Saturday's primary elections brought about a minimum of surprises concerning the number of candidates and three referendum proposals at stake.

The Democrats named Don Yarborough and Preston Smith to meet in a runoff June 1 to determine who will carry the Democratic colors into the general election wars against the GOP's Paul Eggers.

Yarborough was the vote-totaller leader in the first primary, but only by a small margin. Smith can be expected to pick up a much higher percentage of votes from the other candidates than can his opponent.

However, Yarborough could upset the present lieutenant governor if his supporters are more dedicated and turn out to vote better than do Smith's.

In a nutshell, this appears to us as the only way for Yarborough to win.

A good campaign between now and June 1 can't hurt either of the candidate's chances, though, we'll admit.

Yarborough supporters in this county and area are about as scarce as those often-mentioned hen's teeth. Those who favor the Houston lawyer aren't overly vocal in their support because of the tremendous odds against them locally.

Most of Smith's support in this area comes about, we think, because he's from Lubbock. His ads have pointed out, in some cases, that this may be "the last chance to elect a governor from West Texas."

That's good and it could possibly be of some benefit to our county and area to have Smith in the governor's chair.

Ironically, Smith said himself, in a campaign speech in Parmer County several weeks ago, "Don't vote for Preston Smith because he's a good ol' boy and from West Texas."

We think enough of Smith that we're going to take his word for how to vote and cast our ballot with the local minority . . . for Yarborough.

We think he has better ideas about getting Texas off dead center and moving toward a progressive future.

With all due respect for Smith, and we do respect him and his public service to now, we have the impression that his administration would be too much same-o, same-o when creative and imaginative plans can be put into effect which will be of greater benefit to the great State of Texas and its citizens.

Some of the things included in Yarborough's plans:

- FOR increased old age assistance;
- FOR a special agency to bring new industry to small towns;
- FOR lower car insurance rates;
- FOR a teacher's pay raise;
- FOR state ambassadors to bring in more tourists;
- FOR improved agriculture programs;
- FOR state supported kindergartens;
- FOR bilingual education programs;
- FOR programs to use senior citizen talent bank;
- FOR strong crime prevention procedures.

There are many others, but those who possibly give many people reason(s) to support him.

Incidentally, Yarborough ran much stronger in Bovina's voting precinct than he did any where else in the county Saturday.

His overall vote total in Parmer County wasn't enough to write home about, we'll admit. It was 138. But of that amount, 53 of the votes --- more than one-third --- were cast in the Bovina box.

Bovinians gave Yarborough more votes than did both Farwell and Friona combined. And those two boxes each had a higher total turnout than did the box here.

Disappointing was the voter turnout here Saturday, especially Democratic speaking.

Two years ago, in the last primary election, Bovina's box led the county with a total of 433. And that was down from the record of 439 which was set in '62. The total this year was 314.

We realize, of course, that no local race this year kept

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Parmer Likes Smith, Nix Referendums

126 Ballots Cast By GOPs

Republicans held primary elections in Parmer County Saturday, and for the first time in history in Bovina, with 126 votes cast in four boxes.

Friona counted 34 votes, Laz-buddie 46, Bovina 26 and Farwell 20.

Paul Eggers walked away with the Republican nomination for governor in Parmer County, as he did over the state. He received 85 votes here, while John R. Tice got 18 and Wallace Sisk 16.

Bob Price, uncontested for Congress, 18th District, received 115.

No other contests appeared on the ballot, but candidates were approved to run for state offices.

