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## DEMOCRATIC TREND SHOWN IN COUNTRY; REPUBLICANS STILL CONTROL CONGRESS

Results in the election in various States show a Democratic trend, and especially in the East, but the Republicans retain a majority in both Houses of Congress of a safe size for legislative purposes. The changes have not been so much on differences in party principles or policies, but upon personal issues and the "wet" and "dry" issue, which many voters continue to consider a live one.

### Light Vote in Kerr County

There was a very light vote cast in Kerr County, being only about a third of the total. Cypress Creek had not been received up to Wednesday noon. It is expected to give a Republican majority. Live Oak did not hold any election.

The twelve boxes reporting have a total of about 700 votes. For United States Senator, Mayfield received 427 votes; Peddy, 219. For Congressman, Hudspeth, 524; Simpson, 135. There was no contest for county offices.

### Mayfield's Election Conceded

Dallas, Tex., Nov. 7.—W. E. Talbot, director of the Republican organization in Texas, at 11 o'clock tonight, conceded the election of Earle B. Mayfield for Senator, over George E. B. Peddy, Republican and Independent Democrat.

Returns at that time showed practically a three to one lead for Mayfield.

### Bexar County Surprises

San Antonio, Tex., Nov. 7.—Nothing was more surprising to the average voter last night than the returns that showed Earle B. Mayfield and Governor Pat M. Neff both leading in Bexar County. Seventy-two boxes of the 108 gave Mayfield for Senator 5,592 to 4,453 for Peddy. The same boxes gave Neff 6,929 to 3,573 for Atwell.

It has been many a day since a Democrat of the persuasion of either of these candidates has swept things in this city. The vote for Mayfield was considered remarkable in every way. Governor Neff dissipated much of the opposition towards him in the speech he delivered at Beethoven Hall during the State Democratic Convention here in September, but nobody expected Mayfield to carry the county.

### Reed Elected in Missouri

St. Louis, Nov. 7.—Senator James A. Reed (Dem.) increased his lead approximately 15,000 over R. R. Brewster (Rep.), in the Missouri senatorial race, when more than one-fourth of the precincts in the State reported tonight. In 1,008 precincts out of 3,873 in Missouri, the vote was: Reed 104,112; Brewster 88,332.

Many precincts, normally heavily Republican, gave the Democratic nominee heavy majorities over their party standard-bearer, indicating heavy scratching, especially in the towns. This was attributed partly to Reed's open espousal of the cause of the "wets" and Brewster's straight prohibition enforcement campaign.

The entire State Congressional ticket also showed symptoms, in these early returns, of returning definitely to the Democratic column, which the State had deserted in the Democratic catastrophe of 1920 when Harding went in on a landslide.

### Democratic Gains in Oklahoma

Oklahoma City, Okla., Nov. 7.—Mayor J. C. Walton of Oklahoma City (Dem.), who ran on a Farmer-Labor platform, developed a lead in the early returns tonight which indicated his election as Governor of Oklahoma, over John Fields (Rep.).

Returns from 637 precincts out of 2,937 in the State gave: Walton 57,442; Fields 38,942.

Miss Alice Robertson (Rep.), the only woman in Congress, was running

ernor 48,763, and Alfred Taylor (Rep.), candidate for re-election, 24,408.

### Democrats Sweep Cook County

Chicago, Nov. 7.—The first 625 out of 6,051 precincts in Chicago gave Democratic candidates on the county ticket, with the exception of sheriff, leads of from 16,000 to 25,000 over their Republican opponents.

### Oh Min!

Dallas, Tex., Nov. 7.—Collingsworth County, the first to report returns, split its vote for Senator. It gave "A. Gump" 29, Mayfield 267, Peddy 196, Culbertson 7. For Governor, Atwell 27, Neff 496.

Collingsworth County was the first to report in both the July and August primaries, and as Collingsworth went, so went the State both times.

## COUNTRY AROUND KERRVILLE RICH IN SCENIC BEAUTY

San Antonio Express, Oct. 5th: A delightful trip for motorists, through a section of the Hill Country rich in scenery, is from San Antonio to Kerrville via Boerne, Comfort and Center Point and return via Medina City and Bandera, a total distance for the round trip of 155 miles.

While the road to Kerrville via Boerne and Comfort is the main traveled route and is an excellent road the entire distance, the route by way of Medina City and Bandera is quite rough a portion of the distance, and while not so widely used by the motoring public, from a scenic standpoint is one of the most beautiful drives within a day's journey of San Antonio.

