## WHITTLIN'

Stories in this issue of the paper indicate that next year-- 1968-- is an election year. October is traditionally the time, among other things, that taxes become due and payable and that you can re-qualify yourself for another year of voting.

County Clerk Hugh Moseley is reminding that his office is now accepting application for voter registration certificates. Issuance of the certificates qualify a voter to participate in 1968 elections.

As a matter of fact, the voter registration certificates are kinda like the old, outdated poll tax used to be except they cost \$1.75 per person less.

Another thing is that everyone of voting age must register. Since there is no longer a tax to vote in Texas, it is necessary for everyone to have a registration certificate. Formally, those over 60 were not required to have a poll tax or an exemption certificate in counties of less than 10,000 population.

The theory was that election officials should know the people over 60 and whether or not they were eligible to vote in a particular voting precinct.

And like some other theories, it didn't always work out that way.

The new plan is much improved, in our opinion. In the first place, there was a certain amount of discrimination involved in the poll tax. If it kept one person from voting because of the expense, it was too much.

Also, the fact that all voters now have to register will give election holders a more complete poll list and some confusion will be avoided because of this.

Changes are always necessary for the better, but we think Texas election laws have been improved considerably in the past few years.

Like it or not, this area seems destined to become a beef center.

Under construction at present are two mammoth feed lots plus the world's largest packing plant between Bovina and Friona. These are, of course, in addition to the existing feed lot facilities.

In the next few years, the area, we'd guess, will undergo some changes to fit in with the expanded cattle business. The change or progress is being brought about by the area's tremendous ability to produce grain sorghum, a great feed for cattle, as well as other feed crops.

The fact that this development is coming 10 or 15 years later than possibly it should have is a fact not to be complained about now. We can be happy that the stride is being taken; not that it could have happened earlier.

How much difference we'll see in our area remains to be seen. It will be interesting to watch.

In a recent issue, The Hereford Brand pointed out editorially that it was fitting that the area was returning to cattle as a basis for its economy. This has always been a great cattle country, the editorial pointed out, and was that back before irrigation and farming took over.

Cattle do well in this area, the report said because of the climate, strength of the grass, etc.

Mrs. I. W. Quickee has an interesting want ad this week. She hopes it gets results... and she gets her misplaced cup-towels returned.

Alfred and Lana Moody have turned out to be pretty good contestants in Bovina Businesses Cotton Bowl Football Contest. Last week was the third consecutive week for one of them to be in the prize winning circle. We've been accusing Alfred of figuring the football contest income in his budget. This year, he says, is the first time he's earned a prize in the contest and he's been entering since 1960.

## Now On Duty --

### Mitchell New City Marshall

Ronald Mitchell is Bovina's new City Marshall. He began work here Monday, succeeding Bill Denney who recently resigned to accept a similar position in Friona. Mitchell plans to move his family to Bovina this weekend from Lubbock.

He has served on the police department in Floydada for a year and has been a farmer in the Crosbyton area. More recently, Mitchell was employed by a pipeline construction company in Lubbock, but received a fractured neck and pelvis on July 26 in an accident while working.

The Mitchells have two sons, nine and seven years of age, who are in the fourth and second grades. Mitchell was named the new city marshal last week by the city council.

Since Denney's resignation, Deputy Sheriff Henry Minter and members of the Texas Highway Patrol have been on duty in Bovina, as well as Billy Harbison, who has worked weekends.

Denney was the first full-time city marshal in Bovina's history.

## On Highway 60 --

### Bonds Plans New Station

Plans are on the drawing board for a new Gulf service station and wholesale plant to be erected on Highway 60 on the corner of Gardner and North Streets, according to Tom Bonds of Bonds Oil Company.

Contract for the building has not been let, but Bonds said he hopes to get construction underway in the near future.

An old station located at the site was burned to the ground last week and rubble has been cleared away. Heavy machinery this week was leveling the ground and removing old concrete.

## On Ave. F --

### Blocks Added For Pavement

Two more blocks have been added to the paving program in Bovina, in addition to three blocks recently put on the planning board.

