## Good Rain Falls Here

Rain, the good, soil-soaking, farmer-pleasing, slow-falling kind, totaled two and a half inches here Saturday

The moisture began falling late in the evening ---about 10 or 11 p.m. --- and continued almost all night. Rain was received over a large area with the amount ranging from one and a half inches north of town, in the Rhea Community to three and a half in other areas.

Many farmers described the rainfall as being as good as they'd ever received. The welcome and unexpected rainfall allowed irrigation

wells to be turned off. It will give crops, especially grain sorghum, a substantial boost toward making better yield. Also, the moisture will make ideal seasoning for wheatland which had been prepared for planting this month or next in many cases.

The rain was considered a handicap for vegetables which were being harvested or nearing the harvesting

In addition to the good rain Saturday night, a shower, measuring .08 of an inch was recorded Monday night. More rainfall is predicted for the area.

The moisture situation is such now that one optimistic farmer was heard to remark, "If these showers keep up, we might not have to irrigate anymore this year to make a

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



Texas now has a new law that requires immunizations for all students enrolled in schools and institutions of higher learning, as shown below:

If the number of doses required have been received, but last dose was before time stated, then an additional dose of POLIO, DIPHTHERIA/TETANUS or SMALLPOX is required.

All immunizations should be completed by the time school is entered. However if this is not possible, all students will be allowed to enter their respective school systems during the Summer and Fall 1971 terms, with the provision that their immunizations against at least one of the aforementioned diseases will have been started by January 1, 1972 and all completed as soon as medically feasible.

Since many types of personal immunization records are in current use, any document listing each immunization received by year will be acceptable during the 1971-1972 school year for either initiating or updating school immunization records.

Signature or rubber-stamp validation of personal records by physicians or public health clinics is recommended but not required until the Summer 1972 Semester, after which validation of new records is

Exclusions from compliance are allowable on an individualized basis for medical contra-indications and religious conflicts.

A new, standard Certificate of Immunization form is being developed; however, compatible documents will also be acceptable. Fill out and return Immunization Records to teacher.

If you have any question, contact your family physician or school nurse. We suggest that you take this letter with you if you contact them in person.

A combined Measles-Rubella vaccine is now available which requires only one injection. The age criteria for this vaccine is the same as indicated in the above table for Measles (Rubeola) and Rubella,

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



Roughing it on a camping trip doesn't mean you have to forfeit nutritious well-balanced meals. Supermarkets stock a variety of foods suitable for a campout, including freeze- and the many potato products dried items, mixes and packaged main dishes.

Remember to plan meals around the four basic food groups to maintain health and to meet energy requirements for active vacation days. The rule to follow is "2-2-4-4" -- two or more servings from the milk group, two or more from the meat group, four or more from the fruit and vegetable group

and four from the cereal group. Some of the easy to pack and easy to fix suggestions from the Extension Marketing Specialist Gwendolyne Clyatt are: Nonfat dry milk and pasteurized process cheese spread which need no refrigeration from the milk group. Such package main dishes as Macaroni and Cheese,

Spaghetti with Meat sauce and beef strognoff and canned stews and luncheon meats pack easily and are easy to fix. Individual size cans of fruit and vegetable juices and powdered fruit drinks are very handy. Dried fruits make very handy snacks. Canned fruits and vegetables on the market round out the requirement for the fruit and vegetable group. Ready to eat cereals and instant oatmeal or cream of wheat to start the day off and pancake, cake, cookie and muffin mix which only need water to be added fill the bread



The potential danger of food poisoning accompanies each outdoor meal. But precaution and common sense can prevent

Gastrointestinal upsets are sometimes caused by germs that thrive in picnic foods -foods not under adequate refrigeration. Food is safestat temperatures above 140 degrees F. and below 45 degrees

Food should be served immediately after cooking. If allowed to cool to moderate temperatures, rapid reproduction of micro-organisms which produce harmful-toxins will occur. Pienic foods usually stay just warm-not cold or hot -for several hours, a danger period in many cases. Foods to watch closely are finely chopped dishes, such as chicken salad, meat or egg sandwich fillings and casseroles.