The road, however, through Medina City and Bandera, while affording a delightful outing, with many excellent camping spots along it, is not recommended as one to be traveled over in wet weather, as for the greater part of the distance it is a rough country road, unimproved, with numerous streams to be forded. As a dry-weather trip, however, it's all that can be desired.

The Express motorogue car, on this occasion a Liberty Cavalier, made the trip on a recent Sunday, going to Kerrville by the regular route and returned through Medina City and Bandera, which in Old Spanish Trail parlance, is Tourist Loop No. 10, and is well marked with the familiar OST insignia, which prevents travelers from wandering from the regular route.

The road to Kerrville is too well known to be logged or described to any great extent. Starting from San Antonio over the Fredericksburg Road, the route lies through Leon Springs and through picturesque country to Boerne and on through Comfort and Center Point to Kerrville, the county seat of Kerr County, and better known as the mountain section of Southwest Texas. Beyond Boerne as the road winds among the green hills the country becomes more wild until the beautiful town of Comfort is reached.

Nearly all the way from Comfort to Kerrville the road winds along the banks of the Guadalupe, while off to the left, sitting atop a high eminence, commanding a beautiful view over the surrounding country, is the sanitarium maintained by the Order of Hermann Sons. This group of buildings is visible for miles and is in the midst of a gorgeous setting.

At Center Point the road crosses the Guadalupe and as the motorist approaches Kerrville the magnificent American Legion Memorial Sanitarium lies but a short distance from the road. This is a magnificent group of buildings and a credit to the cause it represents.

Nestling among the hills surrounding this delightful town are beautiful homes, some rising even to the scale of magnificence, resembling in the distance the estates of feudal barons of old.

### Fine Camp Site

Located at an altitude of 1,750 feet, Kerrville has much to offer motor tourists. The town boasts excellent

hotel accommodations and an excellent camp site for tourists, situated in a big grove, right on the banks of the Guadalupe. Pure artesian water from the city mains is supplied to campers, with shower baths and other conveniences for them. There is excellent fishing in the Guadalupe, another incentive to the visitor, as well as the cool, dry, invigorating atmosphere.

Much has been said about the beautiful Hill Country around Kerrville, but to the motorist whose time is limited to a one-day trip, and who desires to return to San Antonio after a short sojourn in the invigorating atmosphere of that section, the suggestion is offered to the road via Medina City and Bandera, which, although about 15 miles longer than the regular route by way of Boerne, is beautiful from a scenic point, even if there are rough spots in places.

The route from Kerrville is plainly marked by the letters, "T. L. No. 10," meaning Tourist Loop No. 10, the markings being the familiar red, white and yellow, the Old Spanish Trail insignia so familiar to motor tourists in this section of the country.

Before reaching Medina City, which is 25 miles from Kerrville, the road winds over Medina Mountain, with a magnificent view unfolding itself to the traveler on all sides. There are numerous stiff grades, however, and drivers should see to it that their brakes are in good condition. After the trip over the mountain is made, there is a beautiful ride down a canyon, with the Medina River close to the road for a greater part of the way. Along this part of the route there are several shallow creek crossings, over which the average motorist will have no trouble in making his way.

Medina City, an inland town, is a small settlement, about 14 miles from Bandera, the county seat of the county of that name. Shortly after leaving Medina City the river is again crossed at a ford, that for cars having a hard bottom. The crossing for automobiles is a short distance from that for wagons. The road all the way to Bandera is a fairly good dirt road and good average time can be made over it.

For the benefit of those who have a little time to linger by the wayside and who have a penchant for places of historical interest, a short reference will be made here to Camp Verde, which was established as an army post back in 1855. It is located several miles off the road between Medina City and the road that goes to Center Point, which branches off from the Kerrville road a little more than two miles east of Medina City.

### Was a Camel Post

In 1856 this camp was made a camel post, when 40 camels and 14 Armenian drivers were imported and stationed at this point. Tradition has it that at that time it was believed the Great American Desert started near this place and it was thought camels would solve the transportation problem. This scheme, however, proved visionary and the camels died out in the course of a few years. Their transportation was said to have been an idea of the late Jefferson Davis. Gen. Robert E. Lee and Gen. Albert Sidney Johnston were both in command of this post at times and it was from this place that Gen. Johnston started out in 1857 on his expedition against the Mormons.