The two blocks from Third Street to Boyce Street on Ave. F are the latest additions to the paving, according to Mrs. Mary Ruth Martin, city secretary.

Others added are one block sections connecting Second and Third Streets. These are on Ave. C beside the Smart Shop, Ave. E, south of the Catholic Church, and Ave. G north of Mustang Drive In.

Work is underway this week on the one block segments of paving.

Bonds were voted by citizens of Bovina for the program and a contract was let last spring

Bonds now operates a service station on Highway 60 several blocks east, as well as a wholesale oil company.

Students will be out early so that school busses will be available to travel to the football game at Claude.

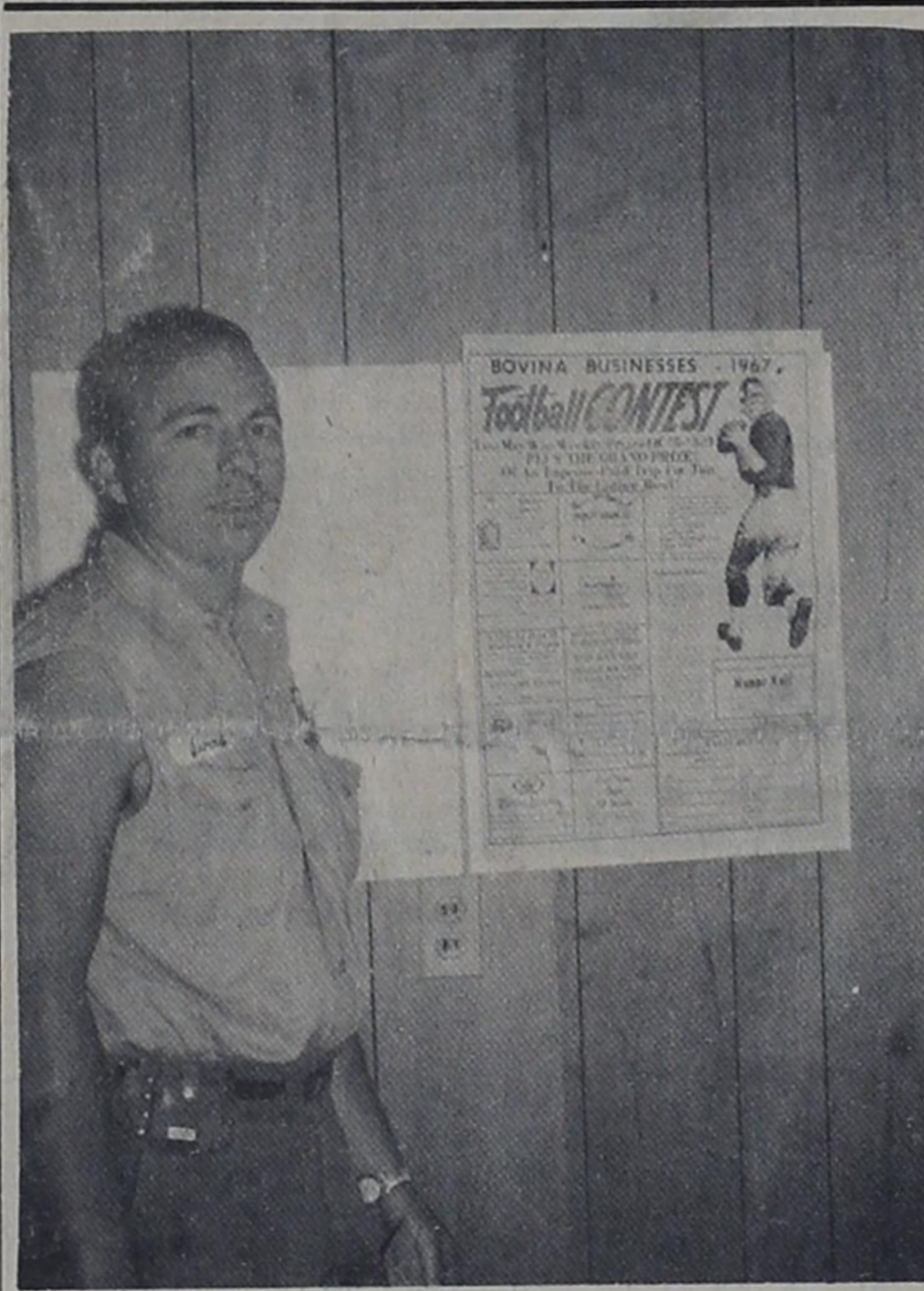

# Clinic Fund Hits \$43,000 Tuesday

Bovina Clinic Fund has increased to almost \$43,000, according to Alfred Moody, a member of the financial committee.

"It is so close to that amount, we would be safe in calling it \$43,000," Moody said.

The advisory board of the Bovina Clinic Fund met Tuesday night to lay plans for the immediate future, but decisions were not forthcoming at deadline time for this week's issue of The Blade.

Goal for the clinic fund was \$50,000. Some of this was raised through projects of Bovina Woman's Study Club, Lions

Club, Roping Club, G. I. Forum and Auxiliary, Jaycees and other organizations.

Site for the clinic was donated by the Joe Langer family.

After approval by Sears Roebuck Foundation for assistance to Bovina in securing a medical doctor and clinic for the town, two financial drives were held.

The advance drive, conducted this summer, raised the fund to \$23,000.

The general campaign, staged Sunday, Sept. 24, boosted the

total to \$38,500 by last Tuesday morning and since that time, more than \$4,000 has been added.

Most of the contributions have been in the form of pledges to buy certificates of indebtedness in multiples of \$25, which will be paid back the holders in the future. Some are outright donations, in the forms of pledges and cash.

Members of the advisory

board are Leon Grissom, chairman, Bedford Caldwell, J. B. Fowler and B. L. Marshall.

Present location of the two is the corner of Third and North Streets, where Charles began his wholesale and service station business 19 years ago. With two service stations on Highway 60, the old location now houses only the office and warehouse.

