

Clayton, N. Y., Aug. 11.- "Muzzle the money kings of Wall Street if you would stop industrial disputes."

That is the remedy offered by Henry Ford, Detroit automobile king and potential presidential candidate, in an interview here with a correspondent of the Detroit Times.

Ford, accompanied by his wife and Dr. and Mrs. J. M. Thompson of Detroit, are en route to Boston, traveling on the Ford yacht Sialia. At the same time Ford assailed labor unions as being engineered by capitalists and leaders of finance who knew that with their workers organized into units, they can be handled with twice the effectiveness they could be handled were they split into factions, un-organized and working alone.

During his talk with newspaper men, Mr. Ford declared:

"The nations are slowly moving to world peace. Business is now near normal. Harding has done pretty well the catcher, Holchak skied to center in his term of office."

"Can the present coal and rail strikes be settled by compromise or will the issue of leadership in in-dustry be fought out to the end this

time?" was the first question asked of Mr. Ford. He replied emphatically:

Says Wall Street Behind Walkouts "There can be no settlement of these strikes so long as the moneyed interests of Wall Street continue in their efforts to dominate American industry. 

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