The road from Bandera to San Antonio, about 40 miles, is quite well known and extended reference to it here is not necessary. It is in fairly good shape all the way from Bandera to the Bexar County line, with the exception of a three-mile strip in Medina County, which is exceedingly rough and rutty. Arrangements have been made, however, for the construction of a good road through this stretch at an early date, which will make a trip to Bandera and the beautiful hills and valleys throughout that section a pleasant and enjoyable one.

For the benefit of those who enjoy fishing, hunting and camping, there are innumerable spots along both of these routes to and from Kerrville that are ideal for camping sites, especially in the spring, summer and fall, where the sportsman may enjoy all that Nature has to offer.

On this particular trip, members of The Express party were indebted to Lee Mason, Ford dealer at Kerrville, for numerous courtesies and much information of that section. Mr. Mason's garage, which is centrally located, is quite a rendezvous for motor tourists.

Mrs. Otto Koehler of San Antonio visited Miss Ellen Mason this past week for several days, while her husband was on a hunting trip in this part of the country. Mrs. Koehler will be remembered as Miss Marcia Mariner, a former resident of Kerrville.

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### HIGHWAY WORK GETTING CLOSER TO KERRVILLE ON SECTION C

At the meeting of the County Board last week, there were present Judge Lee Wallace, chairman; Chas. Real, A. J. Gibbens, Hugo Wiedenfeld and J. A. Peril, County Commissioners. In addition to routine matters, the following claims on the highway were allowed:

Section A—For the past month, \$4,016.01; total, \$64,760.95, with 10 per cent reserved.

Section B—For the past month, \$8,173.59; total, \$67,734.00, with 10 per cent reserved.

Section C—For the past month, \$7,778.25; total, \$1,821.91.

Engineer Simpson was also allowed his monthly salary of \$500.00. A considerable portion of the highway has been finished and is being used, which the traveling public very much appreciate. They are now at work all along Section C, which puts them near Kerrville.

**Authentic Figures on Prohibition**

Houston Chronicle: Officials in Massachusetts who desired to get at the truth about conditions before the Volstead law went into effect and since, made a thorough personal first hand investigation.

For comparison the seven wet years, 1912-1918, both inclusive, and the dry years of 1920 and 1921 were used. The comparison of crime and poverty show the following results. All the figures represent decreases, as follows:

Drunkness, 55 per cent; of drunken women, 69; men in jail, 52; women in jail, 60; offenses against public order, 27; offenses against property, 2; against persons, 19; women offenders, 39; neglected children, 22; non-support, 31.

The Boston Welfare Society (formerly Associated Charities) reports in 1917-18-19 it cared for 686 cases or 19.2 per cent, while in 1920-21-22 the number was reduced to 105, or 3 per cent of the population under its ministrations.

The South End Mission superintendent says liquor can be obtained, but family life continues on an infinitely sounder basis. While the new regime is not all that is desired, it is heaven on earth compared with what conditions used to be.

Dr. Charles W. Eliot, president emeritus of Harvard University, can not be justly said to be prejudiced or fanatical. He says:

"Evidence has accumulated on every hand that prohibition has promoted public health, public happiness and industrial efficiency. The evidence comes from manufacturers, physicians, nurses of all sorts, school, factory, hospital and district, and from social workers of many races and religions laboring daily in a great variety of fields.

"This testimony also demonstrates beyond a doubt that prohibition is actually sapping the terrible force of disease, poverty, crime and vice. These results are obtained in spite of the imperfect enforcement in some communities of the eighteenth amendment."

Such statistics, gathered by people whose lives are devoted to the service of their fellow men, furnish evidence of far greater value than do the figures of offenses committed by deliberate violators of the law, in order to gratify debased appetites.