Charles hopes to be moved into the new location in about two months.

# Group Discusses Water For Area

Reports from Water, Inc. and Plains Cotton Growers were heard Monday night in Bovina Schools cafeteria.

The talks were made at a combined meeting of Parmer County Cotton Growers Association and Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The joint session was attended by approximately 20.

Earl Hobbs of Lubbock, representative of PCG, assured his audience the organization is "doing everything possible" to boost the cotton industry.

Joe W. Jones of Farwell was re-elected businessman representative from Parmer County to the association.

W. L. "Preach" Edelman of Friona is the farmer representative from Parmer and is presently secretary-treasurer of the association. He has a year remaining on his present term.

A. L. Hartzog presided at the cotton growers' portion of the meeting.

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"If we don't get a supplemental source of water (to this area), we're out of business," said A. E. Buchanan of Dumas, representative of Water, Inc., a voluntary, non-profit organization dedicated to bringing additional water to the Plains of Texas, Eastern New Mexico and the Oklahoma Panhandle.

A. L. Black of Friona is Parmer County's representative of the 23-member board of directors of the water association.

Buchanan explained that Water, Inc. was interested in developing and giving support to any feasible effort which will bring additional water to the area it represents.

The present long-range plan is to import water here from the Mississippi River, but "it will take a long time" to accomplish this goal, he said.

"The water must be cheap enough for the irrigation farmer to make a profit after he gets it or he won't use it," the speaker explained.

Re-elected to the board of supervisors of PC Soil and Water Conservation District was Leon Grissom, present chairman of the board, who presided at the meeting. Grissom is representative to the board from Farwell and Oklahoma Lane areas.

## Effective Jan. 1 --

# Rate Reductions Given By DSCEC

Parmer County is one of three counties to receive a rate reduction from Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative, which will amount to approximately \$40,000 per year in savings to its members, Leo Forrest, manager of the co-op, has announced.

