Overwhelming majorities were re-turned for all of the present city of-ficials in the election held at the Court House Tuesday. A total of 477 votes were polled, being a little over half the estimated voting strength of the city. In the race for Mayor, A. T. Ad-kins, present incumbent, defeated O. A. Morris for the second time by a decisive majority. Adkins polled 335


decisive majority. Adkins polled 335 votes against 136 for Morris, giving him a margin of 199.







Give Your Fowls Charcoal Nelle Portrey in Farm and Ranch: We have found that if charcoal is

fed and kept before the laying hens at all times—just as carefully as the oyster shell is kept before them—all sorts of digestive troubles will be lessened, if not entirely done away with. The charcoal has a tendency to sweeten the digestive tract and do away with gases, thus preventing food from spoiling in the crop. Charcoal is inexpensive, yet many

poultry owners will empty the wood ashes in the poultry yards, simply for the amount of charcoal the fowls will and only a very small percentage of the ashes is charcoal. But it is often advisable to empty the ashes in the dust bath as then the ashes provide a good way for the birds to rid themselves of lice and mites, by dusting in