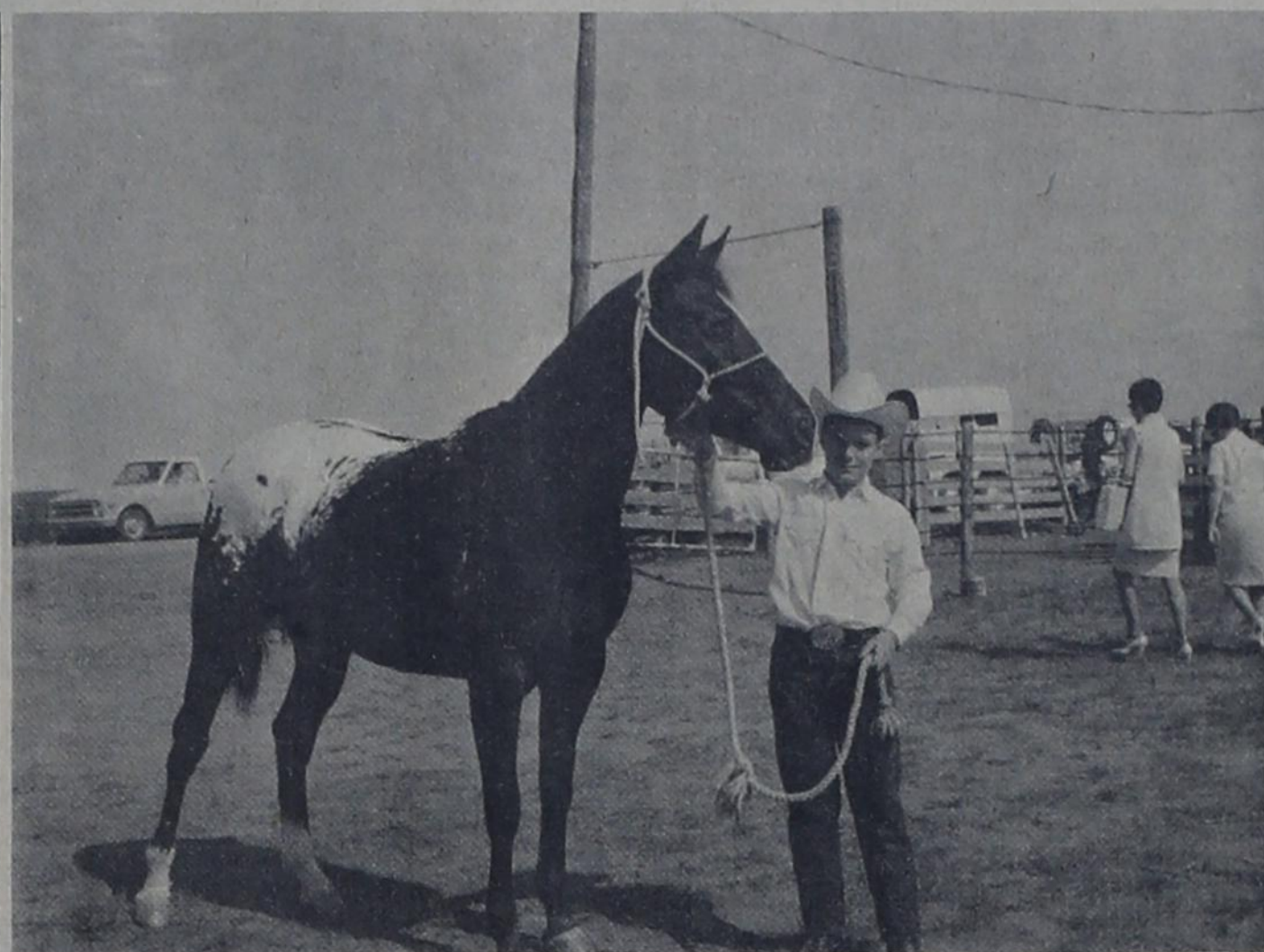
In the liquor by the drink

For pari-mutuel wagering, 25 voted for, 97 against.

Opinion was also voiced against milk price control, with 10 voting for, 111 against.

Voting Lighter Than Expected

Voters totaling 1726 marked their ballots in the Democratic Primary election in Parmer County Saturday, giving the nod to Preston Smith for governor and showing one-sided opinions against all three referendums.

The turnout was much lighter than had been expected since well over 3,000 persons had registered to vote in the county this year.

In the county's only contested

race, Guy Cox, the incumbent, was named the Democratic nominee over Neil Stewart in Precinct No. 3 (Farwell and Oklahoma Lane.)

Cox received a total of 356 votes to 179 for Stewart. Cox will now meet the Republican nominee, R. L. (Bob) Jones in the general election in November.

In the Farwell box, the vote totals were 256 for Cox and 132 for Stewart. Cox also led at Oklahoma Lane, 71-42, and in the absentee ballots, 29-5.

Trustees Hire Two Teachers

Two additional teachers were offered contracts for the '68-'69 school term at a meeting of the school board Monday night.

Mrs. Aletha Birkelbach, who will be graduated from Texas Tech this spring, was named as a junior high math instructor.

