THE ECONOMY seems to be off to a shaky start for the 1980s. Interest by investors in gold, silver and other precious metals has caused the market on these commodities to change almost every day...

Gold, which could be bought for around \$132 an ounce three years ago, has pushed to over \$700 per ounce. Silver, in the meantime, has gone from around \$4.40 in January of 1977...

The rush has been on both sides of the counter. People are cashing in such items as old class rings, dental fillings, old family heirlooms, etc., in an effort to get some cash while the prices are high.

Some collectors are turning in their silver coins, now worth many times their value. Others, convinced that the prices will continue to spiral, are buying such coins and bars, virtually as fast as the others are selling.

Some stories have been quoted about big and quick profits being made since the market spiral began. A San Francisco resident with \$5,000 in idle cash was said to have bought a gold futures contract in August now worth around \$50,000.

A young Georgia man reportedly noticed a set of sterling silver pitchers and trays in a department store which had not been marked up. He bought the set, and resold it to a silver dealer for an instant profit of \$7,000.

While there are some big winners on the investment side when the market rises like it has been, there are also some losers, and in this case it appears that the American consumer will be the "stuckee," as usual.

The price of film of all kinds is expected to skyrocket. Eastman Kodak has announced that it will raise film prices as much as 75 per cent. If you like to take pictures, you're going to have to really like them when the prices level off.

Unfortunately for us, we use a considerable amount of Kodak products in producing our newspaper, as our news and advertising is now set on paper produced by that company, in addition to all of our film and photographic paper.

So, if you thought that 20¢ was high for a copy of the paper, or that our advertising was high, you (and we) may have to adjust our thinking.

Prices may also rise in some areas of health care, since X-ray film is a heavy user of silver. Dental costs will no doubt be affected, since close to 15 per cent of the nation's gold consumption goes into bridgework or fillings.

Other things are likely to be affected as well, just as the cost of oil and gas has had its effect on the price structure in our economy.

A BIG PUSH has been instigated in some quarters to boycott the 1980 summer Olympics, or at least move them out of Moscow, due to the Soviets' aggression in Afganistan.

Those in favor of the pullout say that Moscow is counting heavily on the Olympics, just as Nazi Germany was in 1936, giving them an opportunity for propaganda.

Loss of the Olympics would be a blow not only to communism, but would no doubt cause more of an economic setback, by losing the money influx the games would bring, than all of the grain embargos we could come up with.

We say, "Move 'em." Canada, which hosted the last Olympics, says they would take them again if asked, and their facilities would require very little getting ready.

It's about time that the free world stood up to the Russians, and this would be as good a time to start as any.

## Political Pot Begins To Boil In Area

### BILL CLAYTON ...State Rep.

State Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake said today that he will seek re-election to the District 74 seat he now holds in the Texas House of Representatives.

The district includes Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Deaf Smith, Lamb, Oldham and Parmer counties.

In making the announcement, Clayton said it has been a distinct honor to serve the people of this district the past several years.

As a member of the House of Representatives, Clayton has established a historical first by serving three consecutive terms as Speaker of the House.

"Serving as state representative for District 74 and as Speaker of the House of Representatives, I have worked double duty at addressing the needs of the citizens of this area in their dealings with government.

"I have attempted to maintain a direct line of communication with all the people of our seven counties and as a result a great many of the problems we have faced have been resolved.

"We have been successful in dealing with short-term problems of energy for agriculture, in helping with improvement of our roads and highways, with providing tax relief for both homeowners and farmers and ranchers, and providing an economic climate that is inductive to bringing new business and industry to Texas."

"In the upcoming session of the Legislature it is imperative that through redistricting we see that the strong voice of our area is not diminished in Congress, the State Senate and the House of Representatives," Clayton said.

Clayton added that he intended to continue every effort possible to keep him in daily contact with all areas of the district.

### JACK YOUNG ...District Attorney

Jack Young has announced that he will seek re-election as District Attorney of the 154th Judicial District of Texas, which is composed of Lamb, Bailey and Parmer Counties.

Young said, "I would like to take this means and opportunity to announce my candidacy for re-election as District Attorney for the 154th Judicial District of Texas. I appreciate the confidence that the people of Lamb, Bailey and Parmer Counties have shown in me in the past by electing me their District Attorney, and pledge my continued effort in the fight for law and order."

