#### LEVIATHAN FINISHES FIRST TRIP UNDER AMERICAN FLAG

New York, July 24.—The Leviathan has completed her maiden voyage under the American flag.

More than 7,500 persons were at the Hudson River pier where the giant "sea palace" docked.

The running time from Southampton to New York was five days, twelve hours and eleven minutes with an average speed of 23.09 knots an hour.

Her speed from Nantucket to Ambrose Light was 25.07 knots an hour. Captain Herbert Hartley praised the seagoing and maneuvering qualities of his big charge, declaring that not the slightest trouble had been experienced in handling her in and out of foreign ports.

The longest day's run was 605 miles. On another day 601 miles were covered.

Ten stowaways slipped aboard at Cherbourg and Southampton. They were turned over to Ellis Island authorities.

#### LEGION WANTS HOSPITAL INSTEAD OF MONUMENT

Austin, Tex., July 24.—Travis Post of the American Legion has instructed its delegates to the State Convention to be held at Galveston August 23-29, to offer a resolution favoring a Legion memorial building at Austin, instead of a statue or monument, for which the Legislature made appropriation of \$25,000.

Other instructions include the elimination of evils in vocational training program; against discrimination in immigration laws; against families or naturalized citizens who fought in the World War, and that Armistice Day, November 11, be made a National Holiday.

#### YOUTH SLAIN IN EDWARDS COUNTY BY MEXICAN

Del Rio, Tex., July 24.—Frank Kirchgaber, 18, was shot and killed Monday night by an unidentified Mexican. The shooting occurred on the Belcher ranch in Edwards County. A 30-caliber rifle was used.

Young Kirchgaber was a member of a wealthy family, and was well known in this section of the country. He had recently returned from Staunton, Va., where he had attended a military college.

**UNIFICATION IS LIKELY OF TWO METHODIST CHURCHES**

Cleveland, Ohio, July 24.—A plan, which it is believed will ultimately result in the reunion of the Northern and Southern branches of the Methodist Episcopal Church, divided in 1844 over the question of slavery, is ready for presentation to the joint commission on unification at the opening session of its four-day meeting here today.

The results of the meeting will not be made public, it is said, until the plan has been submitted to the general conference of each branch, the second of which will not be held until 1925.

The plan was prepared by a joint committee of sixteen, the members of which are confident that it will be accepted, according to Bishop William F. Anderson of Cincinnati, chairman of the Northern branch of the committee.

"We are confident that we have finally hit upon a plan which will accomplish the object for which we have been striving since 1910," Bishop Anderson said. "Our differences are administrative rather than doctrinal and I am sure our plan will enable the two branches to dovetail perfectly."
