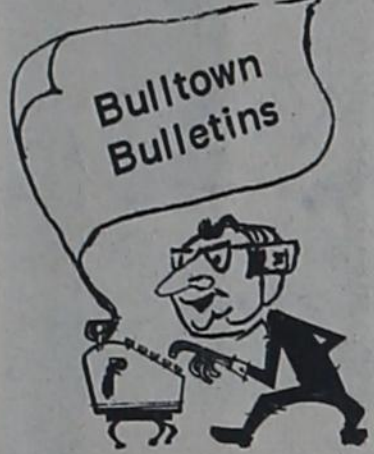


## HERE MONDAY

**THE FUND DRIVE** to build a Parmer County Show Barn has passed the \$52,000 mark in Friona, according to the latest report from Jerry Hinkle, who is coordinating the drive at Friona State Bank.

This is some \$23,000 below the announced goal of \$75,000, and the drive official said he still had "eight or nine thousand dollars" in pledges that should still be collected. That would get the total up to within \$14,000 or so of the goal.

It was indicated that officials have been disappointed to date that no organized fund drive has been held in Bovina. Most communities in the county have conducted fund drives for the show facility.

Farwell, for example, kicked off a drive to raise \$5,000 for the show barn, and to date, over \$3,000 has been deposited from their drive. The Rhea community also had a good drive. No dollar figure was quoted on their effort, but it was known that it was respectable.

Hinkle suggests that those businesses and individuals who desire to contribute to the fund send their checks to his attention, marked "Show Barn fund," since it appears that no organized drive has been undertaken locally.

The show barn people are about ready to advertise for bids on the project, which calls for a 100x150-foot structure, even in light of the fact that the goal has not been reached.

Plans are to construct the facility during the summer months, so it will be ready plenty of time ahead of next February's county show.

It's a much-needed facility, as anyone who has attended a county show in recent years can testify. The FFA and 4-H youngsters of our county deserve a top-notch place to exhibit the animals that they spend so much time and effort on. At last they are about to get such a place.

# Rainfall Totals 1.44, Saturates Land

## Milo Planting Faces Delay

Moisture, this time in the form of rainfall, continues to saturate the Bovina area.

A total of almost one and one-half inches fell here, beginning shortly after noon Monday and continuing until after 8 p.m.

Farm land in the area has received sufficient moisture during the past several months, but the additional rainfall will be beneficial to newly planted corn crops, according to farmers here.

Most of the corn has been planted with only a small percentage of acres yet unplanted. The rainfall will delay that for several more days.