Jack Young is a candidate in the Democratic Primary to be held May 3, 1980.

A Methodist and Rotarian and a graduate of Texas Tech, Moseley is the present chairman of the Parmer County Historical Commission. He and his wife, Wilma, have one son, David.

"If I am elected I will be a full time Tax Assessor-Collector. I promise to give friendly, courteous service to everyone at all times. I will do my best to follow state laws and regulations pertaining to the Property Tax and the Automobile Registration and Titles," he said.

### PORTER V. ROBERTS ...County Judge

Porter V. Roberts has authorized the Bovina Blade to announce his candidacy for election for a two-year unexpired term as County Judge of Parmer County, subject to the Democratic primary in May. Roberts was appointed by the Commissioners Court to fill the vacancy on the retirement of Judge Paul Fortenberry at the end of December.

Born in Oklahoma, Roberts attended grade school at Maud, Oklahoma; and graduated from high school at Ada, Oklahoma. After approximately three years in the Army, serving as a Combat medic in Germany, he attended East Central State College at Ada, Oklahoma for three years, majoring in Business Administration.

Since coming to Texas in 1949, Roberts has worked for Southwestern Public Service Co. in Levelland and Service Pipeline Co. in Levelland and Post. Moving to Friona in March 1960, Roberts ran a furniture store for four years, has been Tax Assessor-Collector for the Friona Independent School District for thirteen years, and has worked for Gary Cook Oil Co., Inc. for two and a half years.

Active in civic affairs, he is a member of the Friona Evening Lions Club for which he has seventeen years of perfect attendance, and is a fourteen-year member of the Friona Volunteer Fire Department. He is currently serving as a director for the Hi-Plains Eye Bank. Other memberships include the American Legion Post No. 206, and the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, for which he once served as part-time manager.

As a member of the First Baptist Church of Friona, Roberts is serving as Department secretary, and as a member of the Tellers Committee and an usher.

Porter and Jean Roberts, who live at 1208 Virginia in Friona, have one daughter, Patricia, who works in a bank in Houston; and one son, Mike, who is a mortician in Childress.

In announcing his candidacy, Roberts said, "Since being sworn in on January 2, I have had just enough experience to make the job appeal to me as a very interesting challenge. The Commissioners Court could only appoint me to fill the vacancy until the next general election, so I am

asking the voters to allow me to use the approximately one year of experience I will then have. I feel that with the help of Johnny Atkinson, the County Attorney, and the Commissioners Court, and utilizing the training I will have received in schools and conferences, that I can do the job in a very satisfactory manner."



BILL SARPALIUS ...State Senate

Bill Sarpalius announced this week that he would be a candidate for the Democratic nomination for the Texas Senate from the 31st Senatorial District.

Sarpalius lived at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch for seven years, and after graduating in 1967 he worked at various odd jobs while attending Clarendon College.

In 1968 he was elected State President of the Future Farmers of America and traveled over 76,000 miles in the State of Texas representing the 50,000 members of the FFA.

After serving as President of the FFA Bill was married and returned to Clarendon College and graduated in May of 1970. He was President of the Student Body at Clarendon College, received Who's Who in American Junior Colleges, and served as Chairman of the Youth Advisory Committee to the Selective Service, being appointed by the Governor.

Sarpalius graduated from Texas Tech University in 1972 with a degree in Agriculture Education. In 1972 Bill was selected as an Outstanding Young Man of America, and went to work for Cal Farley's Boys Ranch where he worked for two years as Assistant Director of Admissions and taught vocational agriculture in high school at the Ranch for three years.

In May of 1978 Bill received his Master's of Agriculture Degree from West Texas State University. Bill worked for more than two years as District Office Manager for Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, Bill Clayton.

Sarpalius has one son, David, who is in the first grade in Hereford. He is an active member of the Hereford Lions Club and in the First United Methodist Church in Hereford where he teaches a high school Sunday School Class. Bill is also active in the Big Brothers program in Hereford. He has two brothers who are Baptist ministers.

