



But, all of you can't draw the princely poor feed of an editor—so this is a tip that you might beat him raising hens, hogs, cows and goats.

The Menard Messenger: Our idea of a "model boy" will probably not coincide with yours. Our idea of a model boy is preferably a red-headed one, with at least one toe-nail knocked off, his face and hands dirty, his clothes torn, his hair tousled, one tooth knocked out, and always hungry. "WHY AMERICA SHOULD PROHIBIT FOREIGN IMMI-GRATION FOR FIVE YEARS"

Below is given the text of the theme written by Charles Coppock of this city which won second prize in the State-wide contest conducted by the American Legion:

In this age of international unrest and complex uncertainties; of great problems, their solutions hanging in the balance for lack of decisive judgment and the absence of co-operation among the disrupted functions of society, the immigration situation becomes, in America, a disturbing menace to the foundations of our National unity and, like divers other interna-tional problems, its solution remains thus far a complex enigma.

The American citizen, through the perseverance of the press, and the lung-power of our esteemed solons, has become invested with a fair conception of the import and forbidding possibilities of this question, looming up on the near horizon in the form of a red cloud of radical smoke with its chaotic accompaniment of anarchistic mutterings. With these great questions unsolved, civilization is advancing by slow and tortuous stages, the commerce of the world is insecur and war and anarchy lurk in every corner of the globe.

Through the gold and influence of America's "big interests," there has been, and is being imported a vast of alien workers, idlers and strife-stirrers who lodge in colonies in those organic centers of industry-the cities, there to live, not citizens, but foreigners in principles, ideas and customs. It is easily seen that these nondescript races, with anarchistic heritage, constitute a dire menace—an army, slow-moving and treacherous—which, if their condition is not altered for the better in the next five years or so, will undermine the ideals and fundamental principles of American citizenship and precipitate our cherished traditions in the

To the thoughtlessly optimistic it seems but plausible that America has only to assimilate these peoples, deport the undesirables, and Americanize the useful classes. True, but the Government must have time-not less than five years-in which to accomplish this. Hence, for at least half of the next decade foreign immigration to America must be prohibited if the inevitable consequences are to be

In prohibiting foreign immigration for a period of five years, America will be assisting in a large way the recuperation of Europe's war-devastated areas. It is small wonder that the European nations have been slow in recovering to an economic, political, and social basis, when their most useful citizens are forsaking their enterprises and coming to Americathat fabled land of opportunities-in hope of material betterment. If the races of those countries are forced to accept the inevitable, we may feel secure in the faith that they will adapt vironments, and imbibe the spirit of reconstruction and reorganization.

In America the native laborer, having been deprived of his rightful heritage and employment by the lower living-standards of the alien, will, with the more equal distribution and apportionment of foreign labor, be restored to his rightful position with a more satisfactory wage.

Five years of barred immigration

will, with the upbuilding of European countries, and the revival of trade between the Old World and the New,

and with the renewal of international relationship among these nations, become a dominant instrument in the realization of the providences of a World peace.

"We are asking for candy, fruit, nuts, small cakes with nuts in them (or any small cakes that will keep). socks, ties, children's toys, children's stockings (ages, two to eight years), fountain pens, pencils, stationery, cigarettes, bath robes made of blankets or turkish cloth, razor blades, talcum powder, tooth paste, shaving cream, outing flannel pajamas, and bed room slippers. Each boy has his own locker but no coat hangers, so we could use many. Some money for decorations, etc., would be acceptable. Checks from the State Hospital Fund will help supply the needs of the patients.

"My plan is to have a boy act as Secretary in each ward and find out what each man needs; for instance, not give a bath robe to a man if he has one. In this way, they will be more like individual gifts.

"Please fix these packages just the same as if they were for your own boys. Gifts tied with the silver or gold thread or ribbon, wrapped in tissue paper, stickers, etc., on them, make the boys feel that we have not forgotten what they did for us.

"Christmas boxes should be carefully marked with the name and address of the Unit sending and adiressed to me (Mrs. H. H. Kuhlmann) Kerrville, Texas. All perishable things should reach us not later than December 18th. Our tree (if we have it in the city), will be on December 23rd, the ones at the hospital on December 24th. The children of patients at the hospital cannot attend the tree

"Of course some of these men on the outside don't need any help, but others do. We have some big problems here, but have so many lovely boxes sent in from units with things for mothers and babies. Boxes for the welfare work have been sent by units at the following places: Wellngton, a box (weight 250 pounds), with quilts, pillows, blankets and lothing; four boxes from Colorado; three from Galveston; Port Arthur; a box of cake from Gonzales; Denison, sleeping caps; Westhoff, sleeping caps; Mercedes; Austin; and Amarillo sent a box of warm baby clothes.