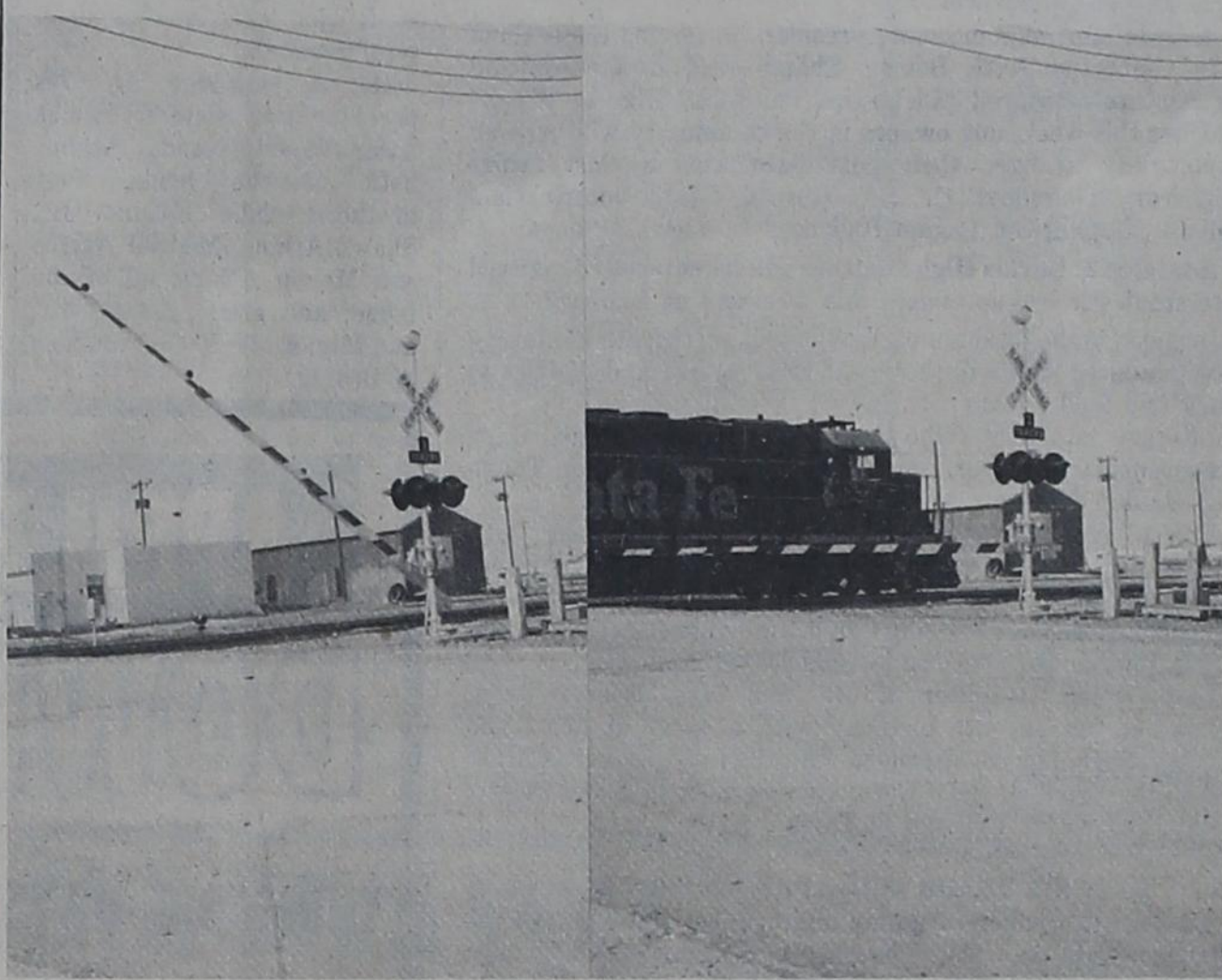
However, grain sorghum and vegetable growers would just as soon have a few weeks of

sunshine to get their ground ready for the planters.

Total rainfall for the year is now over the five inch mark, 5.75, according to Willie Williams, Bovina's weatherman.

About the only bright spot in the rain Monday was the fact that it wasn't snow. Bovina reached 31 snows since the first one in October, with snow falling in at least portions of seven months.

## Pre-Registration Slated Friday

Pre-registration will get underway at 9 a.m. Friday at Ridgelea Elementary School for 1973-74 kindergarten and first grade students.

Children who will be six years of age on or before September 1 and who will attend the first grade next year should be registered Friday, according to Wilson DiCuffa, elementary principal.

In addition, educationally handicapped children who will be five years old by the same date and all other children who

will be five years and seven months old by that date should pre-register for kindergarten.

DiCuffa asks that parents bring a list of immunizations the child has received, as well as their birth certificates.

Required immunizations for the children are smallpox, DPT, oral polio, measles and rubella.

DiCuffa urges all parents who have children in either of the three categories to register them Friday. He will be at the office at Ridgelea School until noon that day for that purpose.

# Daylight Time Begins Sunday

Bovina citizens, joining those in 47 other states in the U.S., have only four days in which to decide whether to turn the alarm clock forward or backward.

Come Sunday morning, it's that semi-annual time of confusion again.

That's when Daylight Savings Time (DST) goes into effect this year.

Services will begin in Bovina churches an hour earlier Sunday, and as usual, several people will probably arrive just as worship services are dismissed.

Work days for Bovina businesses, as well as Bovina Schools, will also begin an hour earlier next week.

The official time to move the clocks forward (remember—"Spring forward, Fall back") is at 2 a.m. Sunday.

The only states in the union to veto DST were Arizona and Hawaii, although several western and southern states have made futile efforts to alter the length of time involved.

Daylight Savings Time will continue through the summer months with Central Standard Time slated to return in October.

To add to the woes of farmers, mothers of small school children, drive-in movie operators and various other businessmen, a move is underway in some quarters to have DST the year-round.

