Compelled to depend upon ourselves we have succeeded in adjusting supply to demand, in fi-nancing and marketing intelligently and in improvising new methods of credit to take the place of defaulted methods of pre-war days. "It was all the joint accomplishment of our farmers, merchants and bankers," it says, "who in their necessity discovered and put to use talents and fa-cilities not before realized. It has been a costly but valuable experience. That is, it will prove of incalculable value if we take the lesson to heart, if we maintain the practices and in-strumentalities of the achievement and persevere in self-reliance."

The article discusses at length how the recovery was achieved, and then proceeds to point out what must be done to preserve the highly satisfactory position which has been attained. Our immediate concern, it says, is threefold: (1) To be sure of maintaining intelligent marketing; (2) to be forwarned as to the world's needs in pitching the crop of 1923; and (3) to sustain and further develop our present practices and agencies of

This program covers in a broad way all of the activities in which we have engaged during the past two years in dealing with the changed situation. It is well to have them emphasized at this time, for with cotton again selling at a fair price and with a demand fully adequate to absorb the reduced supply, there is bound to be a temptation, not only to take the lid off and return to blind and unthinking methods with respect to production and marketing, but to grow indifferent of the value of agencies and practices which were born of the necessity of the past two The Federal International Banking Company has performed a distinct service in preparing and circulating this article.
