OIL WELL BROUGHT IN IN EDWARDS COUNTY

Edwards County Leader, June 15: A prominent oil man who is interested in some of the wells now drilling in the Del Rio section, passed through Kocksprings Tuesday, and reported that a six barrel shallow oil well had been brought in not far from Carta Valley. The gentleman was gone before the Leader man had time to interview him, but he told friends here that the well was on the Whitehead Ranch and about 100 yards inside of Edwards County. We have made inquiries and it is reported this new producer is about 10 miles north of Carta Valley and between Carta Valley and the Cash deep well, that was drilled on the Whitehead Ranch several years ago.

Six barrels a day in a deep well would not interest oil men, but the report says this new producer is only some three or four hundred feet deep, which would make it about like the wells in Somerset Field. A great oil field will probably be brought in somewhere between the new Santa Rita gusher that has been brought in in Reagan County, straight south through Western Edwards County to Del Rio, where there are outcroppings of oil.

There are no phones near this alleged new producer and the Leader has had no confirmation of the reports. Further news is awaited with interest.

It is reported that six other wells will be put down near the new producer immediately, and that a pipe line is being considered.

The County Judge was authorized to deed back to Arthur Mosel the old road subject to certain conditions.

Monthly estimate No. 4 on Sec. D for \$3,715.14 was ordered paid to Gordon Alvis.

Miscellaneous claims against Highways 27 and 41 were allowed. Other general claims against the county were also allowed.

Kerr County's pro rata of the salary paid the court stenographer was reduced according to law.

Four Common School District No. 5 school house bonds of \$300 each, held by the permanent school fund, were taken up and destroyed.

Petition for a neighborhood road across Roy Tolle land to the Stowers Ranch was dismissed on motion of the court.

The clerk was ordered to notify subscribers to the County Agent's salary to pay their subscriptions to the County Treasurer by July 15th.

Final estimate on Section C by the McCall-Moore Engineering Company was allowed, subject to acceptance of this section by Federal, State and County Engineers.

The May account of H. Renschel, chairman Special Road Board, for \$304.48 was ordered paid by scrip against Road and Bridge Fund.

Payment of Sherwin-Williams 1922 dip account was finally passed to the August term of court.

All regular election officers were ordered to hold an election on constitutional amendment July 28th.

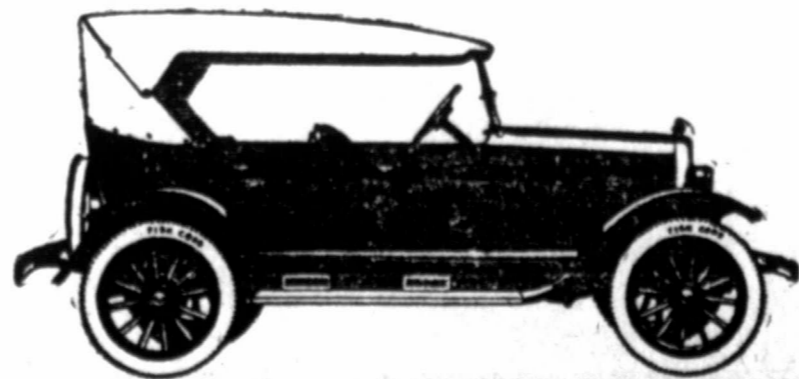

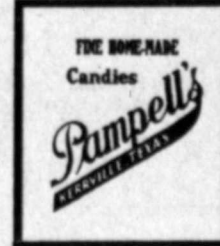

session to make revenue and appropriation conform. This realization had something to do with the votes of some of the members. They did not want another siege and sacrificed the \$2,000,000 out of their original bill.

Adoption of the report was forecast when the House, by a vote of 49 to 56, refused to adopt Patman's motion to reject it. It was later adopted, 74 to 42.

In the Senate the report was adopted by a vote of 21 to 4, the four in opposition being Senators Doyle, Fairchild, Murphy and Wirtz.

Charging that the committee had held its report up until the final day either to cram it down the necks of the House members or to throw on them the responsibility of calling another session, Patman declared that while the committee recommended a cut of 33 1-3 per cent from the public school appropriation it had recommended a cut of only 6 or 7 per cent on the institutions of higher learning.

Lawmakers Not to Be Recalled
Austin, Tex., June 14.—At adjournment Thursday night the Governor, in response to the visit of the usual committees to notify him of dissolution, advised the Legislature that he would not at this time recall them, but expressed the opinion they had provided neither sufficient revenue to meet the appropriations nor placed the appropriations within the available revenues.

The Governor's message is construed to mean that he will at some future time reconvene the 38th Legislature but he gives no hint of the probable date.

The message was brief and after the opinion it also said that in view of the several times he had submitted the matter it seemed futile to call the Legislature again at this time to accomplish the same purposes. It was addressed to both houses and subscribed "Yours most sincerely," reading as follows:

"In answer to your committee, commissioned to advise me that you honorable body is now ready to adjourn, this is to say that I have had no time to make an accurate analysis of the work of this session, as the most important appropriation bills have just reached my desk. A cursory observation, however, leads me to believe that you have neither provided the necessary revenue with which to meet the needed appropriations, nor placed the appropriations within the available revenue. So often have I submitted this proposition to you that I have no hope that you would make 'tongue and buckle meet' should I again reconvene you for this purpose in another special session. I do not feel that we should at this time spend more of the people's money in marching up the legislative hill in a futile effort to do

the thing that ought to be done, but which it seems impossible for you to do.

"Insofar as I have the authority to speak for all the people, I desire to cordially thank those of you who have during these legislative days, stood for truth, justice and right; for law and order, and for all those things that go to make a State both great and good. As you, one and all, reach your respective homes, I sincerely trust you will find your friends and loved ones well and your business not seriously impaired by your absence, occasioned by your service to the State."

Neff Files Four Bills

Austin, Tex., June 18.—Governor Neff approved and filed Monday the bill passed at the third called session of the 38th Legislature making it unlawful to possess for sale, furnishing or giving away the Mexican drug known as marijuana. The bill becomes effective 90 days after date of final adjournment of the third called session.

Other bills approved and filed Monday were: Authorizing any city of 150,000 population or more to disannex unimproved territory. Effective 90 days. Providing for assessment for taxation of property stored in warehouses and places of storage. Warehousemen are required to furnish to the tax assessor a list of all property stored in their warehouses. Effective 90 days. Placing closed season of five years on antelope, mountain sheep, wild pheasant, wild wood duck and prairie chicken. Effective 90 days.