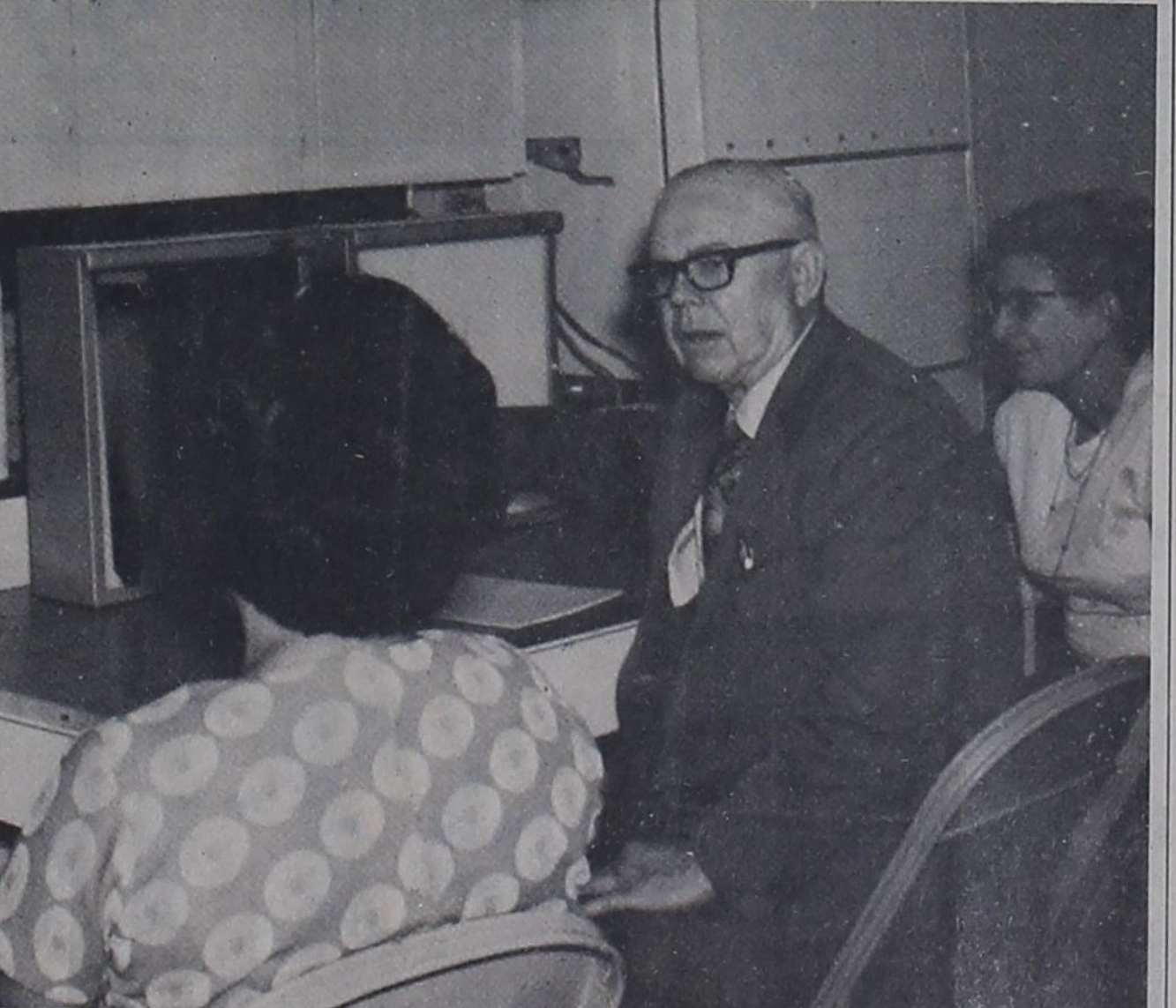
Legislation is currently pending in Congress to impose

Refreshments will be served. All farmers are invited to attend.

