#### SMITH'S RELIGIOUS CREED

Perhaps some of our readers will remember that Governor Smith made public his religious views in April 1927. The request was made by Chas. C. Marshall, prominent New York attorney, who wanted to know what came first with Mr. Smith, his church or the constitution of the United States. Don't wait until winter or next spring to try to pick out the loafers. Not only will they continue to consume a large quantity of feed between now and then, but it will be impossible to to a good job of culling at that time.

Culling is a 365 day process. Whenever a loafer shows up, take her out. But the best time to go thru same truth, and there the entire flock systematically is In the same relationship during the summer or early fall. The spring months are the natural laying time of all fowls; even a cull hen will lay then. That makes it impossible to pick out a very large percentage of the culls. 
