Retail Merchants' Association

At the first meeting of the year, in April, 1923, a resolution was introduced and was adopted that all business houses co-operate in having a retail merchants' credit rating system for Kerrville, for the guidance of credit business and for the higher credit rating of individuals; that a card in-dex system be prepared by the secre-tary, assisted by a committee of credit merchants, containing information for the regulating of credit to residents, and to get ratings on newcomers from their home towns.

On May 15, 1923, this organization was perfected, officers elected and secretary employed. The Chamber of Commerce recognized this offspring, although this organization is operated under a separate fund. The result of having a Retail Merchants' Association has been a closer co-operation of business interests and a great help to individuals in obtaining credit under circumstances not so advantageous, Their budget for the year was about \$408. and included office expenses, \$305; National and State membership dues, \$61.25; stationery and stamps, \$39.00.





Methodist Encampment The report that the West Texas Methodist Conference was looking for a site for the location of a permanent summer encampment was enough to occasion the progressive Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors to hold a meeting July 23, 1923, to consider getting them located at Kerrville. A committee was appointed to act with the one from the local Methodist Church to bring about this result. A proposition was made to deed them the site, and this was passed on at the annual Methodist Conference Assembly held at Gonzales, Oct. 24, 1923. At this Conference Assembly, a com-mittee of ten men, called the Board of Trustees, was entrusted with the of Trustees, was entrusted with the locating of this site. After numerous meetings of this committee of ten with the Board of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce and the special locating committee, E. L. Sublett and A. B. Williamson, the Bud Porter tract, consisting of 160 acres, together with 40 acres from the hill of the J. J. Starkey tract, was selected, and J. Starkey tract, was selected and deeded to this encampment associaion. The site cost \$11,500 and was donated by citizens of Kerr County and those whose interests are here. Feb. 22nd when the encampment fund list was canvassed it was noted there was an overplus of \$1,400, which was voted to be kept in the treasury to be used for some similar purpose, with the consent of the individual donors.