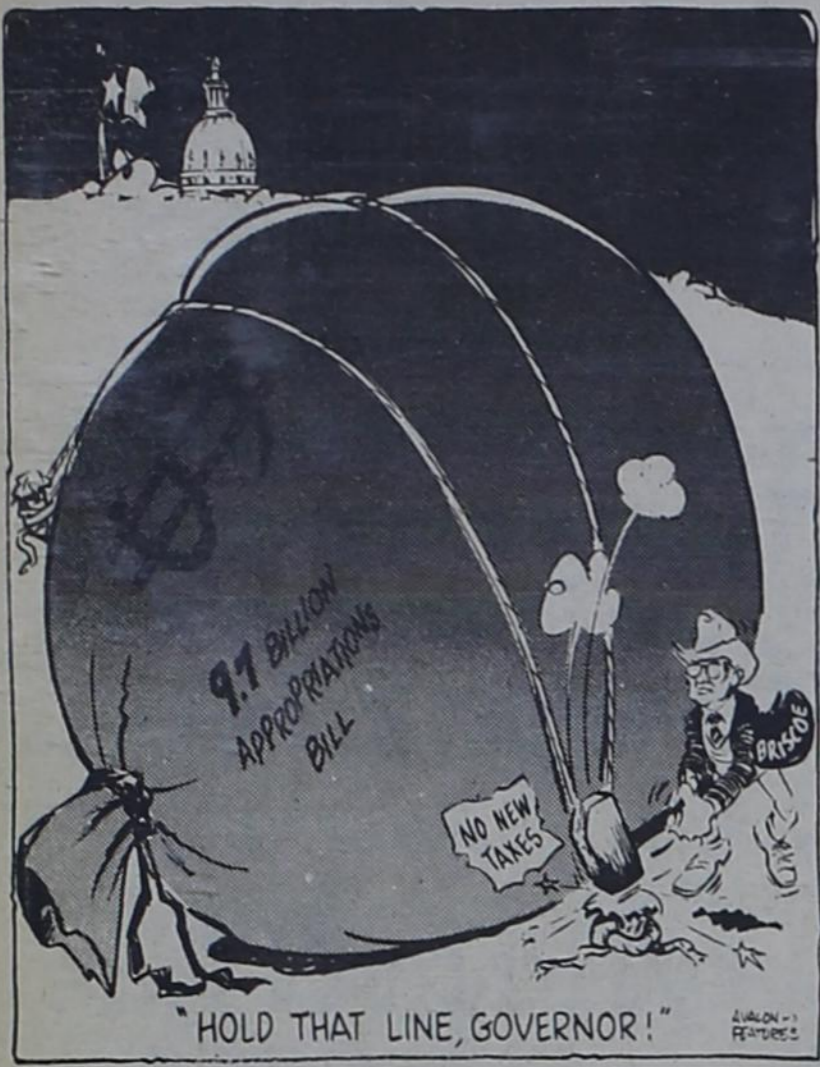

**Phase Three**

At the onset of the Korean War, a few prominent economists including the late Bernard Baruch urged President Truman to impose economic controls to prevent runaway inflation. The President decided to have a go with the unchecked cherished free-enterprise system.

Normally speaking, the system works but in wartime demand outruns supply and sharp inflation results. That is what happened in the early fifties. By the time the economy had been normalized twenty years ago, prices had skyrocketed, and the cost to all Americans was considerable.

President Nixon, convinced a few months back the free enterprise system would work satisfactorily now that he had greatly reduced the large U.S. commitment in Vietnam, gambled and removed most of the economic controls in his Phase Two program.

In several fields—food, housing, etc.—the results threaten to be disastrous and threaten to undo the corrective influence of recent dollar devaluations. Time is running out for the President and the nation in these areas of the economy.

If emergency and voluntary measures undertaken in recent weeks show no appreciable effect in April, Phase Two controls, perhaps some selective price rollbacks if justified, will be necessary in the public interest.

