CARRIES \$5,556,422 FOR NEXT BIENNIUM

SANTA FE .- The general money bill carrying total appropriations of \$5,556,422 for the next biennium and representing an increase of \$791,422 over the 1927 grants and a decrease of \$879,289 from appropriations requested was introduced in the house Tuesday by Chairman Ortiz y Pino of the house committee on finance.

The bill carries \$2,160,386 in general appropriations to departments and education, \$115,325 in special appropriations which are likely to receive favorable action, and then in addition to the appropriation figure for the next biennium there is a deficiency appropriation of \$49,-579.61 which applies to the remainder of the present fiscal year.

This \$49,579.61 appropriation increases the existing deficit of some \$288,000 to some \$337,000. The largest figure in the deficiency

appropriation is a deficit of \$5,669.61 which was left by the Randolph regime of the state department of education. Among the other deficiency items are \$2,500 for the capitol buildings fund, vocation education \$1,750, girl's welfare home \$2,160, and other minor items.





INTRODUCE BILL ON N. M. OIL AND GAS LANDS

SANTA FE .- A bill to lay down specifications on the leasing of oil and gas lands of New Mexico was introduced in the senate by Senator A. M. Edwards.

The bill provides for a minimum lease period of five years with minimum rental of \$1.00 for the first year, and minimum lease of five cents an acre, together with oneeighth royalties on common school

The bill is designed to supplant the oil and gas lease schedule as recently set down by the state land office and which was later withdrawn in the face of objections. The land office then put the proposition up to the legislature to name the oil and gas terms.

At the same time house bill 229, sponsored by Speaker Baca, Madrid and Kellahin was introduced to provide for the conservation of the oil and gas resources of the state, to prevent waste and to permit operators in the same district to make agreements on a cooperative basis to curtail production and conserve.

NEW SERUM MAY SAVE THE LIVES OF THREE

CHICAGO, Ill.-A new serum for use in counteracting the effects of certain poisons was believed Tuesday to have saved the lives of three Swift and company stenographers who became ill last week after eating contaminated foods.

The serum was brougth here by airplane and administered to the victims at Wesley Memorial hospital in time to save them from what physicans at first regarded as almost certain deaths.