The reductions will affect the farm-home rate, small commercial and irrigation rates. In addition the cooperative plans to refund nearly \$250,000 in cash returns to the membership in Deaf Smith, Parmer and Castro counties.

Although rate increases have been recently sought by Pioneer Gas Company and South-

western Public Service Company, the co-op denied that such had any effect on the decision

since a rate study was begun over a year ago.

Voter Registration Underway In County

Voter registration in Parmer County and the State of Texas began Monday, according to Hugh Moseley, county tax assessor-collector.

There is one change this year, Everyone, including those over 60 years of age, must register.

Because of an amendment last year to the voter registration code, all voters must be registered to vote in elections held on or following Feb. 1, 1968. Deadline for voter registration is Jan. 31, 1968.

The amendment to voter registration eliminated the exemption of persons over 60 years of age residing outside cities over 10,000 population.

All persons 21 years of age and over may register at the county tax office in Farwell. Application blanks were included in the county tax statements mailed last week and others may be obtained by mail by request.

Persons recently moving into Parmer County may register, but will not be eligible to vote in county elections until residing here six months.

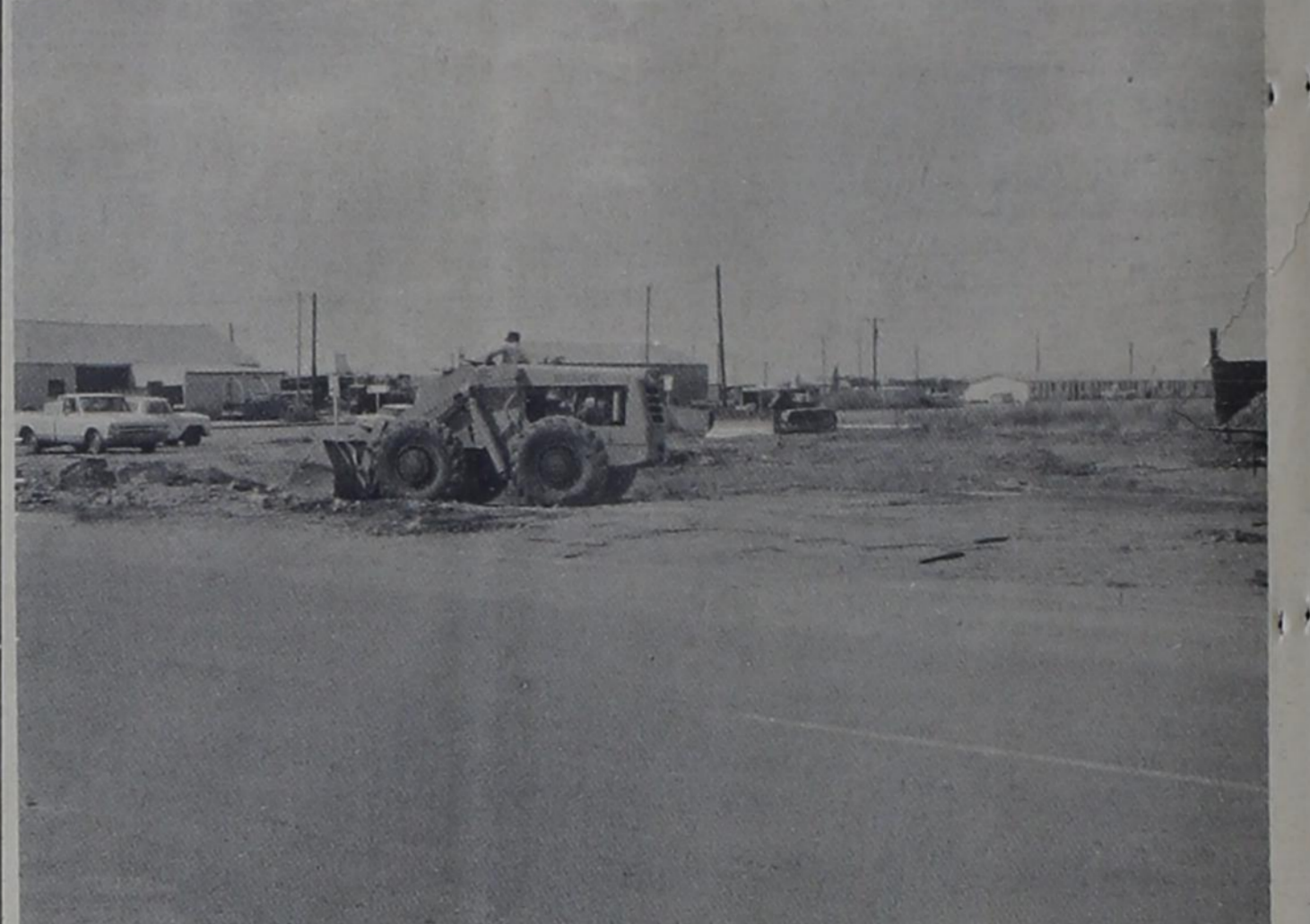
Moseley pointed out that prior

to Feb. 1, 1968, current voter registration certificates must be held in order for a person to vote in any election preceding that time.

The election code changes also makes it an offense for anyone to apply for registration under a fictitious name, or to make an unauthorized