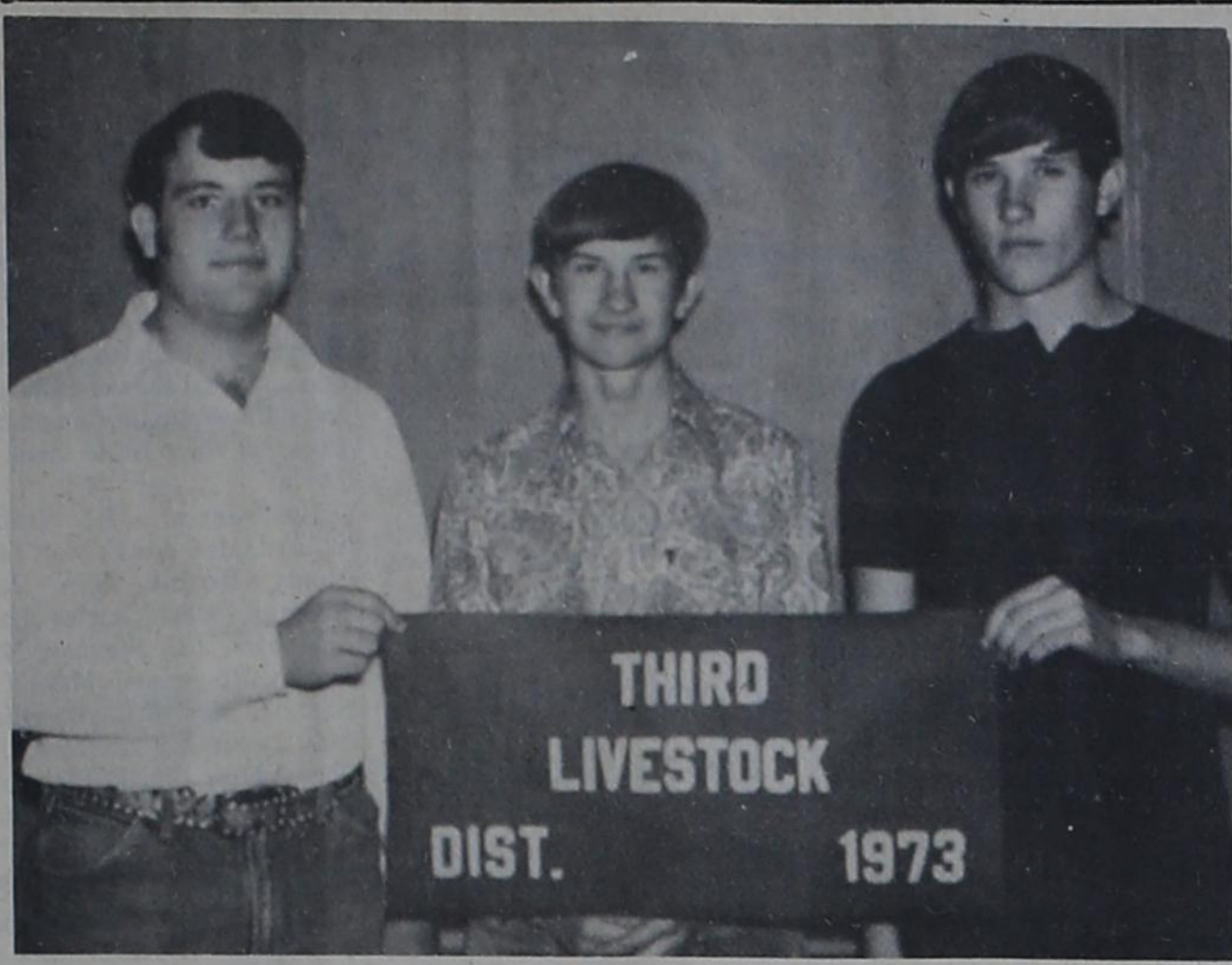

## TB Assoc. Re-Named

American Lung Association of Texas will be the new name of the Texas Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association, according to an announcement from Glynn B. Roland of Amarillo, president of the Top of Texas branch office which serves the Panhandle area.

"The new name of the association more accurately reflects our central purpose in the prevention and control not only of tuberculosis, but of all lung diseases such as asthma and emphysema," Roland explains.

The name change of the Christmas Seal organization will be effective immediately, he said.

## Tornado Tips Given

With the advent of tornado season in the area, Bovina fire chief Gaylon Rhodes, who also coordinates weather watches in the area along with the Bovina Police Department, has issued a few tornado tips.

These tips are being passed along to the general public along with the tornado warning system for the City of Bovina.

### TORNADO SIGNAL

The tornado warning signal in Bovina is one long, continuous blast on the siren. The long blast will be repeated as long and as much as necessary in the event a tornado is spotted approaching the city. In the event of such a long blast, the fire chief suggests that you seek immediate shelter in a pre-determined location, and as near your home as possible. In most instances, there is no time to be looking too far for shelter, added the fire chief.

An all-clear signal is a series of short interval blasts on the siren.

### WEATHER SIGNS

Tornado weather signs include a hot, sticky day, with southerly winds, and a dark, threatening sky. The thunderstorm clouds appear topsy-turvy, bulging down instead of up. Such days frequently appear without tornadoes. The

'twister' itself is easily recognized by the funnel-shaped cloud, spinning rapidly and extending toward the earth from the base of a thundercloud.

