A few more hot, dry days that have a little moisture burning wind with them and area agriculturists will be getting serious about that May 20 wind. Weatherman Willie Williams promised them last week.

One diehard Yarborough supporter says he hasn't yet figured out how people who were farming in the '50's when a fellow named Benson was secretary of agriculture could vote for a man named Bentsen for senator.

There's a story in the paper this week about the city council calling for the opinion of the people in regard to the one per cent sales tax for Bovina. The Blade will make every effort to offer ample information about the tax between now and the June 6 election.

We've indicated in this space previously that we thought it was a good thing. We heard the tax explained a few years ago, just after it had been approved by the state legislature, at a meeting of area mayors and councilmen. It sounded good then and towns which were especially in a pinch for money began laying the groundwork for getting the one per cent tax into effect.

The amount of good the tax does depends entirely, of course, on the amount of retail sales of taxable items in a given town. How much tax money would be created for Bovina, we aren't sure, but estimate that it would be in the neighborhood of \$15,000 to \$20,000 per year. That estimate is based on figures provided by the state in 1966. The state's figures are based on the county population and an estimated per capita revenue. It's kinda left up to the individual doing the figuring to insert his own estimates about what per cent is spent here, etc.

The amount of money the City of Bovina will receive from this "painless as any" taxing method. The income source is available to us and we're of the opinion that the people of the community won't mind paying it if the money is used to help "their town." Even if the actual figure is around the mark of \$10,000 annually that's still a pretty good addition to the tax income which totals in the neighborhood of \$23,000 each year.

With the extra funds from the sales tax, the city will be in a position to provide for its citizens some of the things which are taken for granted in other places. If additional services are provided without the sales tax, the fellow who will pay the bill is the property owner, who now has the feeling that he's paying more than his share of tax anyway. But without the sales tax, there's no other place for the additional money to come from.

Believe it or not, there's never been any proof that a sales tax hurt business. As a matter of fact, the opposite has proven to be true. When the sales tax money goes toward making a better community, additional business is created. People prefer to trade in a town which provides progressive services for its residents and visitors.

Towns which have not had the tax while neighboring, competitive towns had the tax in force have voted the tax on themselves to make their community better.

From a business standpoint now, there's no disadvantage to having the tax because almost all the towns in our trade area have the tax. This theory never did hold much water, and it's certainly outdated now since other area towns have voted the tax in.

Backers of the sales tax refer to it as the fairest of all taxes. The people who spend the money pay the tax. People here who have no property on the tax rolls pay no city tax, but at the same time they receive the same services as do the property owners.

That's one of the reasons the sales tax is considered a "fair" tax.

Taxes have become a sore spot with the average citizen during the past few years. Mention a tax increase and somebody was apt to tell you to go butt a stump. However, the city sales tax has proven to be popular with voters across the state of Texas even at a time when additional taxing was a problem.

If you're interested in making your community a better one, we hope you'll consider voting FOR the one per cent city sales tax in the election at the city hall Saturday, June 6.

City Sets Sales Tax Election

Asks Voters For Opinion

Bovina city council took a long-discussed step at its regular meeting Thursday night and called an election for a one per cent city sales tax.

Election has been called for June 6. Polling place will be City Hall with J. E. Sherrill serving as election judge.

Mayor Charles Flynn pointed out to the councilmen that these are inflationary times. The city has several things that need doing, such as garbage improvements, and worn out equipment.

"I don't think it's right to put this burden on property owners," Flynn stated.

A one cent city sales tax can bring in as much as \$20,000 each year, according to estimates.

Also pointed out is the fact that Bovina has several people who benefit from city services who pay no tax. Towns all around Bovina have approved the tax. "It's a way to raise needed funds without increasing the burden on property owners," was the thinking of the city council.

Bovina has one of the lowest tax rates in Texas, one-fourth of valuation, \$1.15 tax rate per \$100 valuation.

A community center, playground, street markers, swimming pool, and other projects wanted here can not become realities without such a tax, Flynn explained.