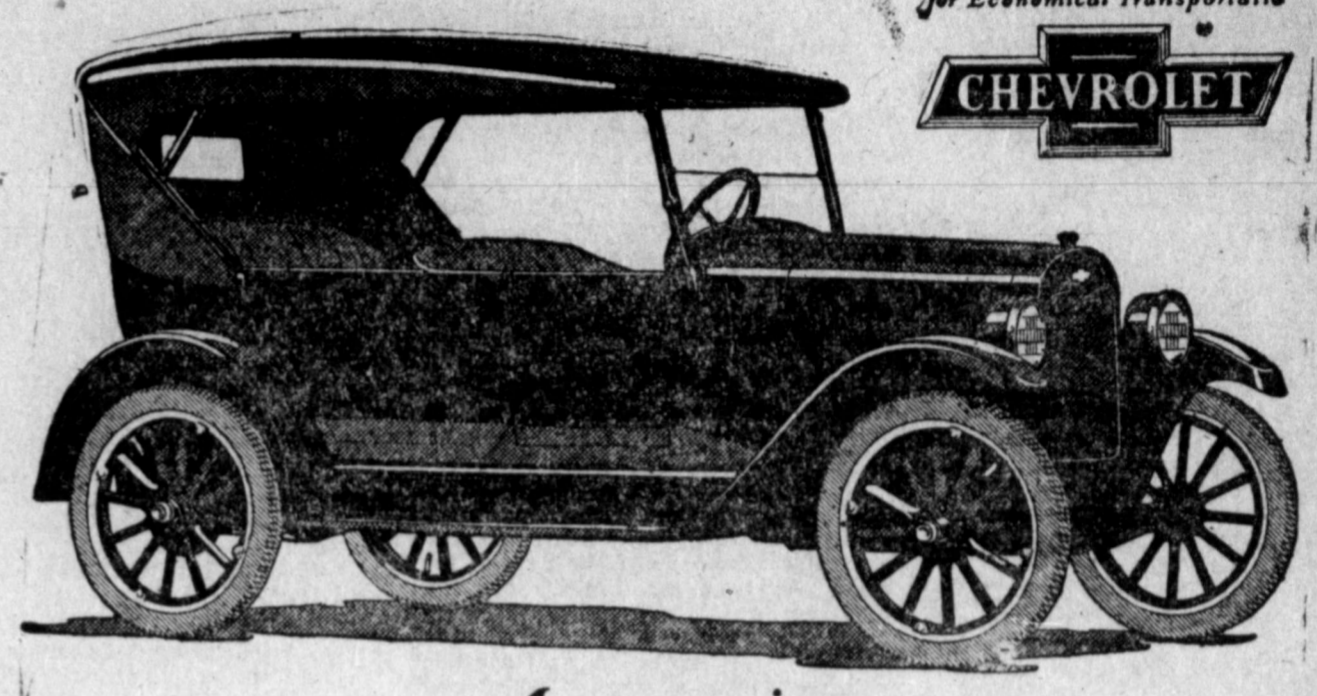

OCTOBER BUSY FOR PRO FORCE IN THIS STATE

Austin, Tex., Nov. 4.—David H. Morris, Federal prohibition director for the State of Texas, reports that during the month of October, the Federal prohibition agents working under his direction in the State of Texas, arrested 331 persons for violation of the National prohibition act, seized 52 illicit stills and 27 illicit still worms, 303 gallons of moonshine whiskey, 726 gallons of Choce beer, 790 gallons of grape wine, 5,771 gallons of cornmeal mash and 173 fifty-gallon barrels used for fermenting mash in making moonshine whiskey; all of the above was destroyed by chopping to pieces and burning, and wasting on the ground, except a small quantity to be used as evidence in the conviction of the violators.

The report further says: "There were also seized 18 automobiles, valued at \$3,923. In addition to the above, the following merchandise that was being used for the manufacture of moonshine whiskey was seized: 1,150 pounds of granulated sugar, 360 pounds of corn chops and corn meal, 900 pounds of malt and hops.

The total appraised commercial value of the property seized and not destroyed was \$4,238. The total appraised commercial value of the property seized and destroyed was \$74,500. The amount of assessable liabilities for October recommended by this department for collection through the Collector of Internal Revenue, as recommended to the Federal Prohibition Commission, was \$320,333.76.

CORNERSTONE LAID FOR SKY SCRAPER CHURCH IN CHICAGO

Chicago, Nov. 6.—Dedicated as a symbol of the permeating influence of religion in home, business and public life and in all National and international relation, the cornerstone of the First Methodist Episcopal Church—the world's first skyscraper cathedral—was laid with appropriate ceremonies yesterday.

Located in the heart of the busy "loop" at Washington and Clark Streets, the building, when completed early next year, will tower more than 21 stories above the street.

The ground floor and the first three of the other stories will be largely devoted to religious pursuits. Above will be offices devoted to the various activities of the Christian Church and of business enterprises.