Generally, an approaching tornado can be detected partially by its sound: a noise similar to a giant blowtorch, which can be heard up to 25 miles away. Close up, it roars like a jet aircraft.

### SAFETY RULES

General safety rules are as follows-

I-If you are near a tornado cellar--  
When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use free from water, gas or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel. There is no universal protection against tornadoes except underground excavations.

II-If you are in the open country--

(1)-Move at right angles to the tornadoes' path. Tornadoes usually move forward at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.  
(2)-If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.  
III-If in a city or town--

(1)-Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. Stay away from windows. There are probably more injuries from flying glass during tornadoes than from any other cause.

(2)-In homes-The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado may be opened to reduce damage to the building.

(3)-Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

### SCHOOL SAFETY

IV-If in schools--

(1)-In city areas-If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums with large, poorly-supported roofs.

(2)-In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

V-If in factories and industrial plants--

On receiving tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

VI-Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running into the streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively, only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, just in case.

VII-Keep tuned to your radio or television station for latest information. Do not call the Weather Bureau or your local police department except to report a tornado, as your individual request may be tying up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.

Following simple precautions could save you from serious injury or even death. Clip out these rules and keep them posted for immediate use if necessary.

WE DIDN'T get a release from the 4-H Office in Parmer County, but we were told last week that Pam Rhodes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gaylen Rhodes, won a blue ribbon in the district food show in Amarillo the earlier part of this month. Pam was junior division winner at the county level.

Joan Carson, another 4-Her, brought Pam's prize-winning recipe by the office, and testified that Sugar Plum Ring is "really good."

So, we thought we would offer you the recipe.

### SUGAR PLUM RING

Dough—  
 1 pkg. yeast  
 1/3 c. sugar  
 3-3/4 to 4 c. flour  
 1/4 c. water  
 1/3 c. shortening  
 1/2 c. milk  
 1 t. salt  
 2 eggs

Soften yeast in warm water, combine scalded milk, salt, sugar and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Stir in 1 c. flour, beat well. Add softened yeast and eggs. Add remaining flour, place in greased bowl, grease surface of bread. Cover, let rise until double in bulk (about 2 hours). Punch down, let rest for 10 minutes. Cut into 4 pieces, cut each of them into 13 pieces and shape into balls. Dip balls in melted oleo, then in sugar blended with cinnamon. Arrange 1/3 of balls in well greased tube pan. Dipping Ingredients

1/4 c. oleo  
 1 c. sugar  
 1 t. cinnamon  
 marachino cherries  
 1/2 c. nuts  
 1/3 c. dark corn syrup  
 (use a little more)

Sprinkle some cherries and nuts over layer of balls. Repeat with 2 more layers. Mix corn syrup with butter left over from dipping balls, if not enough left, use another teaspoon or two of oleo. Drizzle over top and let stand until doubled, about 1 hour. Bake in 350 degree oven for 35 minutes. Invert pan onto serving plate.

### CRITICS & CRITICISMS

A minister is acquainted with critics and criticism. He is asked to listen as people criticize a personality, a policy, or a program. Also, he is consulted by people who have felt the critic's shafts. Then, too, on rare occasions the minister discovers that he is the critic's target. Learning about critics and criticism "comes with the job." Allow me to convey a few thoughts about the subject.

The habit of finding fault is bad. It is easily acquired, but a difficult habit to quit. Why is it so easy to become "the critic"? Because we live in an imperfect world. Everything, including all best-intentioned people, is flawed and defective. To find fault is not difficult, and is not an indication of exceptional intelligence. It is the easiest of all pursuits, and is often engaged in by people with I.Q.'s of 75 or less.

The person who pays too much attention to the faults of people, or to the defects of the world, degenerates in his personality. A chronic fault-finder becomes a grumbler, then a "growler," and finally a cynic. A cynic is of no real value to anyone.

I have never known a person who intended to become a nuisance when starting to find fault, but the habit clutches your outlook until your mind becomes twisted and your heart sour. Thus, it behooves us all to be very careful how we criticize others. The Lord says that our speech should always be to the "edifying" of the other person.

