Let us repeat for it may not be said too often: Prohibition is not an attempt to make men good but rather an attempt to make society

The prepandial cocktail heister, heists not merely the cocktail which he thinks gives him social prestige, but he heists also a disrespect for government and a scorn of law which on some day, when the rabble rises, will endanger the life of this republic. Until the rich learn this, passing resolutions and clubbing people, policing borders and establishing rum fleets will do

#### A HEINOUS CRIME

Arson is the most heinous crime, the most despicable act conceivable.

When some one decides to "sell out to the insurance company" by setting fire to his property it is the second time, and Sandy yelled: with the deliberate intent of defrauding the underwriters. As a matter of fact, the public is robbed as third time, kin I have the boat? well as the insurance company, for when arson is committed, the expenses of the fire must be spread over the entire community, in the cost of fire insurance. In this way, the innocent pay for the misdeeds of the guilty. Thus it is evident that, financially, the repression of arson is a vital matter to everybody, and that as a matter of public safety the fire fiend should be combatted at every turn.

There is still more important reason why the public should be intensely interested in curbing this vicious crime—the loss of life from fire is appalling, thousands are killed every year, particularly in arson fires. The fire-criminal generally does a thorough job, often working in the dead of the night. As a result, the fire spreads with terrible rapidity, and his victims awaken, horror stricken, to find themselves surrounded by flames and escape impossible. Then, too, this type of blaze has generally gained such headway before the firemen arrive, that a larger percentage of property is desroyed than in other fires.

The arsonist is a very dangerous factor in the fire situation and every citizen should bear down on him and all his kind.

#### ED HOWE SAYS:

The proper registration of births and deaths is fundamental to all sound public health work, and is an indication of the extent of civilization in any given community."

#### ALFALFA SEED CROP IS SMALLER THAN LAST YEAR

Alfalfa seed production in the United States is expected to be about one third smaller than a year ago. The U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics estimates production at about 33,000,000 pounds of countyrun seed compared with about 48,-000,000 pounds last year.

Acreage for seed in the country as a whole was as large as last year although a greater proportion was cut for hay. On the other hand, the difference in the yield per acre was more marked and was mainly responsible for the smaller production. The average yield of 358 growers whose aggregate production last year amounted to about one twentieth of the total crop of the United States, was 125 pounds compared with 160 pounds last year.

The decrease this year was due mainly to a marked reduction in yields in Utah and Idaho and the marked falling off in production in a few other producing states, namely, Texas and New Mexico. On the other hand, crops somewhat larger than or equal to those of a year ago were found in the majority of the remaining important districts.

In general damage from heavy frost in early September caused far greater loss than last year when the crop was earlier. Hot, dry winds doubtless caused a greater loss of blossoms than usual. Rains at blossoming time were also responsible for poor setting of seed pods. In several states losses were reported from different insect pects, including web worms, and especially grasshoppers which seemed to do much more damage than usual.




