Mrs. Ferguson and Coolidge Win in State and Nation-Local Officers Re-Elected Except Jim Peril.

T. H. Ridgeway of San Antonio was defeated by Julius Real for State Senator from the 26th District by almost two to one, it was shown by incomplete returns from over the district. The local candidate carried every county in the district. William A. Black, also of San Antonio, ran a poor third.

Large Number of Citizens at Meeting of Business Men at Country Club Monday Night.

The city builders were out in force at the Country Club Monday night regular monthly membership meeting. About 60 members of the order were present, with several visitors.

Probably the most important matter up for consideration was the report of the sidewalk and paving committee of the Chamber of Commerce. W. A. Fawcett, chairman of this committee, made a report that the improving of Earl Garrett Street from Water to Myrta Streets had been acted on favorably by the residents of that thoroughfare, with the probable date of beginning operations about the first of next month. Mr. Fawcett urged the property owners of any other street in the city who desired to pave to get busy and get the matter signed up so that the contractors of the present project could handle same at the completion of Earl Garrett Street.

### WHITE CAKE

% cup butter cups sugar cup sweet milk 3 cups flour

6 egg whites 2 level and 1 heaping teaspoonfuls

baking powder 1 teaspoonful flavoring

Cream butter, add gradually sugar, and when thoroughly creamed, add milk and flour alterantely, sift flour then measure, add baking powder, sift seven times. When well mixed fold in beaten egg whites,

FILLING-2½ cups sugar, 1 cup sweet milk, 1 tablespoonful butter; put two cups sugar with milk in pan on stove and cook until it makes a soft ball in water. At the same time put ½ cup sugar in pan and melt to a nice brown, then add to first mixture, stirring all the time; add butter and beat well. When it is thick put between layers of cake.







### PRESERVATION OF GAME

A prominent Kerrville citizen was out in the country the past week on a business trip. Wild game was plentiful and after transacting his business with the ranchman the Kerrville man jokingly asked permission to kill a buck, stating that it was only a few days until the open season and pledging his word that he would quit hunting a few days earlier at the close of The ranchman replied: "As far as

I am concerned, you have permission to hunt on my land, but the deer do not belong to me. They belong to the citizens of the State generally, and you will have to get their permission before I will permit you to shoot

The above states the game laws of Texas in as few words as possible, in the opinion of The Sun. Wild game is common property of the citizens; also a common charge, each citizen being honor bound by his allegiance to the laws of the State to help preserve and foster the wild game for both this and future generations.

The game hogs of the past have ruined the wild game in some sections of the country, to such extent that many game animals and birds are now almost extinct, even in game preserves. Here in Southwest Texas the people are more fortunate, inasmuch as there exists a large amount of wild game and fowls. This supply will last indefinitely if the State and National game laws are lived up to; if not the next generation will see this section like many others-entirely bereft of a commodity that is bringing in thousands of dollars annually, to say nothing of the pleasure and recreation afforded local hunters and sportsmen. Help preserve the wild game.

### PRESBYTERIAN PEANUTS

St. Louis Post-Dispatch: Missionaries in foreign lands sometimes build better than they know. Just now comes out of China a piece of news that puts commercial somance into religion. The peanut, introduced from America about 35 years ago by missionaries, is said to enter into China's foreign commerce to the extent of millions of dollars annually. It is an engaging story. The Rev. Dr. Charles R. Mills, it appears, when working under auspices of the American Presbyterian Mission, was presented by a brother clergyman with wo quarts of goobers from the Sunny South. Dr. Mills divided his gift with two of the native members of his church, stipulating that the peanuts be planted and after three seasons the product be distributed to other Chinese farmers for similar use. Evidently the natives liked our illustrious goober, for at the end of the first year it was discovered that one of the farmers had grown a sizable crop and esten all of it. However, the other was faithful to his trust, and now the surplus peanuts for exports nets the Chinese growers a comfortably large total of cash. Many years ago the British introduced into China a little plant known as the poppy. Not long ago the Chinese government outlawed the poppy, which was of the opiumbearing variety and was, if not actual-I" putting them to sleep, preventing most of the members of the Mongolian race from waking up to modern ideas. By introducing the innoculous and palatable peanut, one American missionary seems to have started something that works in exactly the opposite di-rection from that taken by the dope plant. This is one form of "penetration" in which America has proved superior to Great Britain. The Presbyterian peanut in China now takes care of itself.

The making of paper with wood pulp first appeared on the census re-port of 1869. It revolutionized the paper industry of this country and since that time our output has increased eighteen times.



# JUNIOR AMERICAN RED CROSS ARMY 5,596,663

Children of 29,942 Schools Now Enrolled in Movement of Service to Humanity.

The American Junior Red Cross which was organized as a children's auxiliary during war-times especially to help the young refugees in Europe. and to exemplify in peace-time the med Cross ideal of service, has now a membership of 5,596,663 in the schools af the United States and the insular

This Junior movement gives opportunity for the children to share in Red Cross effort parallel to that of the parent organization. Juniors are therefore identified in varying degree with the health services, disaster relief work, salvage and other suitable activities of value to the operations of the Red Cross.

It is a valiant host marching on under its "I Serve" banner in the cause of happier childhood everywhere and particularly wherever the American flag flies. The enrollment embraces 29.942 schools and 147,486 afternoon. Stations that can be picked school rooms, a gain over 1923 of 5,655 schools and 22,414 school rooms. The year's gain in membership was 769,402 children, or nearly 80,000 for each month of the school year.

The educational and social values of the Junior Red Cross movement is thus evidencing the firm and cordial endorsement of school authorities. The government has added the weight of recognition by extending the Junior Red Cross in the schools for American poverty being unknown.



Indian children. The American Red Cross is also planning to develop the Junior program in 600 rural schools in isolated sections.

There is no abatement of the ex change of correspondence between schools in the United States and schools in the insular possessions and foreign lands. During the year the Junior Red Cross in part supported operations in twelve European countries. It is a potent influence for the cultivation of international goodwill and its example has been the means of stimulating the formation of Junior Red Cross societies in more than thirty countries.