application in the name of another person.

A total of 2700 Parmer County residents registered to vote during 1967.

The rate adjustment will become effective Jan. 1, 1968.

The cooperative has been returning capital credit checks to its members on 10 year pay-back schedule for the past six years on a first in-first out basis. The board of directors has adopted a by-law change which will allow the cooperative to pay up to 50 per cent of the total cash paid back from the most recent years' patronage.

At the annual meeting in April, 1968, over \$145,000 in capital credits for the year 1956 will be returned. In addition to this amount, about \$100,000 in refunds will be paid on patronage for 1967.

This will make about a quarter of a million dollars in cash available to members of the cooperative plus \$40,000 savings in rate decreases, Forrest pointed out. The adjustment was made in order to relieve the financial strain placed on area farmers by depressed market prices and high farm operating costs.

In order to reduce the cost of electrical energy for irrigation pumping, two additional months of one cent electricity have been added. This makes electricity cost the farmer one cent per KWH during the months of October through March. During the months of April through September, the cost will be one and one-half cent per KWH, Forrest said.

Forrest says in its 30 years of operating, the cooperative has never had a rate increase. The only rate adjustments have been decreases.

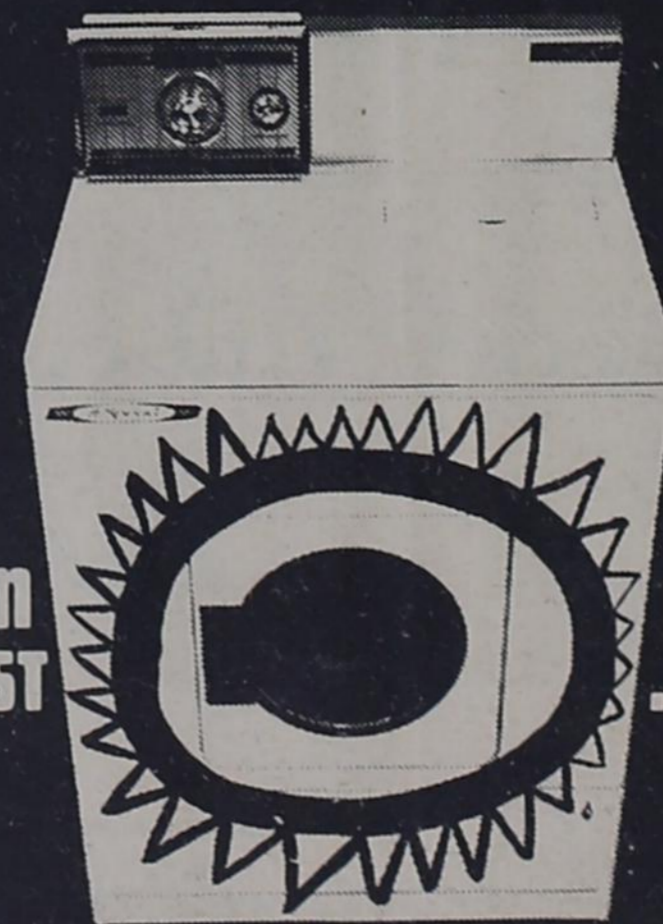

# Residents Get Tax Statements

City of Bovina tax statements were mailed here Friday, according to Mrs. Mary Ruth Martin, city secretary.