"The building is both a parable and lesson," declared Bishop Thomas Nicholson, in his address at the cornerstone laying. "It is a symbol of how religions should vitalize and permeate all of our relations."

"There is a deep and growing appreciation on the part of business men, statesmen and leaders, and other countries of the fundamental values of the religion in nation building. These men care less and less for mere sectarian propaganda. They have little interest in theological controversies of the determinations of religious dogma, but they are profoundly interested in those vitalities of religion which resulted in personal righteousness, in civic justice and in national and international good will."

Declaring that "the world, as never before, is looking to the pulpit and church for a solution of its problems," Dr. John Thompson, pastor of the church, declared that "new party alignments are an imperative necessity. The old party shibboleths are valueless. That is why the public lacks enthusiasm in either city or State or National elections. The church will have to train her own statesmen. The only agency that can save the world from ultimate chaos is the church. If the world is to be federated so as to make war im-

possible, if order is to be brought out of the present industrial chaos, the church will have to do it."

George W. Dixon, president of the board of trustees, gave the history of the church, tracing it back to a log cabin built in 1828, long before the city was granted a charter. Charles W. Dawson, another speaker, declared that the church, the shadow of whose spire when completed will rest across the heart of the business section of the city, stood a bulwark for constitutional government and progress. "We are getting too far away from the foundations of government interests—from the church and from the home," he added.

PULPIT AND PRESS OF NATION ARE POWERS THAT INFLUENCE THE WORLD

Press and pulpit are the two powers that express the soul of a nation and if they can be united, they can assume some of the responsibility of helping the world to a better civilization, John C. Shaffer, owner of the Chicago Evening Post, said Tuesday in addressing the National Conference on church publicity.

There has been very little co-operation between pulpit and press of late, said Mr. Shaffer, adding: "We have no outstanding editors today. No one seems to have had the good fortune of falling heir to the mantle of Garrison, Greeley, Dana, Joseph Medill, Story, Grady or Colonel Watterson."

"The standard by which a newspaper's success should be estimated should be:

"What is its ethical standard? "What service has it rendered to the city, State and National Government which has created a deeper respect for law and order, and "What has it done to create a higher and better citizenship?"

"Today party politics and partisan papers prevent our Government from taking an important part in righting the wrongs produced by the recent war, or in helping the governments of Europe in getting back to normal condition."

"The pulpit and the press must unite on this one proposition: We must not run away from the opportunities of helping the world get back to normalcy."

When the Democratic party nominates a man like Hertzberg, it can expect only defeat. When one considers Hertzberg's campaign tactics, he had coming what he got.

Real estate in Kerr County is not going to decrease in value, in the opinion of experienced investors, while in Kerrville there is expected a steady increase in property values.

Regardless of the result of the election we will have to work and economize to get along, unless one is in the easy-street class. At all events, neither party can legislate you a living.

If the Democratic party will discard its old-time fossilized ideas and come out for genuine American policies it can sweep the country in 1924. However, that is hardly possible.

Many leading Republicans are beginning to suspect that President Harding has a cotton string up his back for a backbone. That has been observed for some time by the average citizen.

Bailey, no doubt, has finally come to the conclusion that he cannot expect any further honors from the Democratic party in Texas, so prefers to see it defeated or at least torn to pieces in strife.

Since Corpus Christi has voted the million dollars in bonds to aid in getting a deep harbor it is supposed that the Uvalde & Gulf Railroad will be sold to Messrs. Ethridge and Kell, as they have an option on it. Then, it will be connected up through this country, either by way of Kerrville or Fredericksburg, and a trunk line will be the result. We may be better off at the end of a spur and with very limited railway facilities, but such a position is not one that invites outside capital nor much development.

The situation in Europe looks very much like another general war. If so, let the fools settle it among themselves. Possibly the fighting stopped too quick before. Neither Germany nor Turkey are willing to acknowledge that they were whipped. Turkey has been able to regain more than she lost, through the connivance of France, which country has fallen so far from grace as to secretly back the murderous Turk. This country can also find plenty of empty stomachs to fill in this country instead of sending millions of dollars worth of foodstuff to Europe. As long as the soft-hearted and softer headed people of this country will supply the food to the mendicants there, fighting will continue. Make them either go to work or starve.

