



In Alabama, it is noted that at points where moss examinations were made the weevils were less abundant than in 1927. The only other record available for that state applies to the territory around Auburn, and here the weevils were somewhat more numerous in the fall of 1928 than in that of 1927.

Reports from Georgia indicate that weevils entered hibernation in about average numbers but in unusually good condition.

In South Carolina the weevils seemed quite generally more abundant than normally and particularly so in the Piedmont section. Food conditions in the fall were comparatively unfavorable in the coastal section and favorable in the Piedmont.

North Carolina reports indicate that weevils were somewhat less abundant than in 1927 but in good condition.

In Oklahoma the extremely "spotted" infestation during the summer continued into the fall and as a result extreme local variations were found. The general condition seemed to be that fewer weevils went into hibernation than in 1927.



STANDARD SIGNS NOW IN 28 STATES OF U. S.

SANTA FE. - Twenty-eight states have now adopted the standard method of highway markers as sponsored by the American Association of Highway Officials of which New Mexico was one of the first, according to bulletin released from the highway offices recently.

These states are being asked by the New Mexico Highway Department to advise their means of protecting these signs from highway vandals. "Defacing of signs has grown to be such a constant annoyance that means of protection must be taken immediately if New Mexico highways are not to be entirely devoid of signs within a short time," says the bulletin.

The states now having such signs are: Arizona, Georgia, Illinois, Indana, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Min-nestota, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Vermont, Virginia, West Virginia, Wisconsin, Wyo-
