

Other recommendations included the adoption of a constitutional amendment providing for the election, setting aside of one per cent of the gasoline tax revenue for state publicity, careful consideration of budgets and appropriations, abolition of property tax on automobiles, exemptions of airplanes from gasoline tax, continuance of the highway program, passage of a workmen's compensation law and creation of a state commissioner of labor, protection of oil resources and interstate streams, avoidance of useless legislation and limitation of the session to 30 days.