Taxes due total \$25,703.68 for the coming year, she said, based on valuations of \$2,234,942.50.

Those paying their city taxes in October at City Hall will receive a three per cent discount.

In November tax payers receive a two per cent discount and in December a one per cent discount. During January, the full amount will be due. Deadline for paying taxes without a penalty is Jan. 31, 1968.

Collecting of taxes last year, percentage-wise, was down somewhat from the year before, Mrs. Martin said.

# Rally Falls Short; Plains Wins, 21-16

A fourth quarter rally by the Bovina Mustangs here Friday night left them just short of victory as the Plains Cowboys emerged with a 21-16 decision in the non-district clash.

The Mustangs, after trailing 21-0 at halftime, made a game of it in the final period as they racked up two touchdowns and raked on double extra points after each.

The loss brought Bovina's record to a 2-2 for the season.

Second half of the game, and especially the final 12 minutes, belonged to Coach Roy Stone's charges, but the Cowboys had built up too much lead in the first two periods for the Ponies to overcome.

Bovina's first TD came on an 18-yard dash by Fullback Carl Harris. Quarterback Daryl Kirkpatrick rolled out on a keeper play for the extras to cut the Plains' lead to 21-8.

The touchdown drive was launched from the Cowboy 47 after Freshman Manuel Quintana, following superb blocking, returned a Plains punt from his own 20 to the 47 in the opposite end of the field. The drive was boosted by a 15 yard penalty against Plains and required five plays with Harris accounting for 30 of the 47 yards.

The fired-up Mustangs got their final scores via the air with Kirkpatrick chunking. He completed four of five passes in the 69-yard drive for 57 yards and then, with the defense loosened up to defend against the

aerials, Kirkpatrick scampered the final 13 yards to paydirt.

The Mustangs got possession of the ball on downs at their own 31, Harris lost three, back to the 28, Kirkpatrick then took to the airways, hitting Halfback Stuart McMeans for eight and Halfback Manuel Quintana for nine.

After one incompletion, pass interference was ruled against the Cowboys on a toss intended to End Mike Grissom giving the Mustangs a gain of 23 yards and a first down on the Plains 30, Kirkpatrick then threw to End Rodney Murphy for 17 yards and a first down on the 13. From there, the quarterback danced into the endzone with the pigskin and the Cowboys' margin was whittled too close for comfort.

After Kirkpatrick ran the extras, the scoring was over at 21-16.

Only 1:38 remained in the game as the Mustangs got their final TD and they were unable to regain possession of the ball before time elapsed.

The Cowboys had a first down on their own 34 when the final whistle blew.

Plains' first touchdown came midway through the initial period. A fumbled punt gave the Cowboys possession on the Mustang 15 and the visitors shoved the ball over from there in four plays. Fullback Doug Jones, the workhorse of the Plains backfield, went over from three yards out. He car-

ried the ball three of the four times in the scoring drive. John Lowe placekicked the extra point to put the Cowboys out front, 7-0.

The second Plains touchdown came with 10:49 remaining in the second period and climaxed an 82-yard drive. Jones went the final yard and the kick was again true to put Plains on top, 14-0.

A Mustang fumble on the Bovina 44 put Plains in position to get its third TD which was scored on the final play of the first half with Jones again banging over from one yard away. The drive took eight plays. Jones had a 28-yard scamper-- from the 30 to the two yard line. Lowe's kick made the score 21-0 as the team's took time out for the halftime intermission.

The third quarter was scoreless.

The Mustangs were handicapped by the absence of two regulars from the lineup. Center Kent Stanberry and Halfback Lynn Murphy saw no action due to knee injuries.