Additional paving in Bovina was discussed, in conjunction with the paving program in Eastview Addition.

City council hired James Burnett to work at cemetery during the summer months.

The pay of city employees was on the agenda for discussion. A pay raise for Darrell Read, water superintendent, was okayed.

R. L. Hopingardner, representing the Voluntary Fire Department, points out the need for another fire siren south of U. S. Highway 86. He said installation will cost about \$1,250 and phone service about \$7.50 per month.

Also approved for the city marshal's department was a finger print kit at a cost of \$48 and a siren for the marshal's car for \$62.

Report was also made that a photographer from Southwestern Public Service Company has agreed to supply a transparency of the bull statue for the purpose of printing postcards. This will be done, probably, in the near future.

A committee will meet with Bovina Roping Club to offer assistance of Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture for the annual Bull Town Days celebration.

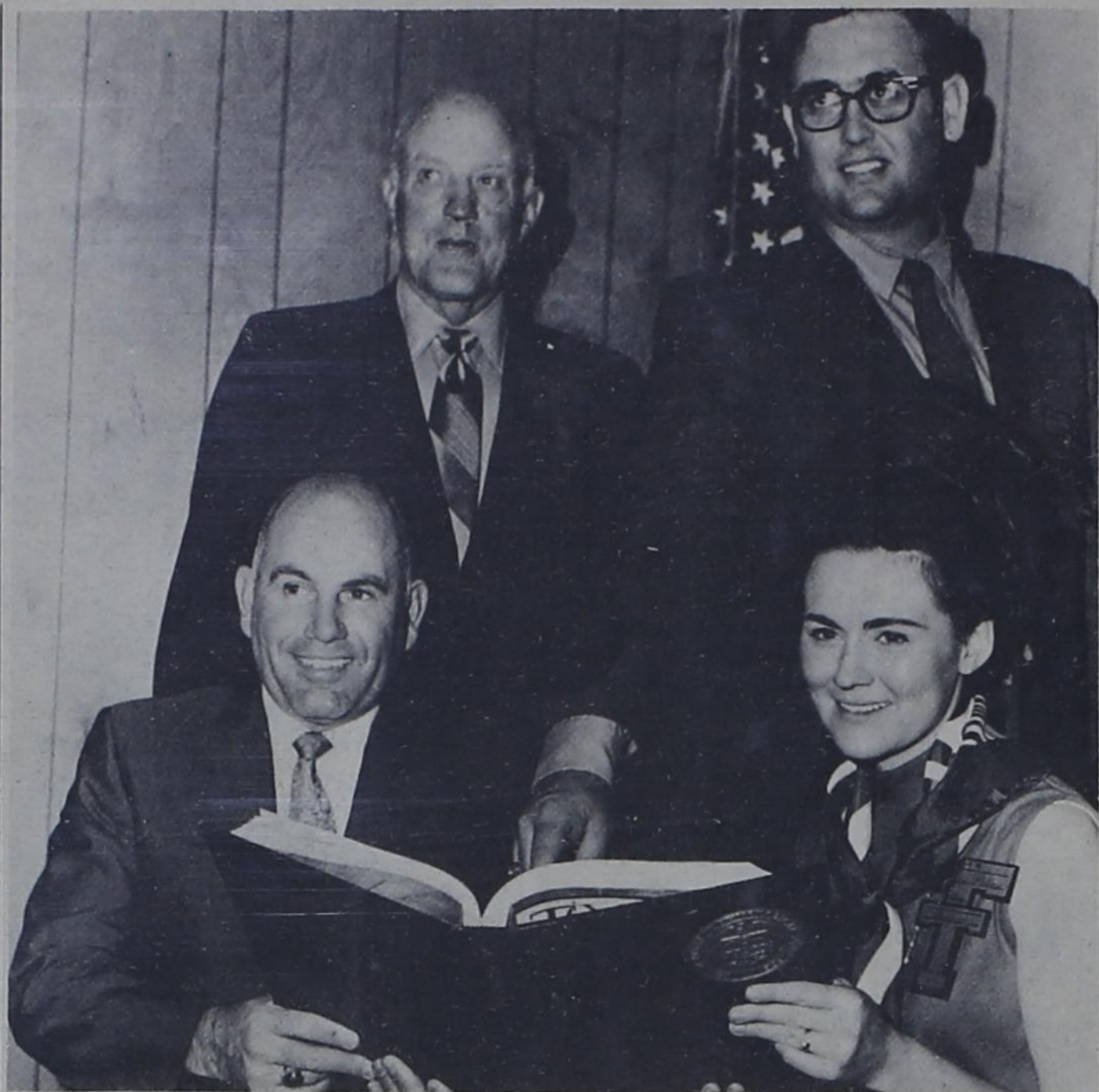

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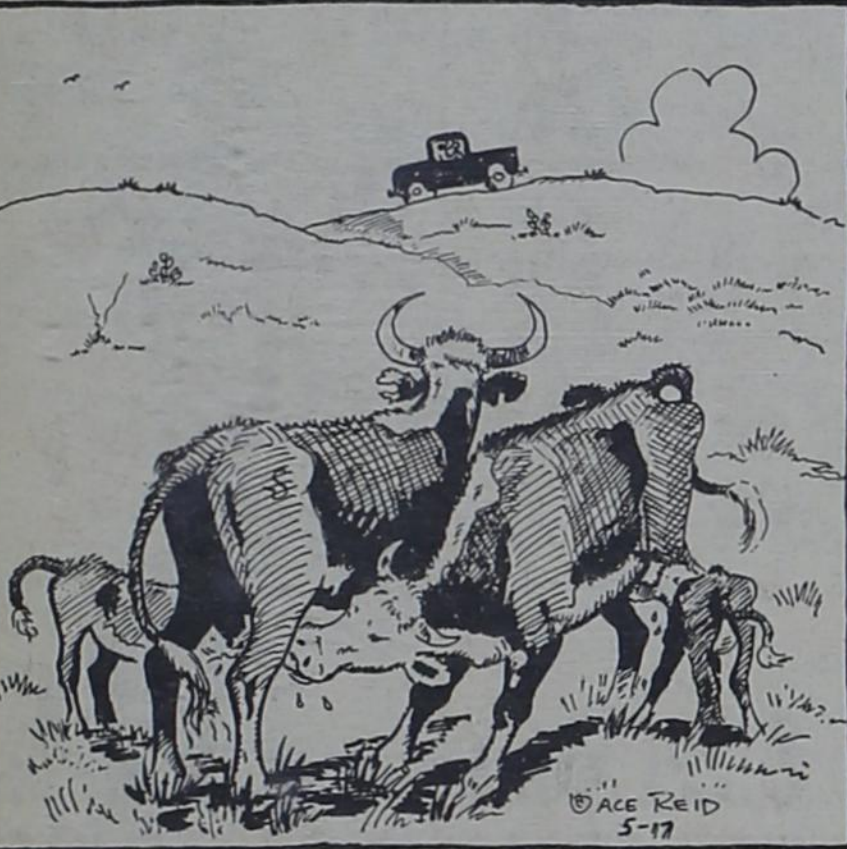

A protest hearing on a zoning ordinance change for Bovina Friday night was good for some discussion and that was about all.

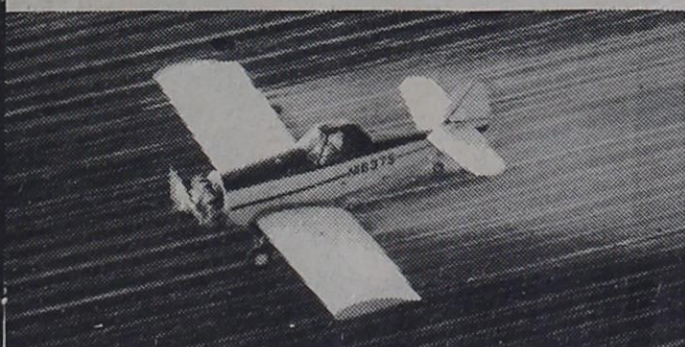

Cook's Corner



MRS. CAP NAEGLÉ

Some of the recipes listed this week came all the way from California to Bovina with Mrs. Cap Naegle. One is tried-and-true, handed down from her grandmother, for chili sauce. Another is an almost lost art, sour dough. The third is a recipe dreamed up in the kitchen of Mrs. Naegle.

