

WAR ON MOSQUITOES DECLARED

Mosquitoes constitute not only an | jardiniers, in which potted plants are mosquitoes constitute not only an insufferable nuisance, but also a ser-ious menace to health. The city has, therefore, passed an ordinance making it a misdemeanor to breed mosquitoes on any premise within the city limits.

it a misdemeanor to breed mosquitoes on any premise within the city limits. Mosquitoes breed only in standing water. The eggs are laid on the wa-ter and hatch into "wiggle tails" which grow to a length of about half an inch. The "wiggle tails" change into pupae or "tumblers" in about five to seven days and two days later emerge as adult mosquitoes, ready to torment the nearest victims by their bites, and to transmit disease if the

bites, and to transmit disease if the germs are available. Mosquitoes do

germs are available. Mosquitoes do not breed in weeds, or in water where fish are present. They merely hide in weeds after they have been bred out from nearby standing water. Mosquitoes fly for very short dis-tances, seldom over one hundred yards. Therefore if you are both-ered by mosquitoes they are bred somewhere on your own premise or on the property of one of your nearby the property of one of your nearby the property always on your own ered by mosquitoes they are bred somewhere on your own premise or on the property of one of your nearby neighbors, nearly always on your own block. If you notice even a few mos-quitoes, call 322 or 221-Red and an inspector will search your neighbor-hood for their source within a few days. Within a week you should no-tice a marked reduction. If you do

not, call again.

An inspector will visit every pre-mise in the city for mosquito-breed-ing places at intervals of two or three weeks. He is authorized to search weeks. owner of any premises in the City of Kerrville, or the agent of the owner, if the owner be a non-resident or absent from the city, to cause, suffer or per-mit any collection of standing, or flowing water in which mosquitoes breed, or are likely to breed, unless such collection of water is treated in the manner prescribed hereinafter, so as to prevent the breeding of mosquitoes, and any such collection of water so unlawfully maintained is hereby declared to be a nuisance. SECTION 2: DEFINING COLLEC-

TION OF WATER. That the collection of water to be

considered as coming within the terms of this Ordinance are those waters which are contained in ditches, ponds, pools, excavations, holes, depressions, cesspools, privy vaults, fountains, basements, cisterns, tanks, shallow wells, barrels, troughs, urns, receptacles in which potted plants or flowers are placed, cans, boxes, bottles were willing to die that a future of gutters, tanks of flush closets, auto-+ mobile casings, or any other water containers.

SECTION 3: METHOD OF TREAT-MENT. That the methods of treat-ment of any such collection of water

ment of any such collection of water for the purpose of preventing the breeding of mosquitoes may be one or more of the following: (a) Complete abolition of water containers described in Section 2, hereof, when in the opinion of the Health Officer of the City of Kerr-ville, or his duly authorized represen-tative, such containers are unneces-sary, or constitute a menace to the sary, or constitute a menace to the health of the City.

(b) Complete emptying of un-screened, or untreated, containers, to-gether with their thorough drying, or

cleaning, every four days. (c) Screening with wire netting of at least sixteen (16) meshes to the inch, one way, or any other material which will effectively prevent the in-

gress, or egress of mosquitoes. (d) Using an approved larvicide. (e) Covering completely the sur-face of the water with Kerosene, Petroleum or Paraffine Oil, once every

troleum or Paraffine Oil, once every seven (7) days. (f) Cleaning and keeping suffi-ciently free of vegetable growth and other obstructions, and stocking with mosquito-destroying fish; absence of half-grown mosquito larvae to be evi-dence of compliance with the measure. (g) Filling, or draining, the de-pressions or containers.
