MORE MONEY IN BETTER FLOCKS

Farm and Ranch: From the number of outstanding purebred sheep and goats disposed of at the sale held in conjunction with the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association in Rel Rio, the Southwestern Texas sheep and goat ranchmen are thoroughly sold on the idea that there is profit in better animals. Breeding up the sheep and goat flocks to a higher standard means an addition of many thousands of dollars to net returns from wool, mohair, mutton and chevon. Running scrubs on the range pays only when prices are high. A sheep that will shear from five to six pounds of fine wool eats no more than a scrub that shears much less of a poorer grade of wool. Better sheep and goats will permit ranchers to keep fewer aninals while they make the same profit or better. And it only takes a casual observer to note that many ranches are overstocked.

Speaking of overstocked ranches, attention is called to the remark of an experienced veterinarian who said that under-fed sheep and goats were easy victims of disease and that the ranchman who overstocked with the view of increasing his profits was the man who suffered the greatest losses from disease. It seems that the best way to increase profits is to adopt the slogan, "Fewer but better sheep and goats," and then live up to it.