Jones was the game's big offensive gun as he bulled his way for 185 yards of his team's total of 319. He carried the ball from scrimmage 36 times.

Harris led the Bovina ball carriers with a net of 107 yards in 20 attempts. McMeans made five yards in four tries, Kirkpatrick netted eight yards in four carries, Halfback Tommy Sisco made nine yards in three totes and Quintana carried one time for two yards.

Kirkpatrick completed six of 12 passes for 93 yards.

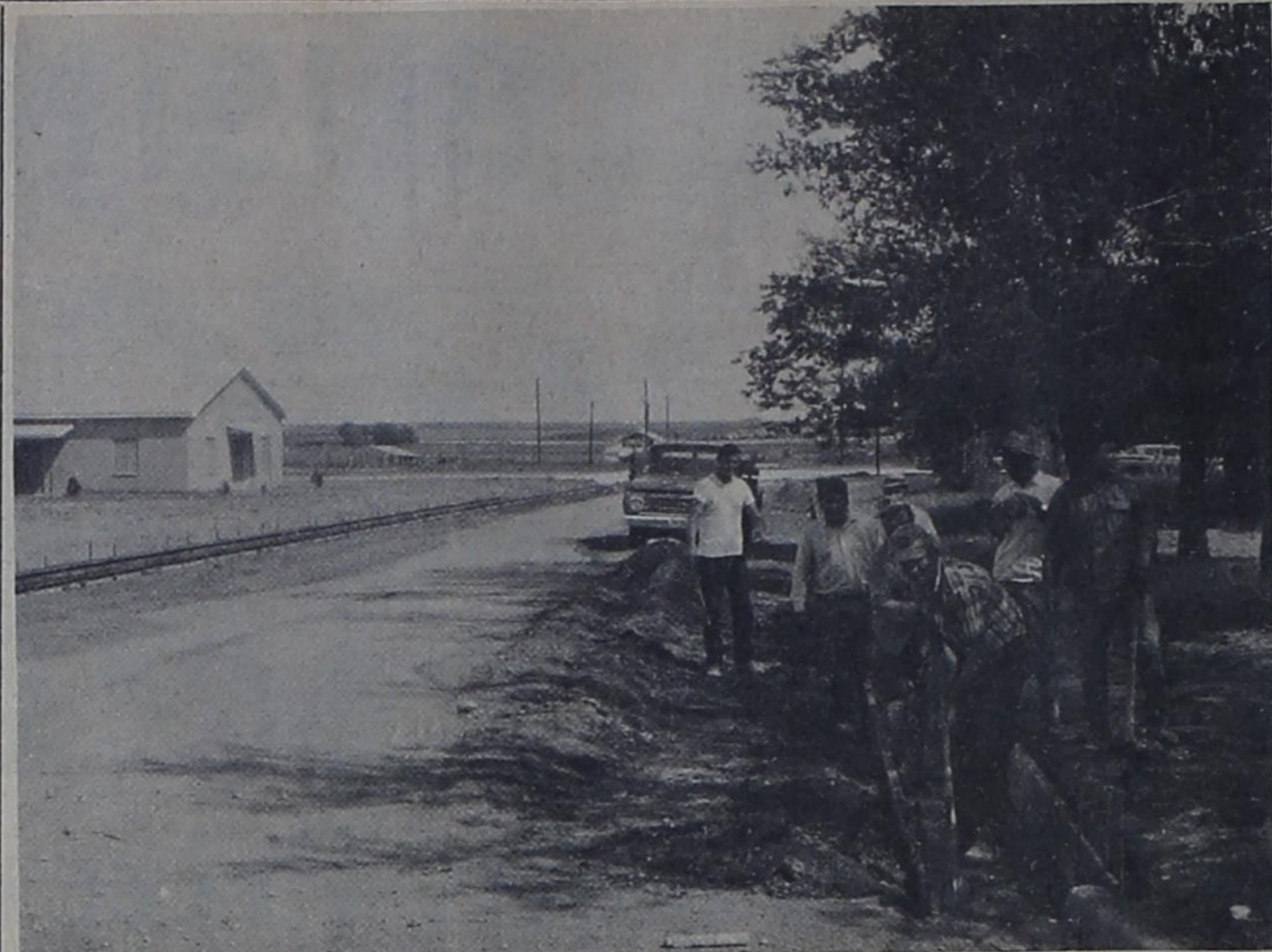

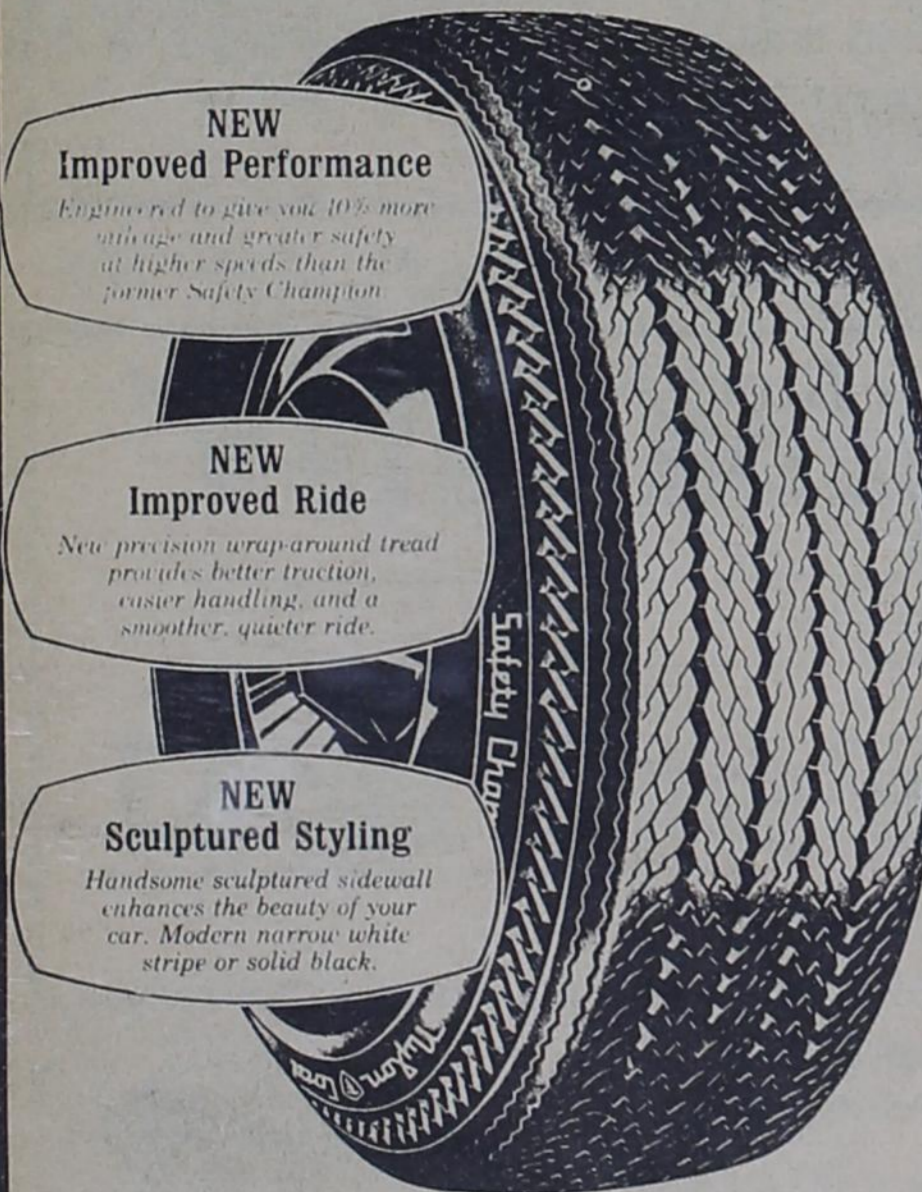