## Contracting Underway For Sugarbeet Crop

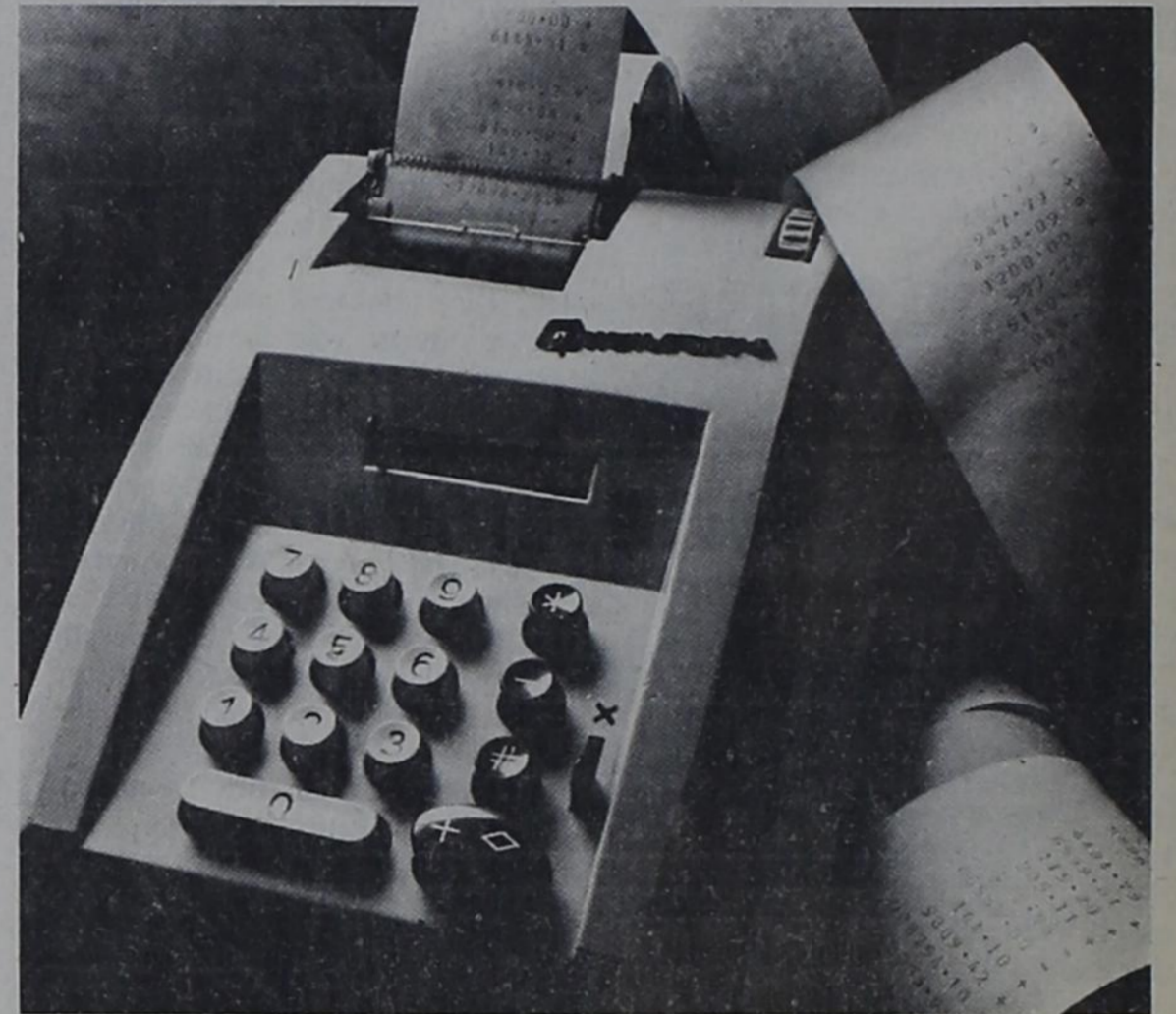
Contracting the 1980 sugarbeet crop began last week as Holly Sugar Corporation Agriculturists began visiting growers to contract the needed raw material for the Hereford Plant.

Cal Jones, Agricultural Manager for the Hereford Plant, said soil sampling began following harvest in December. "The soil sample is a service we provide our growers in an effort to improve the sugarbeet quality, thus increasing the grower's return. We know that nitrogen in large amounts drastically suppresses sugar production. When we detect

this in the soil prior to planting, we can advise the grower for a more profitable crop," Jones stated.