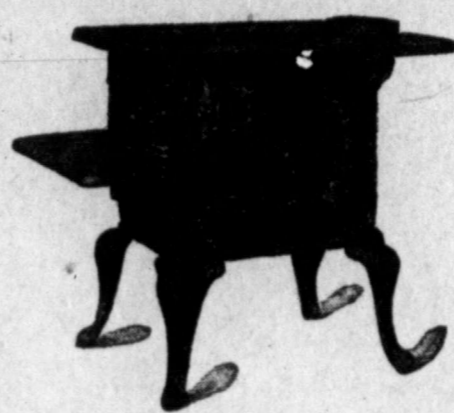

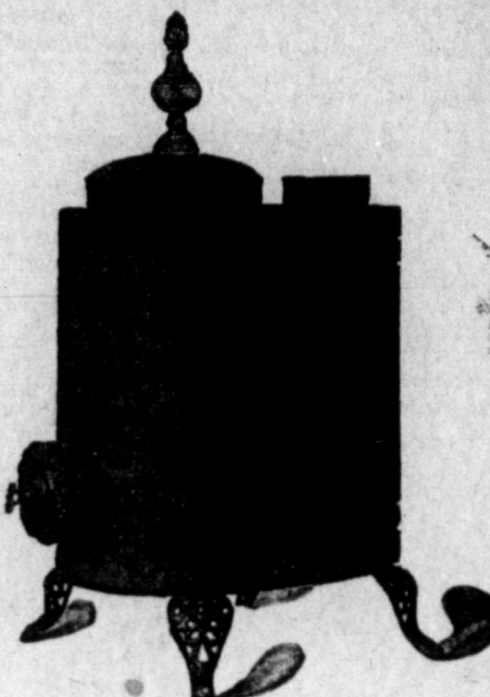

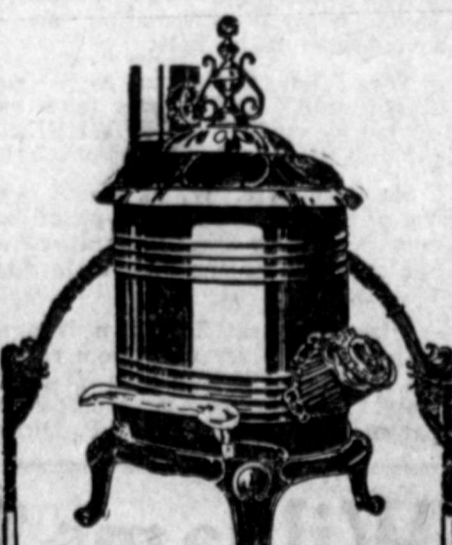

## RESOLUTION

Adopted by International Bible Students Association at Cedar Point, September 10, 1922

The International Bible Students in convention assembled deem it a duty and privilege to send this message to the nations of earth.

As a body of Christians consecrated to obey and follow our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, we are opposed to engaging in war, revolution, anarchy, or violence in any form; and we are opposed to fraud and deception being practised upon the people by the misrepresentation of the Word of God or otherwise. We earnestly desire peace, prosperity and the blessing of the people with life, liberty and happiness; and we held that the only means by which this can be accomplished is by and through the reign of Christ.

In the light of the Word of God, and particularly of fulfilled prophecy, we submit the following as a true statement of the facts relating to present conditions:

1. That the rulers of earth have frequently boasted that the World War was fought to make the world safe for democracy, which claim has proven to be a delusion and a snare;
2. That the international conferences at Paris, Washington, Genoa and The Hague, participated in by the financiers and statesmen and approved by the denominational clergy of the world, held for the purpose, as announced, of establishing peace on earth, have failed to bring forth the desired results;
3. That all of the nations of earth are now in distress and perplexity, as the Lord foretold they would be at this time, and that the entire social and political structure is threatened with complete dissolution; and the leading statesmen and rulers of the earth being aware of this fact and of their inability to establish peace and prosperity are frantically calling upon the denominational churches to save the world from disaster;
4. That it is the desire of all nations and peoples of earth that they might dwell in peace and enjoy life, liberty and happiness;
5. That the people are being misled by those who are attempting to bring about this desire through international conferences and agreements in the form of the League of Nations and like compacts.

We therefore call upon all the nations of earth, their rulers and leaders, and upon all the clergymen of all the denominational churches of earth, their followers and allies, big business and big politicians, to bring forth their proof in justification of the position taken by them that they can establish peace and prosperity on earth and bring happiness to the people; and their failing to do this, we call upon them to give ear to the testimony that we offer as witnesses for the Lord, and then let them say whether or not our testimony is true.