Signed to teach junior high and high school English was Mrs. Colleen Axe, who will receive her degree from Eastern New Mexico University at Portales this spring. Mrs. Axe is a resident of Texico.

The board accepted a bid from Jimmy Maynard of Friona to landscape the grounds of Ridgelea Elementary School. Grass and shrubbery will be planted with the work slated to begin when the present school term is completed, according to Superintendent L. F. Jacobs.

Board members also voted to install a night light at the rear of the new Ridgelea school.

Smith led the candidates for the Democratic nomination for governor with 701 votes in the county. He also led all individual boxes in the county.

Next in line in this county was Waggoner Carr's 389. In third spot was John Hill's 149, followed by Don Yarborough with 138, Dolph Briscoe with 129, Eugene Locke 102, Ed Whittenburg 71, Pat O'Daniel 65, Mrs. Jackworth three and Veloz none.

Parmer County's trend was not set throughout the state, however, since Don Yarborough emerged with the most votes over Preston Smith. They will meet in a run-off election June 1, the winner of which will campaign against Paul Eggers, the Republican choice.

Parmer County turned thumbs down on liquor by the drink, 394 for, 1,209 against. Again the state trend did not match this county's, since the referendum, or opinion of the people, was favorable after all votes were counted. Large city votes were reported to have turned the tide.

The voters in this county did, however, go along with the state in opposing pari-mutuel wagering along with horse racing, and control of wholesale and retail milk prices.

Horse racing was vetoed in Parmer County 397 for, 1202 against. In the milk referendum 298 voted for controls, 1149 against in the county.

Like the state, there was no doubt whom the Demos wanted for their lieutenant governor nominee, Ben Barnes walked off with 1282 Parmer votes, compared to 223 for Smith and 85 for Gladden.

Parmer County favored Robert S. Calvert for Comptroller over Dallas Blankenship 1151 to 152; Matt Davis over Sears McGee for Supreme Court, Place 1, 867 to 398; James G. Denton over Tom Reavley for Supreme Court, Place 2, 712 to 538.

A complete tabulation form showing voting by precincts in Parmer County appears in this week's issue.

The convention will name four delegates to the state convention.

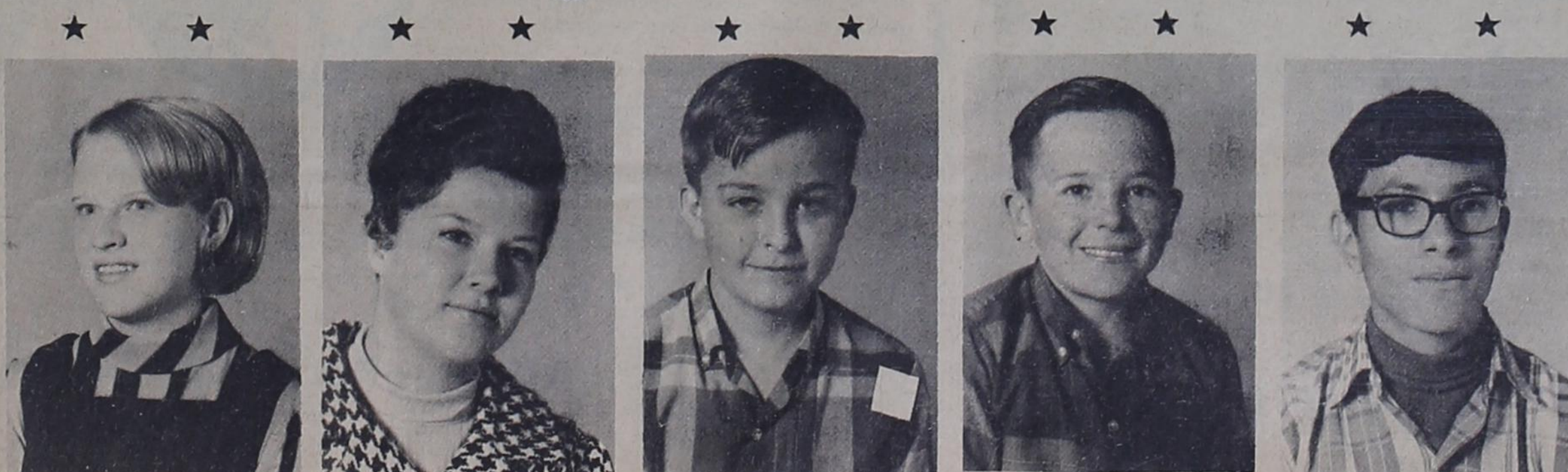

Too, some of the people who would have probably voted in the Demo primary went this year to the Republican primary which was held here for the first time. Twenty-six voted in the GOP box here.