Farmers interested in growing sugarbeets need to contact the Hereford office or Tony Edwards, Agriculturist for the Friona and Bovina area at 1-364-2593 in Hereford.

"The outlook for 1980 is very encouraging," Jones said, "World sugar analysts say demand for sugar in the coming year will surpass supply, thus increased prices may be seen in 1980."

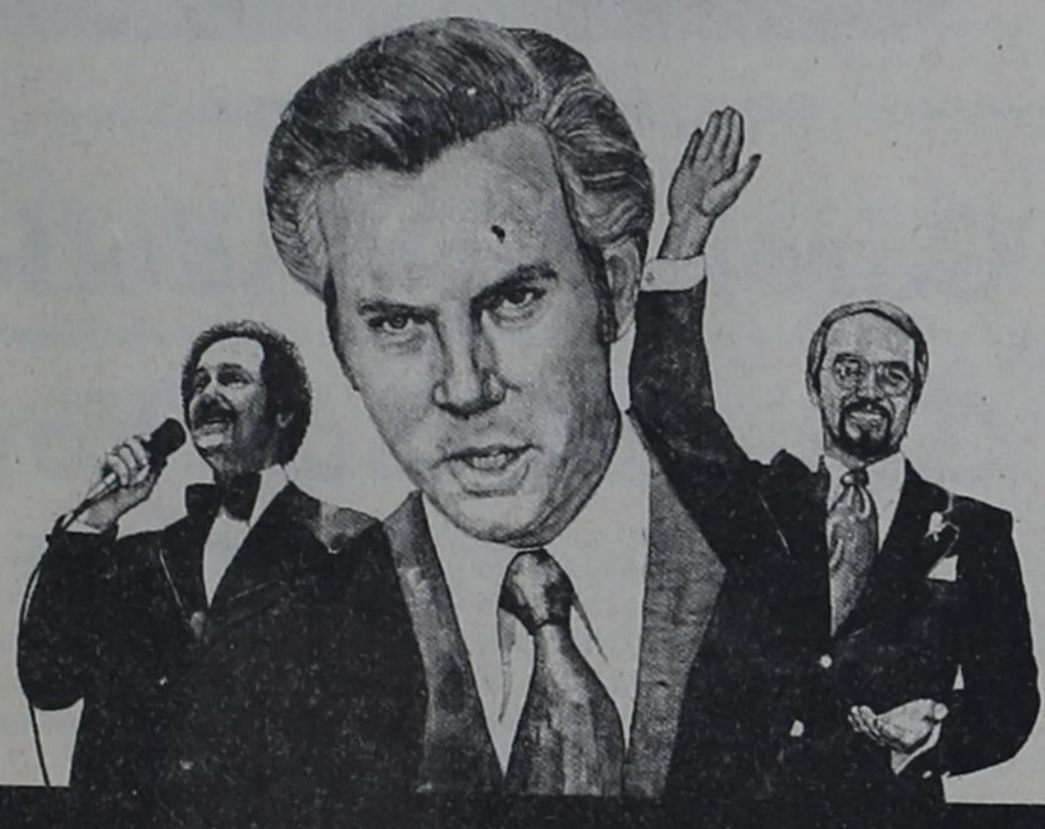

**Solar greenhouse conserves energy**

**COLLEGE STATION** — Higher transportation costs may increase the demand for locally grown foods, and a solar greenhouse being built and tested at Texas A&M University could be the first step toward efficient, year-round vegetable gardening.

Dr. Cornelius van Bavel, who heads the solar energy research project, has developed a fluid roof greenhouse that stores excess energy.

The greenhouse has a transparent, hollow-core roof through which a sky-blue solution of copper chloride is circulated. The chloride solution acts as a selective filter to gather heat from the sun but does not interfere with the transmission of light. The heat captured in the fluid roof is stored in the solution in a 500-gallon underground tank for use during cool nights to keep the plants at a uniform temperature.

Other methods can be used now to conserve energy in greenhouses, the researcher says. For example, he suggests reducing air leakage, providing double glazing, using thermal screens at night and improving the efficiency of heating systems.
