## Y. M. C. A. CAMP OPENS THIS WEEK AT CAMP RIO VISTA

San Antonio Express, May 26: The Y. M. C. A. will open next Wednesday, May 31, the 12th annual boys' camp of San Antonio at the site nine miles north of Kerrville, and run for a period of ten days. The location used this year is the Camp Rio Vista property owned by Herbert L. Crate. Mr. Crate has just expended \$5,000 on the site, which has made it one of ASSOCIATED CHARITY DIRECTORS the best and most fully equipped campsites in the State. The equipment there now consists of a large dining hall, kitchen, camp store, supply house and first aid house. The first aid house has been provided with steel cots, for which each boy must furnish his bedding. Part of the food used in the kitchens will be produced nearby dairy and poultry farm. 




