GIANT LIQUOR RING IS UNEARTHED BY AGENTS

Chicago, Nov. 18 .- A giant bootleg cambination doing a business of \$25,-000,000 in a half year, was disclosed by the Federal authorities here to-night. The huge firm, with Nationwide operations, purchased more than 200,000 gallons of alcohol, which it made into whiskey and distributed in various parts of the country, accord-ing to prohibition agents who made the investigation.

Operating as a manufacturing com-pany, the firm did more business the past six months than any other single liquor ring, Federal officers alleged. Its transactions involved chemists, druggists and physicians.



THE WIRTH GOVERNMENT FAILS

Fort Worth Star-Telegram: The resignation of Chancellor Wirth and nis cabinet serves to emphasize anew the great loss which Germany suffered when Walter Ranthenau was assassinated. Rathenau had been the master mind of the Wirth government. He had been the chief adviser of the Chancellor and in all but name was head of the government. He was the genius behind the policy of "fulfillment" and it was he who had obtained for the government increasing confidence from abroad. Admittedly one of the very ablest men in Germany, an economist of world standing, an industrial organizer of vision and ability, he was just the man to direct the course of Germany during the trying period of reconstruction. With Rathenau by his side, Chancellor Wirth was a confident and at times even a daring leader. But with the assassination of Rathenau, the Chancellor and his government became impotent. Instead of carrying through the policy of "fulfillment," a policy which included the carrying out of the provisions of the Treaty of Versailles as far as possible, Chancellor Wirth soon bowed to public outcry and adopted the slogan "bread first and then reparations." It was a policy that could lead nowhere and which in the long run must lose support at home and abroad. It was inevitable that the Wirth government should fall. Without Rathenau it was incapable of meeting the situation which Germany faces.

What the new government will be and what alignment of parties will result from the present crisis, remains to be seen. Of chief interest to the rest of the world and to us is the character of the foreign policy which will result from the change. Germany needs now more than ever a government which will sincerely and faithfully follow a policy of "fulfillment." Had Rathenau lived, with the approach of a show-down on the question of reparations, we might have witnessed within the next few months a revision of the world settlement which would contribute definitely toward economic stabilization. 



JUDGE BEARS DOWN

ON "WET TRAFFIC Minenapolis, Nov. 18 .- That he was severe in sentencing liquor law violators "because the law ought to be enforced," and "because it never can be made effective unless I am severe," was the statement of Judge Page Morris of the United States

District Court, now in session here. Judge Morris' wholesale sentencing to jail of bootleggers and vendors of illicit liquor has caused great consternation among those arrested for violating the law.

Many persons pleaded that they have large families and ask to be let off with fines. Such pleas generally result in heavier jail sentences and fines. "It is remarkable the number of large families we have in this district," Judge Morris asserted.

"Easy sentences don't accomplish anything," said the Federal jurist, "and I am sending liquor law violators to jail wherever the statutes enable me to do so."

Judge Morris said he imposed sentences to the Feedral penitentiary at Leavenworth only in extreme cases, but that two men had been recently sent to that institution when convicted of conspiracy to violate the liquor

Four county jails in this district have been comfortably filled with Federal "paying guests" since Judge Morris started his campaign severa weeks ago.

"But there is plenty of room yet,' he said. "Ramsey, Pennepin, Winona and Wabasha County jails are pretty full, but there is still plenty of room. Defendants in liquor cases must be right on hand with their attorneys whenever their cases are called in Judge Morris' court, or lose their bail money. A defendant two days ago had his \$1,000 bond forfeited for appearing just 10 minutes after his

name was called. Judge Morris has adopted several means for speeding up liquor cases. For one thing an accused who pleads guilty for the first offense generally has the option of a fine or at least a comparatively short jail sentence. But to plead not guilty and then be con-

The latest speeding up method of Judge Morris was tried Tuesday when he adopted the English system of examining jury panels en masse. This resulted in a saving of half an hour to two hours, he said. "They go at it quicker in England,



LIVE IN FEAR OF SPIRITS

Copper Eskimos Believe Themselves Constantly Surrounded by Mysterious and Hostile Powers.

The Copper Eskimos believe that many strange and only semi-human races surround their land. The Indians, they feel, may be human, but the peoples far from them are altogether strange.

Birds and animals, think the Copper Eskimos, can be offended by scornful words, and the hunter who mocks the caribou or seal will be suddenly stricken down by illness or dogged by constant ill luck. Not only must the Eskimo propitiate the shades of his human dead, but also the spirits of the animals he kills.

Mysterious and hostile powers, invisible and incalculable, hem them in, as they believe, on every side, so that they never know from day to day whether a fatal illness or misfortune will not strike them or their families-from no apparent cause, and for no reason, save the ill will of those unseen foes.

"HAMLET" AND AMY ROBSART

Why Shakespeare Camouflaged a Story That Could Not at That Time Be Told.

It seems strange, so far as I know Shakespearean literature, that no critic has perceived the remarkable applicability of the tragedy of Amy Robsart to Hamlet, James Westfall Thompson writes in the North American Review. The language of the play most startlingly fits in with the case of Amy Robsart, the suspicion resting upon Leicester of having compassed her murder, and the suspected liaison between Leicester and Elizabeth.

As long as Elizabeth lived even guarded criticism was dangerous. It required a change of dynasty to release even veiled speech. As for flat, open discussion of the mystery of Amy Robsart or any other murder case of note, it was still quite impossible. Hence Shakespeare's resort to a drama in which under camouflaged guise Londoners might perceive the real spirit and condition of the age. Hamlet is the most brilliant assortment of double-edged language, covert criticism, cutting allusions to contemporary men, women and events, burning scorn, withering irony, to be found in any literature. If read aright, the play dazes and astounds the reader by its keenness, its satire, the stinging lash of its language, its mockery or condemnation of some of the very greatest personages in Elizabethan Eng-

Punishing Unfortunates.

Many Italian cities during the Middle ages had a curious way of punishing bankrupts. A large stone was set up in the market place of the town, and to this stone, on a certain day, were led all traders who had failed within the last year. One by one they were placed in the center of the stone, and their balance sheets were read to the crowd, which was permitted to jeer at each one in turn for a specified time, the presiding official "calling time" on the abuse by striking on a bell.

When the jeering was over the bankrupt was bereft of a necessary portion of his clothing and seized by the shoulders and knees by six public officers, who deliberately bumped him on the stone 12 times, in honor, it is said, of the Twelve Apostles, Schoolboys were encouraged to attend this performance, as it was considered to give them a wholesome lesson in commercial ethics.

First Jews in America.


There may have been a few Jews here before 1654, but it was in that year that they were definitely allowed to seek asylum in New Netherlands, There was a provision that "Jews shall have permission to sail to and trade in New Netherlands and to live and remain there, provided the poor among them shall not become a burden to the company (Dutch West India company) or to the community, but be supported by their own nation." This stipulation has been lived up to so faithfully that in 1916, with a Jewish population in New York of more than 1,250,000, there were but 72 pauper Jews in the almshouse on Blackwells island.

George Borrow's Dialogue,

Circumstantial as Defoe, rich in combinations as Lesage, and with such an instinct of the picturesque, both personal and local, as none of them possessed, this strange wild man holds on his strange wild way, and leads you captive to the end. Moreover, that his dialogue should be set down in racy, nervous, idiomatic English, with a kind of language at once primitive and scholarly, forceful but homely-the speech of the artist in sods and turfs, -if at first it surprise and charm, yet it ends by seeming so natural and just that you go on to forget all about it. and accept the whole thing as the genuine outcome of a man's experience, which it purports to be.-Henley
