GOAT AND SHEEP INTER-BREED ON HAYS RANCH

Democrat-Voice (Coleman, Texas): Is nature changing her ways? May-be so. J. S. Hays, who ranches on the Colorado River near Waldrip, thinks



"So, in June, 1900, we launched into the goat and mohair business. Soon we found that the wolves, Mexicans, lightning and cold rains would reduce the herds, but with all this trouble, we found them money-makers.

"By that time we had other goat men in the country. The cow man, who had goats, sent us word he had sold his ranch, was taking his cattle to New Mexico, and would sell his Angoras.

"We divided the goats into three classes at different prices and fig-ured a total of \$2,001.75 for the lot. I wrote my check for \$2,000, handed it to the cow man, but he said: "No, sir!" Made me dig up the \$1.75 in change. That was in the fall and the goats were in the wool. Next spring we sheared, sold the old does, chevons and mohair for \$2,000; kidded out and had about one thousand head of that flock left that stood us only \$1.75. So the next fall I wrote the cow man in New Mexico that I was still out my \$1.75, but that he had a good case against me, for I had gotten his goats for nothing.

"The milk goat men say goats are 'the poor man's cow,' but I will say right here:

"If a poor man wants a bank account, he can have it by going into the Angora goat business. From my own personal knowledge I can name man after man in this country who started with a few Angora goats and are now ranch owners, with cattle, sheep and goats on their ranges, and are well-to-do.


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
