de it, because the personality of the brightened Monday afternoon.

Mr. Bryan told several humorous stories that aptly illustrated the points he desired to bring out, and his hearers. He felt kindly toward Texas, he said, because it had each time given him the largest majority for the Presidency of any State in the Union, and that if the people elsewhere had felt the same way and exercised as good judgment, he would have been elected several times to that high

Mr. Bryan feelingly referred to the absence of his wife, who was accompanying him, as the condition of her health prevented her being among them, and it made him all the more lonesome in such gatherings without her when other men were there with their wives, as she had been his constant companion through the many tant companion through the many

KIMBLE COUNTY HERO BURIED LAST SUNDAY BY COMRADES

of County Commis- Junction, Tex., May 9. of Burt M. Fleming, the last Kimble County soldier who sacrificed his life on the battlefields in France, October 13, 1918, was laid to rest in the Junc-Never before has Junction seen such a long funeral procession, consisting of 167 automobiles, and such beautiful and bountiful floral offerings, as was seen at the burial of this young

The body had arrived at Junction two weeks ago, but on account of the heavy rains and swollen streams the burial had to be postponed from day to day. The body was in charge of the American Legion, Post Burt M. Fleming No. 237, named after the gallant soldier, and was placed in the court house, where constant watch was kept by the Post, and from there taken to the cemetery under auspices of the American Legion, who marched in form 60 strong under Commander Louis F. Boyle, and performed the last rites for their fellow soldier.

Elder J. S. Durst made some brief remarks at the grave, and several scngs were sung by the Junction male quartet.

Burt M. Fleming was one of Kimble County's first volunteers, in fact, he volunteered in place of one of his friends who could not get ready in time. He was a bright young man

Many poultry raisers gradually begin to slight the importance of grit. Lack of grit means poor digestion and impaired health. Regular poultry grit should be kept before the fowls in boxes or hoppers at all times. In addition, a load of gravel near the chickens' home would



CRATES FOR PRIZE WINNERS

Proper Care is of Big Importance in Arranging and Handling Exibition Coops.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Not infrequently improperly built and unsuitable coops have resulted in accidents and damage to the fowl in transit, or have presented the birds in such objectionable surroundings that they have been neither pleasing to the general spectator nor to the judge.

Where fowls are shipped by express, in order to have them reach their destination in the best possible condition, they should be transported in special shipping coops, which should be substantially built and able to withstand rough handling. Such a coop may be made from waste lumber salvaged from dry-goods boxes or second-hand halfinch material. Boards more than onehalf inch thick should not be used, as they make the coop too heavy and the express charges excessive. The coop should be nailed together with the supports of the slats or cover on the top, which should be put on with screws or hinges and hooks, so that it may be easily opened. This is important, as the top or cover must be opened each time the coop is used, and if put on with nails it is soon broken and the coop spoiled.

There are standard sizes of coops which commonly are used for shipping poultry, the dimensions of these containers varying according to the number of fowl to be transported. The following dimensions should be used in constructing the coop: For one hen or cock, 12 inches wide, 18 inches long, and 24 inches high; for two hens or one hen and cock, 12 inches wide, 24 inches long, and 24 inches high. In preparing for shipment, a small quantity of hay, straw, or dry shavings should be placed in the bottom of the coop to absorb moisture, and two cups or cans should be provided-one for feed and one for water. The cups should be fastened securely to the side walls in opposite corners.

Special exhibition coops should be used by poultry-club members in exhibiting fowls at county and school fairs or other exhibitions, or by adult showmen in displaying their champion poultry. Such coops should not be used for shipping poultry, but may be

Furthermore, when birds are shown in coops of this kind that are uniform in size and type, not only is the appearance of the showroom improved, but the individual exhibit is more attractive. NOT ENTIRE SUCCESS

Chicago, May 3.-Wide ranges in prices received for wool placed in pools last year are shown in the report of the American Farm Bureau Federation on the results of the pools. Producers in some States which received a lower price than the average for the country have expressed disappointment over the outcome.

Figures for 22 pools in all parts of the United States indicated an average of nearly 21 cents a pound. The Illinois State pool realized 16 cents, the Iowa pool netted 151/2 cents and tend the afternoon programs. Home the Kansas pool only 111/2 cents a pound. These pools were sold last fall when wool was cheap. Other States were more fortunate or better informed and held their pools until spring and sold on a much higher market. In this way the New York wool brought 33 cents a pound, while Ohio farmers netted 27 cents.

In reply to criticisms of the management of the Iowa pool, V. G. Warner, secretary of the Iowa Fleece Wool Growers' Association, has issued a statement blaming the Government for issuing erroneous figures on the supply last fall. When the facts became known, the wool market advanced sharply, but the Iowa pool had already been sold at the low

Farmers complain that when they placed their wool in the pools they lost control over the time it should be sold and that the men on whose ju ment they relied as to when it should be marketed had failed to size up the situation correctly. situation correctly.

The 1920 wool pools were not satisfactory to many producers, so that last year the Illinois pool was only half as large as the preceding one. Farmers claim that after two years' trial, the orderly marketing of agri-cultural products in a broad way has not been successful.



the original bill passed by the House.

Without the text of the measure before us it is not possible to analyze it in detail, but it can be safely said that no money which shall be spent under this Administration will be productive of such lasting benefit to the country and contribute so much toward permanent economic progress as the \$36,774,000 appropriated by

Politicians are accustomed to think of such appropriations as made for "the benefit of the farmer." But the work of the Department of Agricul-ture is more truly in the economic in-terest of the Nation than that of al-most any other department. For its final purpose is the economic advancement of the Nation. In analyzing the effect of Government activity on economic progress economists cannot fail to recognize that the work of no department is so direct and of such a practical and permanent character as that of the Department of Agricul-

The great task ahead of the United States in this after-the-war period is the increase of the per capita production of our people in all fields of industry. The work of the Department of Agriculture is directed precisely toward that end, and the very fact that many of the results are expected to take time in achievement is indicative of the permanent progress that is being sought.

We have not as a people come to realize fully how important is the activity of all such agencies, including the State agricultural departments, the agricultural colleges and the various local bodies co-operating with these agencies. The greatest resource which remains to be developed in the United States is the productive power of the people, and it is toward such development that the efforts of the Department of Agriculture are directed.





SPEED RECORD FOR PIGEONS

Birds Bred by Department of Agriculture Have Established New Marks in Flights.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) The homing pigeons, bred and owned by the bureau of animal industry. United States Department of Agricul ture, at the government farm, Beltsville, Md., have established a record during the past three years which stands alone and unequaled. Beginning with 1919, the year in which the loft was established, the Beltsville birds won first and second in the 100mile and first in the 200-mile young-

bird races as well as best average speed in flights of from 100 to 300 miles. In 1920 the birds from this loft won first; second, and third in the 200-mile and first, second, and third in the 300-mile race. GRAIN FOR GEESE IN WINTER

Handful of Equal Parts Oats and Corn for Each Fowl Is About Right-Feed Green Stuff.

The grain rations for geese in winter should be equal parts oats and corn. Give about a handful to each bird once a day. Geese require an abundance of green feed every day throughout the year. Clover hay or alfalfa should be cut green, and when properly cured makes excellent winter feed for geese. Give them all they will eat of this, when possible to provide.
