### ABATE NOT ITS SPIRIT

Garmen (Okla.) Headlight: The shot that was heard around the world continued to reverberate, in fact, grew in volume, until it culminated in that great explosion of unfettered sentiment known as the Declaration of Independence; hence the custom for so many years of marking the anniversary with explosive rites. This tendency, thoroughly fitting for the young and ardent days of the nation, has decreased considerably and has been supplanted by manifestations of the spirit more in keeping with maturity and a thoughtful patriotism.

We may put aside the more extravagant demonstrations, but we must maintain a reverence for the emblems and memories of Independence Day and must not diminish the importance of its principles; otherwise our country will be imperiled. From the standpoint of nationalism, the Fourth of July is by long odds the most important day we celebrate. The annual observance keeps the most sacred of American traditions fresh in the hearts of the people. ### TRAFFIC ORDINANCE

Kerrville, Texas, June 25, 1923. The City Council met in special session on above date with Mayor A. T. Adkins presiding and Commissioners Hal Peterson and C. H. Johnston being present, and the City Council passed the following ordinance, to-wit:

#### ORDINANCE

An Ordinance fixing certain rules and regulations with respect to the operation and parking of motor and other vehicles upon certain designated streets and parts of streets within the city limits of Kerrville, Texas; providing the method of arrest of the violators of such rules, regulations, and the manner in which the offender shall be required to appear before the proper authorities, upon arrest; defining the offense of such rules and regulations and prescribing penalties therefor and the compensation of officers making such arrest, fees and costs in such proceedings, and declaring an emergency.

#### BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF KERRVILLE, TEXAS:

Section 1. That the owners and operators of all motor and other vehicles operating the same within the corporate limits of the City of Kerrville, Texas, from and after the final passage of this ordinance be and they are hereby required in driving and operating cars and other vehicles upon the streets of said city to drive upon the right hand side of the street as

said vehicles are then headed. Except in such cases as it may be necessary to depart from the right hand side of the street in passing other vehicles headed in the same direction.

Section 2. No motor car or other vehicle shall be left standing upon Water Street between Clay and Washington Streets in said city either with or without the operator of such car or vehicle, unless parked as in this ordinance hereinafter provided.

Section 3. In parking a motor or other vehicle upon Water Street between Clay and Washington Streets in said city, the same shall be parked on the right hand side of said Water Street in the direction in which said motor or other vehicle is headed, and as close to the curb as practicable, but in no event at a greater distance than twelve inches therefrom, and at an angle to said curb of about 45 degrees.

Section 4. No motor or other vehicle shall be stopped upon or near the center of the street between the points above defined except where it is necessary for the same to be so stopped to allow the passage of other vehicles and for the purpose of parking and removing such vehicles from the point where the same is parked.

Section 5. No motor or other vehicle being operated upon said Water Street, between the streets above designated, shall be turned from the right hand side to the left hand side of said Water Street at any other point than at the intersection of some other street with said Water Street.

Section 6. Any person violating any of the provisions of the foregoing ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than \$3.00 nor more than \$25.00 for each offense, and in addition to such fine shall be required to pay all costs of such proceedings as hereinafter provided.

Section 7. In case of the arrest of any person for the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, unless such person demand that he be taken before the most accessible officer having jurisdiction of such matter, the arresting officer shall take the name and address of such person and the name of his motor vehicle or description of other vehicle, and notify him, in writing, to appear before the officer designated, at the time and place to be specified in such writing, at least five days subsequent to the date of such notice, and upon promise

in writing of such person to appear at such time and place such officer shall forthwith release him from custody, or said officer may require bond as otherwise provided by State law.

Any person wilfully violating such promise shall be guilty of a misdemeanor regardless of the disposition of the charge upon which he was originally arrested, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$50.00, and each day he fails to appear shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 8. Officers making arrests and trying causes for violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be entitled to the same fees as are provided under the State laws for similar services and all fines imposed and costs incurred may be collected in the same manner as provided under the laws of the State of Texas.

This ordinance shall be cumulative of all other ordinances of the City of Kerrville relating to the same or similar subjects except where such other ordinances shall be in conflict herewith.

The foregoing ordinance was read before and duly considered by the Commissioners, whereupon Commissioner Peterson moved that the rules requiring ordinances to be read three several days be suspended and that said ordinance be placed upon its third reading and final passage, which motion was duly seconded by Commissioner Johnston and said ordinance having been read three times and said motion duly put, the same was unanimously adopted and passed.

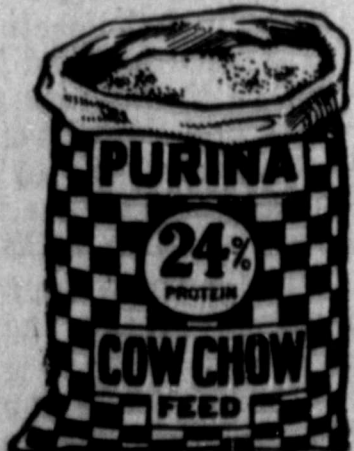
