



There are two kinds of tuitiou payers-those who pay every month for the entire nine months, and those who pay for only part of the term.

Some of Kerrville's population is transient, people who come here for a few months or a year and then leave. These people cannot transfer their state money here; they pay no taxes here, and consequently the local school does not get one cent from them. during the entire year. The tuition is: First and second grades, \$2; third and fourth grades, \$2.50; fifth and sixth grades, \$3; seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth and eleventh grades, \$4. The average price of tuition is about \$3 a month or \$27 a year. The aver-age cost of schooling each child, dur ing the past session, was \$45.