Relying upon the Word of God and His providential dealings with mankind through Christ Jesus, we as His witness hold and testify as follows, to-wit:

1. That the World War came in 1914 and was followed by great famines, pestilences and revolutions in various parts of the earth exactly as foretold by the Lord;
2. That 1914 marked the legal ending of the old world and there Christ the rightful King took unto Himself His power as King;
3. That the Lord Jesus Christ is now present, invisible to man, and proceeding with the work of establishing His kingdom, for which Kingdom He taught His followers to pray;
4. That Satan, long the god of this world, has deceived the statesmen, financiers and the clergy, by inducing them to believe that by international agreement or other combined efforts they can bring the desire of all nations;
5. That all of the world's present organization constitutes the visible part of Satan's empire or organization, and that Satan's empire must now fall before the forward march of the King of glory;
6. That all international conferences and all agreements or treaties resulting therefrom, including the League of Nations compact and all like compacts, must fail, because God has decreed it thus;
7. That all efforts of the denominational church organizations, their clergy, their leaders and their allies, to save and re-establish the order of things in the earth and to bring peace and prosperity must of necessity fail, because they do not constitute any part of the kingdom of Messiah;
8. That on the contrary, during the World War the clergy of these various church denominations were disloyal to the Lord Jesus Christ in this, that they wrongfully united with big business and big politicians to further the World War; they preached men into the trenches and falsely and blasphemously told them that their death upon the battle-field would be counted as a part of the vicarious atonement of Jesus Christ;
9. That they further repudiated the Lord and His kingdom and showed their disloyalty by voluntarily uniting themselves with Satan's organization and boldly announcing to the world that the League of Nations is the political expression of God's kingdom on earth, which announcement so made by them was in utter disregard of the words of Jesus and the apostles;
10. We further hold and testify that this is the day of God's vengeance against Satan's empire visible and invisible.
11. That the re-establishment of the old world or order is an impossibility; that the time is here for the establishment of the kingdom of God through Christ Jesus; and that all the powers and organizations that do not willingly submit to the righteous reign of the Lord will be destroyed;
12. That if the politicians would faithfully represent the people, and big business would cease exploiting the people, and the clergy would tell the people the truth concerning God's arrangement, and the people would cease from strife, the kingdom of Messiah would be established by Him without further trouble or distress; but failing thus to do, greater trouble must shortly follow;
13. That for this reason there is now impending and about to fall upon the nations of the earth, according to the words of Christ Jesus, a great time of "tribulation such as was not since the beginning of the world to this time, no, nor ever shall be again"; and it is this impending trouble that the rulers and mighty men of earth see coming.

But we hold and declare that Messiah's kingdom is the complete panacea for all the ills of humankind and will bring peace on earth and good will to men, the desire of all nations; that those who yield themselves willingly to His righteous reign now begun will be blessed with lasting peace, life, liberty and endless happiness.

Therefore we bring to the peoples of earth God's message of good tidings contained in the Bible, His Word of Truth, and we publish to them His message of peace and everlasting salvation; to-wit, that the King of Glory, the Deliverer of Man, is invisibly present and has begun His reign; that the old world, under the control of Satan, has ended and is being rapidly broken in pieces, to make way for the everlasting kingdom of righteousness now being set up, and that millions of people now living on earth, if obedient to the laws of that righteous kingdom, will continue to live and never die; and we call upon all nations, peoples, kindreds and tongues who love righteousness and hate iniquity to recognize and freely acknowledge that Jehovah is the only true God and His beloved son Christ Jesus is the King of kings and Lord of lords. 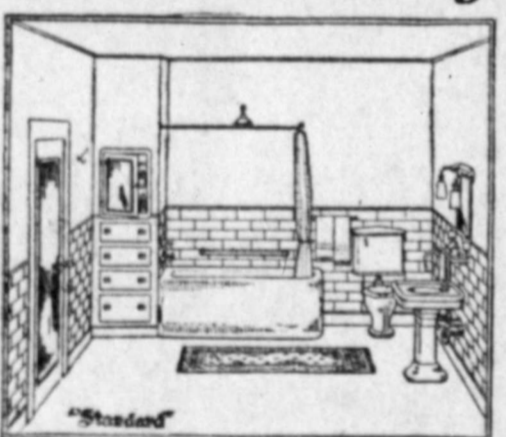
