Schreiner Wool & Mohair Commission Company Ship Ninety-Three Cars Containing 3,052,696 Pounds of Spring Clip of Wool and Mohair-Fall Clip To Begin **Coming In Within Next Few Weeks.**

Thursday of last week the Schreiner Wool & Mohair Commission Company finished loading out the last shipment of the spring clip of wool, which was consigned to Boston. This shipment was made to clear the large warehouses of the company to make room for the fall clip of wool and mohair, which will begin coming in within the next few weeks. The shipment was consigned, as market conditions were not favorable for a sale at the present time.

A million and a half pounds made up the shipment, which took fifty cars to carry, and required the services of ELECTRIC FIRE ALARM SIREN




Another reason perhaps why Mr. Tyrrell picked out this particular route is because it is on the Old Span-Baker, H. Remschel, Gus Schreiner and others. ish Trail, in which he has always shown deep interest. While the road to Junction is the main route west along the O. S. T., the road from Kerrville, via Medina City and Bandera and back to San Antonio, is what is known as Tourist Loop No. 10 of the O. S. T., so naturally the entire trip is over the Old Spanish Trail.

While perhaps this trip offers a greater variety of scenery than can be found on any other motoring jaunt in the vicinity of San Antonio, yet the mileage, approximately 260 miles, does not place it in the class of one-

While the road from Kerrville to Bandera via Medina City has not been officially logged, yet the O. S. T. markings, the familiar red, white and yellow, are painted on posts along the entire route all the way to San Antonio, so there is no necessity for one to get off the right road.

Coming from Kerrville to San Antonio via Medina City, the road branches to the right from the main highway just outside Kerrville and is plainly marked. It winds up through the hills, with the stately Schreiner home high up on the right. The road is well marked all the way to Medina City and Bandera and on back to San Antonio. It is needless to say that there are perhaps more camping, hunting and fishing spots along this route than can be found on any other drive around San Antonio.

If there are any of you motorists who have never made a trip over the route as described, do so and then see if you do not think that Percy Tyrrell showed good judgment in his selection of "My Favorite Trip."

In this system of educational ideals and policies, the junior college holds an important place, and renders a dis-

tinctive service 1. It is of special value because of its accessibility. The boys complet-ing their high school course do not need to go far from home and are not thrown immediately upon their own responsibility, as would be the case in a great college community. This is a great boon to parents who desire that their sons shall continue their education without interruption, and yet because of the immaturity of the boys would be reluctant to send them far away or have them assume at once the responsibility of self-direction. Washington, D. C., Aug. 27 .- In order that photographs of the solar eclipse next month may be assured to science, regardless of atmospheric conditions prevailing at the time, the War Department has decided to use its air service and personnel in a way that is regarded as certain of success in picturing the phenomenon and ob-taining valuable data for use by scientific organizations.

ECLIPSE PICTURES TO BE

TAKEN 20,000 FEET IN AIR

The project, as suggested by Maj. Gen. Patrick, chief of the army air service, provides for the sending of Lieut. John A. MacReady, holder of the world's altitude record, and Lieut., A. W. Stevens, an expert aerial photographer, to a height of 20,000 feet to make the photographs during the

eclipse. The flight will take place at Rock-wall Field, San Diego, Cal. September 10, in the area of the total eclipse. From this altitude on a clear day,

it will be possible to obtain photo-graphs of the earth, surface features and shadows for a considerable part of the interval between the beginning of the eclipse and the totality.

The moon's shadow will pass over the surface of the earth at a speed of more than 1,000 miles an hour. From an elevation of 20,000 feet. Lieut. Stevens should see the shadow for more than a minute and be able to secure photographs of it in its stages of approach. Should there be clouds between the airplane and the ground, it is expected that photographs of the moon's shadow thrown on the intervening clouds will be obtained. During the translation, after the shadow has passed, a filter will be used and photographs made of the sun itself in an effort to get effects of the photospheric, protuberances, omopsere and corona.