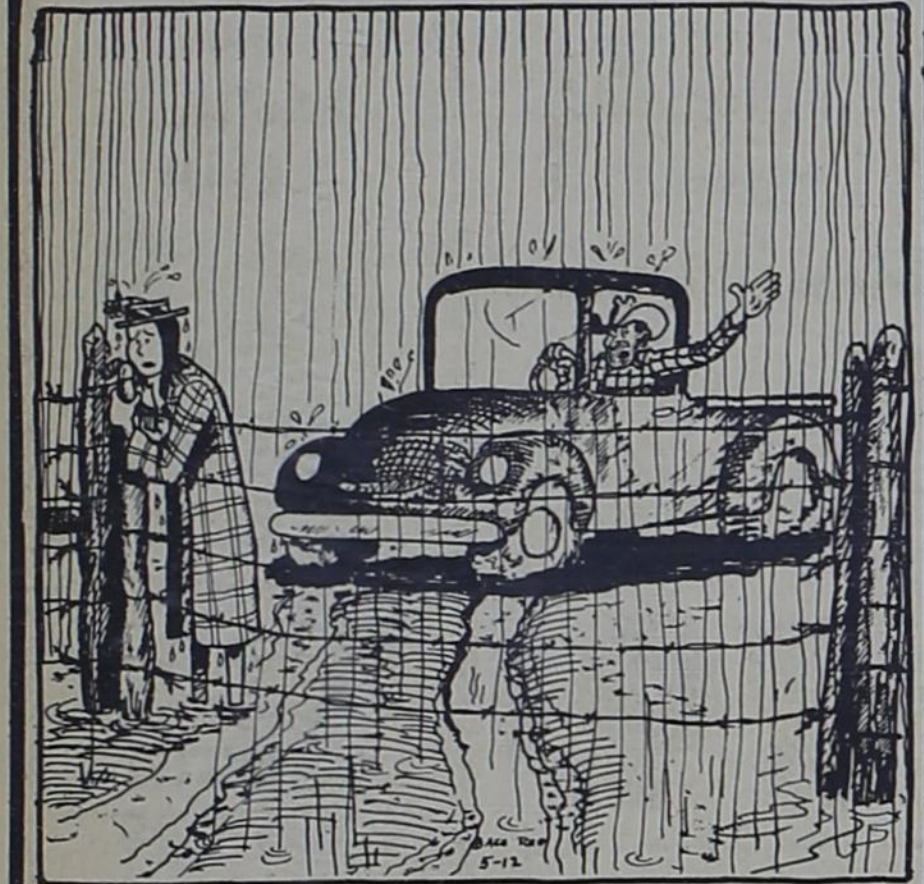
That number, believe it or

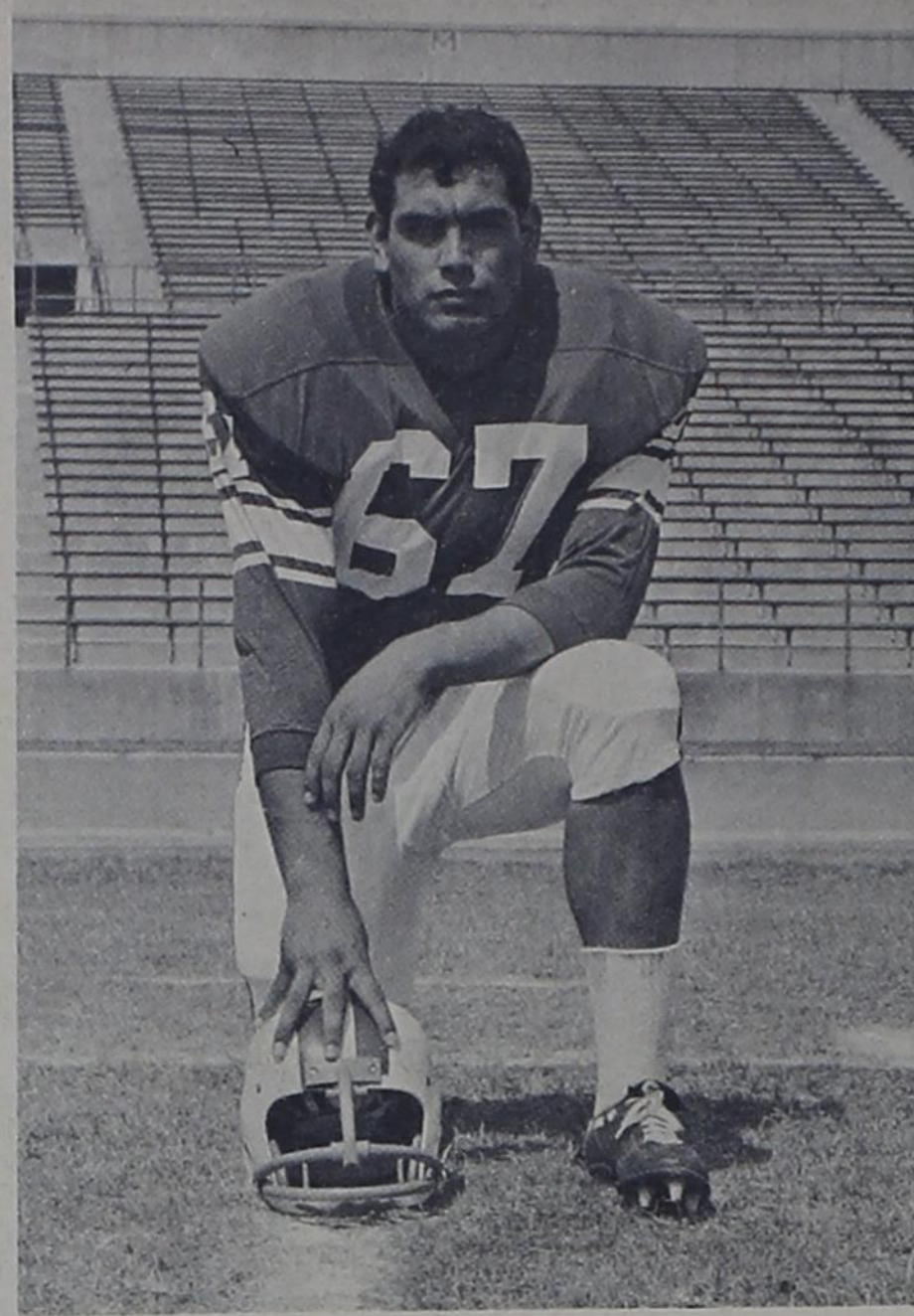

Leather has a built-in "air-conditioning" system, its million of tiny natural pores permit a continuous change of air inside the shoe, while simultaneously absorbing foot moisture. The breathing action keeps feet dry and helps prevent chafing and blistering.

For sightseeing the current crop of leather pumps and sandals prove good. They're available in leather, from sporty brushed, waxy and antiqued leathers to the dressier smooth, suede and real patent leather finishes.

Good walking shoes need not be dull.

Color at your feet for Summer '68 includes the pales, (grey, pink, banana cream, nude) and the brights (poster green, yellow, orange, azalea), reports Mrs. Taylor. Also stepping lively will be navy, dark brown, red and, of course, white.

