A friend in Texas writes as follows: "Our farmers would have made money last year had they planted feedstuff instead of cotton, as feed is high and cotton

corn, sorghums and other feedstuffs should be raised; but the main thing they are overlooking is vegetables, which could be produced here in commercial quantities and shipped to the Panhandle of Texas where they could be sold at a good price.

A LESSON IN APPLIED BUSINESS METHODS

A special communication to the Christian Science Monitor says:

"Improved methods have enabled Baltimore, Mary- they live. land to increase its collections from 79.92 per cent of its assessed taxes in 1923 to 95.79 per cent in 1928, following the organization of the Bureau of Receipts by the efficiency and economy commission.

Working in conjunction with the bureau's modernized auditing and billing department, tax collections have steadily increased through the employment of a discount allowed for pmompt payment of taxes and by a gradually increased rate of interest with penalties for those who fail to pay after a reasonable length of time. The system, by making it greatly to taxpayers' advantage to pay their tax bills within the year, is in this way also helping to keep the tax rate low.

"When the commission set out to recognize the municipal government on a business basis, they found records of uncollected taxes to the amount of \$11,000,-

"As soon as the Bureau of Receipts was organized and began operating, most of this money began pour-time. ing into the treasury, and a noticeable reduction in the tax rate resulted.

It should be stated that this remarkable improvement in Baltimore's governmental affairs was the result of choosing as members of the efficiency and economy commission, a leading executive from each of nearly a score of the city's largest industrial, business and transportation corporations. These gentlemen were given a free hand to reorganize the city's methods of doing business and place them on a basis comparable to a well managed private corporation.