Born in Santa Monica, Calif., this week's cook moved to the desert as a child when her parents decided to go into farming operations of dates and grapes. She lived in the desert most of her life, graduating from high school near Thermal, Calif. She spent the summers in the mountains to escape the intense heat.

On the farm she developed a love for horses, rode them and showed them. But, it's been a long time since she has pursued that hobby.

Mrs. Naegle attended the University of Arizona for two years then worked with Janss Cattle Co. four or five years in Thermal, Calif.

Her husband, meantime, was a native of Northern Arizona. He entered the cattle business as a youth. A graduate of University of Arizona, he joined the Janss Cattle Co. a few years later and was associated with them for 14 years.

It was during this time the couple met. They married in 1958 and lived in California until moving to Roswell, N.M. in 1964.

They moved to Parmer County three years ago when Naegle became manager of Parmer County Cattle Co. First making their home at Farwell, they built their home in Bovina a year later.

The Naegles have three children, Diana, 10, Kim eight, and Cap, Jr. two.

Among Mrs. Naegle's hobbies are gardening, cooking and music, which she studied in college.

Beef Spaghetti Casserole
Cook one pkg. spaghetti according to directions.

In large skillet brown two or three slices bacon. Drain. Add one chopped onion and one chopped garlic. Add two pounds ground beef. Season with salt, pepper and chili powder. Add three small cans tomato sauce, two cans tomato paste and one can water. Into mixture pour two cups grated Longhorn cheese. Mix. Let simmer about one hour.

Mix with cooked spaghetti. Pour in casserole and top with grated cheese. Bake 30 to 35 minutes. Recipe can be increased or decreased.

This can also be frozen and kept before baking stage. When removing from deep freeze, place in oven and bake.

Chili Sauce

1 gal. (6 1/4 lbs.) real ripe tomatoes. Peel and core before measuring (Place in scalding water until skin loosens) 6 or 8 med. onions 12 good, hot Mexican chilis 1 c. white sugar 1 c. brown sugar 2 c. apple cider vinegar, full strength 1 t. nutmeg 1/2 t. curry powder 2 t. ginger 2 t. mustard 5 t. salt, or to taste 1 1/2 t. cinnamon 1 1/2 to 2 t. chili powder

Put onions and chili through grinder. Also tomatoes (or put tomatoes through colander). Mix all ingredients together and simmer two to four hours or until thickness you want. Stir frequently. Cook slowly. An enamel kettle best to cook it in.

Sour Dough Starter

2 c. flour 2 c. warm water 1 pkg. dry yeast Mix in crock. Set out until doubles up or bubbles good (about two days).

Then, for this time only, remove one cup of mixture, add one cup flour and one cup water. Let bubble again. Keep crock of starter in refrigerator until ready to use.

Sour Dough Pancakes
Remove starter from refrigerator night before.

If feeding small group, add one cup flour and one cup water to starter in crock and let set overnight. If feeding a large group, add two cups of each.

Next morning, pour off into large mixing bowl all but about two cups of starter. (Return crock of remaining starter to refrigerator). To mixing bowl add 2 eggs, 2 T. baking powder, 1 T. sugar, 1/2 t. cream of tartar, 2 T. butter Wesson oil. Will increase in bowl as being mixed.

On extremely hot griddle, spoon out pancake mixture and turn when brown.

(Important: Don't add flour and water again to starter in crock until night before using it again.)