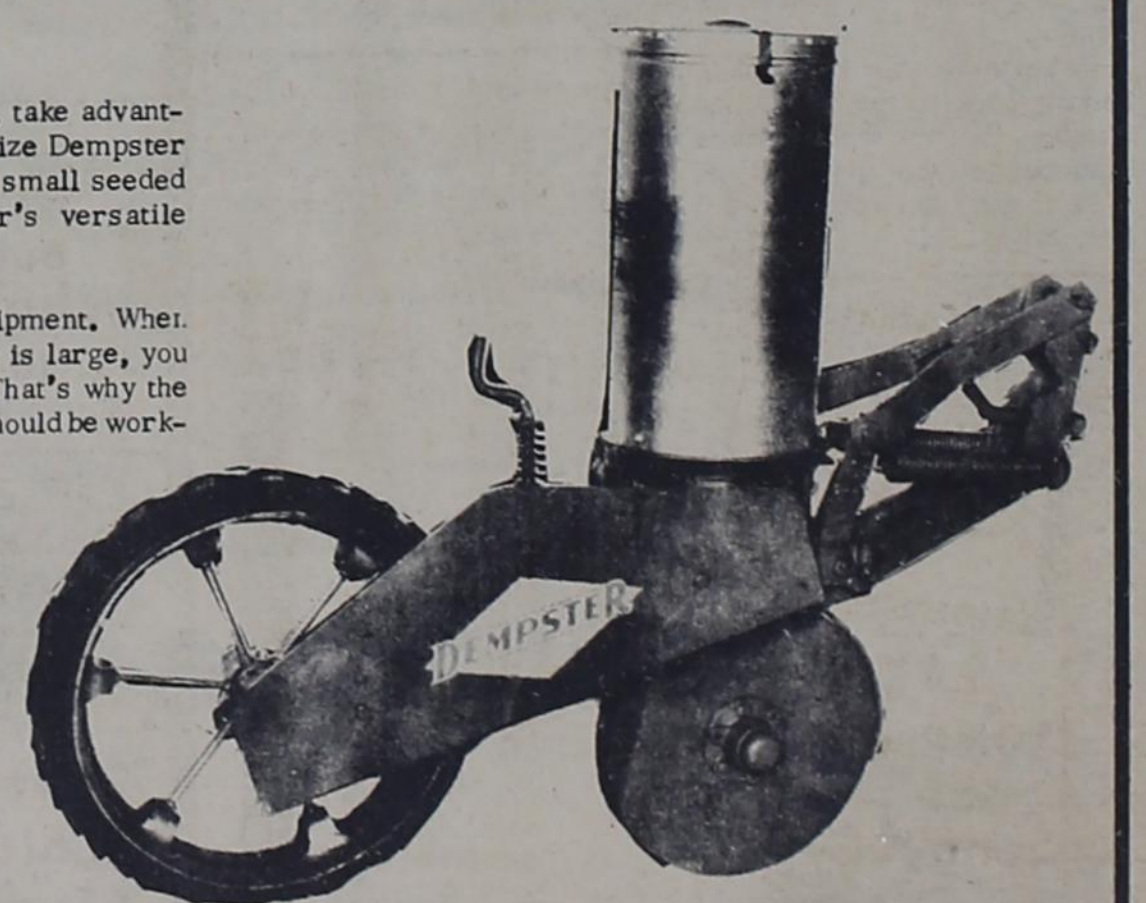

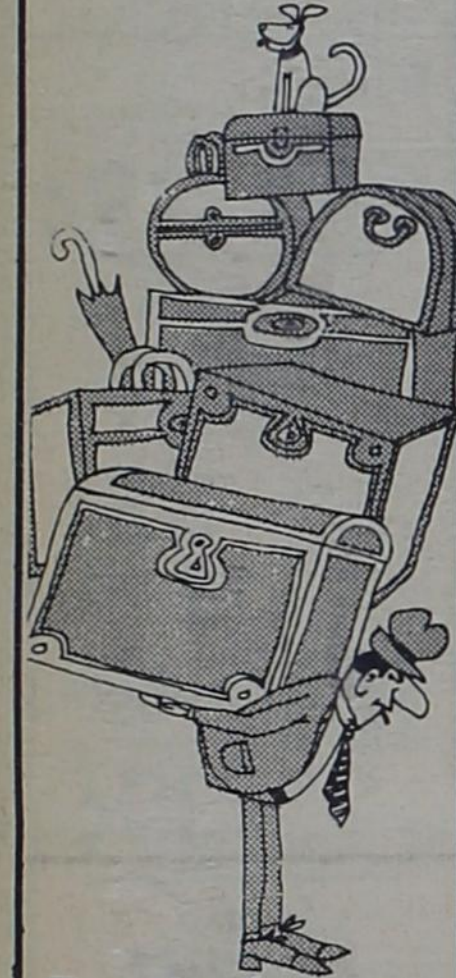