The Division 1's in concert and sight reading qualified the band for the Six Flags Festival in May, if approved by school officials, according to Mrs. Jones.

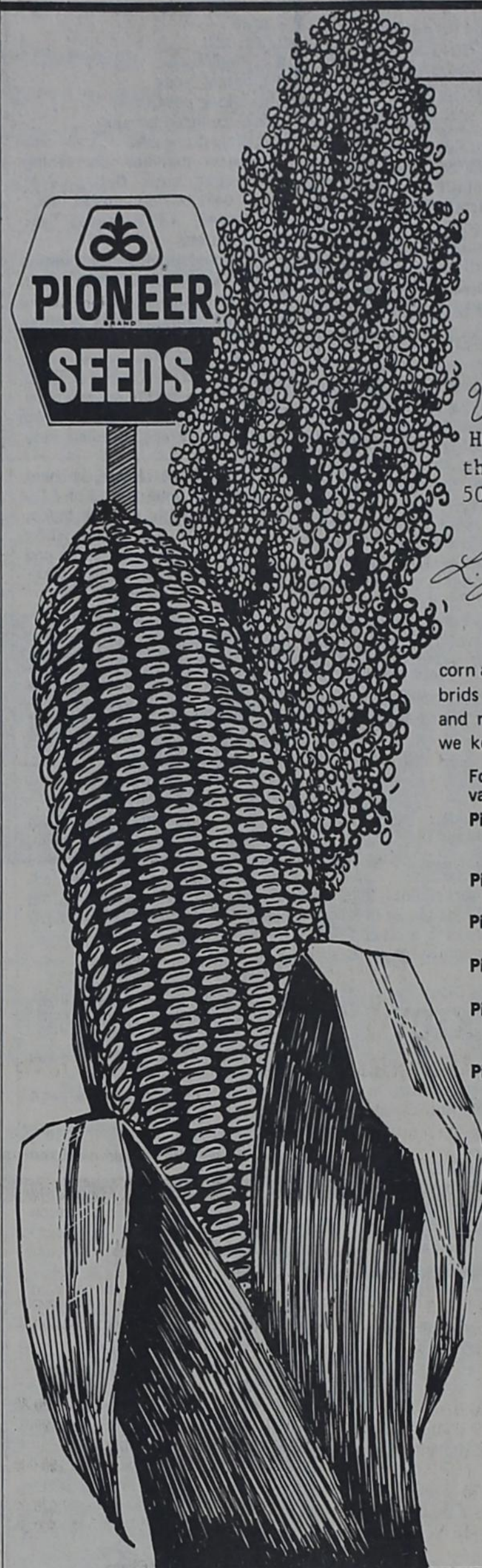

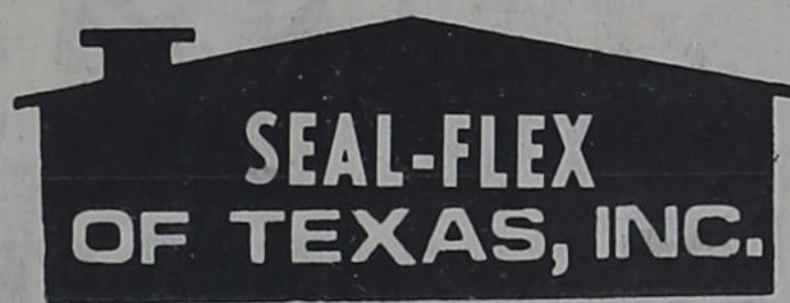

## APPLESAUCE CINNAMON CAKE

- 3 c. flour
  - 2 c. sugar
  - 1 t. cinnamon
  - 1/2 t. salt
  - 1 t. baking soda
  - 1 1/2 c. cooking oil
  - 2 large eggs
  - 1 c. applesauce
- Mix all ingredients together in order given. Bake one hour at 350 degrees in a large Bundt pan. Glaze while cake is hot.

- ## GLAZE
- 1 c. powdered sugar
  - 1/2 c. margarine
  - 1/2 c. milk
- Mix together in a saucepan and heat until boiling and boil until slightly thickened. Pour over cake.