Sour Dough Biscuits
Eight hours before using remove start from refrigerator (if serving for night meal). Add two cups flour and two cups water. Let bubble. When ready to use, fill large mixing bowl with flour. Make a well in center of flour. Pour sour dough

At Home In Parmer County

THE OLD AND THE POOR ROCK ON. A group of interviewers discovered this for themselves as they talked recently with 53 older, rural Americans about their life.

Minnie Bell, extension specialist for aging, reports these needs of Senior Citizens which the interviewers found:

1. They need to be better informed about programs which will help them.
2. Health programs need to better help them to reduce discomfort and to help change their outlook on life.
3. Services of a visiting nurse or someone comparable may be better than sending an older person to an institution.
4. Housing needs improving and taxes reduced on homes owned by elderly.
5. They need help to benefit more from social activities.
6. They need help to "get out;" lower fares for transportation.
7. The older people need help to make use of their skills or train them in new skills.

Confused by different sizes of eggs at different prices? Here is a good rule of thumb to help you compare prices. Medium eggs are an equal buy to large eggs when they cost one-eighth

into flour, leaving about two cups in crock. (Return crock to refrigerator).

In mixing bowl add 1/2 t. salt, 4 t. baking powder, 1/2 t. cream of tartar, 2 t. sugar. With fork mix around and around, mixing flour in. When dough stiffens use hand to mix in flour until desired consistency is reached. Put 1/2 c. Crisco in 9 by 9 by 2 inch square pan and melt in oven. Let cool some. Squeeze off dough and roll in melted Crisco and fill pan full of biscuits close together. Let rise about 1 to 1 1/2 hours. Bake in hot oven at 500 degrees until real brown.

On The Farm In Palmer County

ADEQUATE MOISTURE NOW CAN BOOST WHEAT YIELDS
Irrigating wheat for grain deserves special attention in May. Adequate moisture at this time is especially important in producing top wheat yields. Maximum yield increase per acre-inch of water applied is normally received from May irrigations.

One reason for this expected yield increase is that plant moisture requirements are highest at heading to flowering. Much of the wheat is in or approaching this peak daily moisture requirement period. Three or three and one-half

inches of water will remove from the soil by plants and evaporation each 10 days. This rate of removal rapidly depletes available moisture stored in the soil root zone. Soil that has not received significant rainfall or irrigation during the past 15 to 20 days is likely to be dry enough to begin limiting yields.

Good yield response can be obtained from an irrigation at heading to flowering. An application at this time normally boosts yields more than any single irrigation during the season. Research on wheat irrigation shows that this timely

application will normally increase yields 10 to 20 bushel per acre. This is a significant yield increase and is profitable unless an excessive amount of water is applied. Yields have consistently been higher when water was applied at heading to flowering.

Adequate moisture during the grain filling stage is also important. Even though daily water requirements are two to two and one-half inches every 10 days, an irrigation has increased yields when rainfall didn't supply needed moisture. This irrigation will normally increase yields 8 to 12 bushels, which is also a profitable water expenditure for small applications.

Spring wheat growth was good this year due to adequate subsoil moisture from heavy fall rainfall. However, moisture stress now and during grain filling is likely to limit yields more than if spring growth had been less vigorous.

An irrigation by flowering and another during early grain filling can increase yields as much as 20 to 30 bushels where production potential is high.

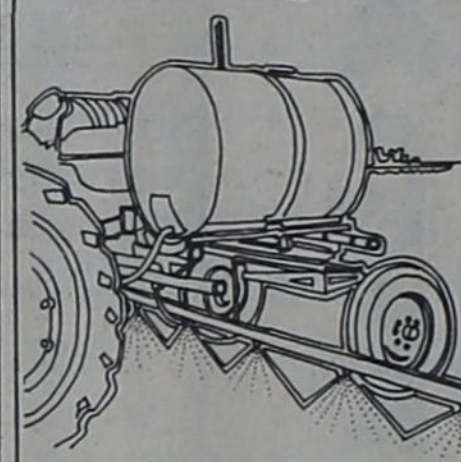
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