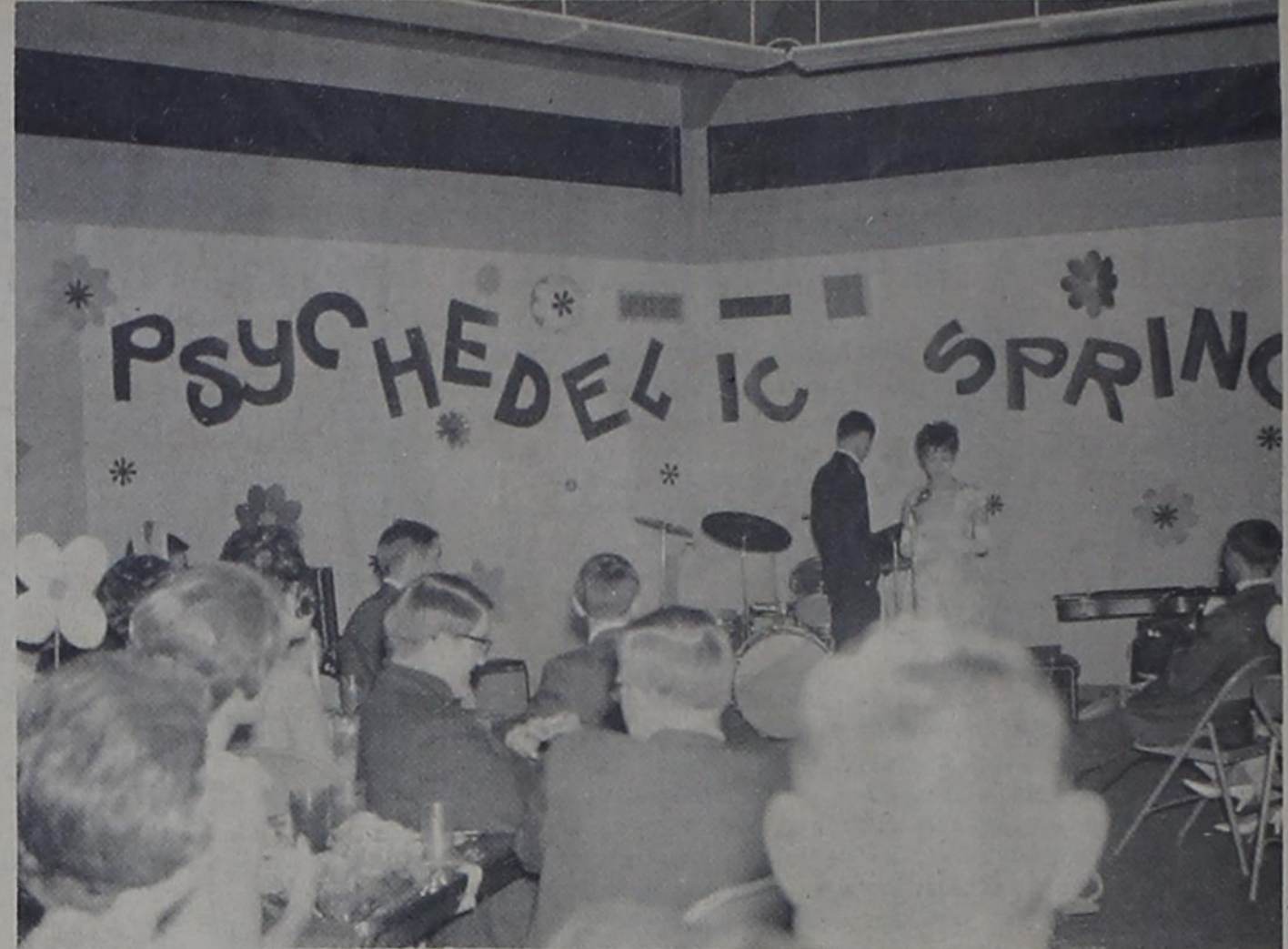

The Miracle

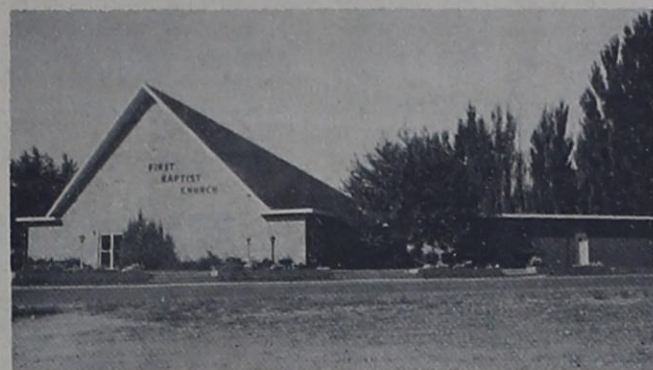