- ## BLUE RIBBON BANANA CAKE
- 3/4 c. shortening
  - 1 1/2 c. sugar
  - 1 c. mashed bananas

- 1/2 c. buttermilk
  - 1 t. anilla
  - 2 eggs
  - 1/2 t. salt
  - 2 c. flour
  - 1 t. baking soda
  - 1 t. baking powder
  - 1/2 c. chopped pecans
  - 1 c. flaked coconut
- Cream together shortening and sugar until fluffy. Add eggs; beat two minutes at medium speed. Add bananas. Beat two minutes.  
 Sift together dry ingredients. Add to creamed mixture along with buttermilk and vanilla. Beat two minutes. Stir in nuts.  
 Turn into two greased and floured nine-inch layer pans. Sprinkle 1/2 c. coconut on each layer. Bake in 375 degree oven 25 to 30 minutes. Remove from pan. Cool layers, coconut side up on rack.  
 Place first layer, coconut side down, and spread on filling. Top with second layer, coconut side up. Swirl White Snow Frosting around sides and about inch around top edge, leaving center unfrosted.

- ## CREAMY NUT FILLING
- Combine 1/2 c. sugar, 2 T. flour, 1/2 c. evaporated milk and 2 T. butter in heavy saucepan. Cook until thick. Add 1/2 c. chopped nuts, 1/4 t. salt and 1 t. vanilla. Cool.

- ## WHITE SNOW FROSTING
- Cream together 1 egg white, 1/2 c. shortening, 1/4 c. butter, 1/2 t. coconut extract (opt.) and 1/2 t. vanilla until well blended. Gradually add 2 c. sifted powdered sugar, beating until light and fluffy.

- ## LEMON ORANGE DELIGHT
- 2 pkgs. (3 pz. each) orange gelatin
  - 2 1/2 c. boiling water
  - 1 (1 lb. 4 oz.) can crushed pineapple
  - 1 (6 oz.) can frozen orange juice
  - 2 envelopes whipped topping, mixed according to package directions
  - 1 c. cold milk
  - 1 (3 3/4 oz.) pkg. instant lemon pudding mix
  - 1 (11 oz.) can mandarin oranges, drained
- Dissolve gelatin in water. Add undrained pineapple and concentrated orange juice. Pour in 13 x 9 x 2 Pyrex dish. Chill until firm.  
 Whip topping mix. Add only one cup cold milk to pudding mix and mix according to package directions. Add pudding to whipped topping and spread over gelatin. Garnish with mandarin oranges and chill. Serves 12.

**At Home In Palmer County**

**YOU ASKED**, where did all the body go?...Laundry finishes put it back in the clothes. The natural look is great, and no one can deny that soft clothes, light makeup and comfortable shoes took little time to be accepted. But there comes a point where naturalness can give way to sloppiness. Just as limp hair still needs a body permanent for the natural look, limp clothes still need some body.

Gone are the days of high, stiff collars and cuffs and yard wide crinolines. Gone, too, is the bother of cooking starch. But starch itself has not outlived its usefulness, says the Soap and Detergent Association, and fabric finishes have been added for modern fabrics. Although built-in body is a finishing feature in many of today's fabrics, wear and washing can break down original finishes over a period

of time, causing the fabric to become limp. Starch or fabric finish restores crispness and body to fabric and improves its appearance. At the same time, they enhance soil resistance by coating the fibers so that the dirt particles will not become embedded.

Starches are derived from vegetable sources and are available in dry, liquid or spray form. The dry and liquid forms must be mixed with either hot or cold water before use, thus requiring time in preparation.

However, these forms are the least expensive, and they can be used directly in the washing machine for large starching jobs or in a basin for spot starching.

A newer development is the spray fabric finish. Made of synthetic resins, a fabric finish creates a light body on a garment as opposed to the firm

crispness of a spray starch. Fabric finishes are especially suitable for synthetics, because they are effective when used with the recommended lower ironing temperatures.

The majority of consumers today are casting their votes for the convenient spray types. With just a "psst" of the can, all over or spot finishing adds instant body as you iron.

For best results with spray starches and finishes, shake the can well before application, hold the can upright while spraying, spray lightly and evenly over the desired area. Avoid saturation of the fabric with a spray starch which can lead to flaking and stickiness. Heavier stiffness can be obtained by multiple light sprayings. Allow starch moisture to be absorbed for a moment before ironing to avoid

buildup on the iron. Spray and iron dark-colored garments on the wrong side. Before storing the spray can, remove the spray button and rinse it well with water to prevent clogging.
