Mrs. Robinson was six and a half years old when "The stars fell," one of the strangest phenomena witnessed by residents of the past century, many of whom thought the end of time was at hand.

Mrs. Robinson believes that people are just as young as they feel and this is one reason that she intends to keep on living just as long as she can. She amuses herself by composing little songs and singing them to her hosts. -Artesia Advocate.

Her nearest competitor was an eight year old Holstein in the herd of Tom Holmsby which produced 593.7 pounds of fat and 17,847 pounds of milk. June, the Holstein cow in the Mandell herd that won first place last year with 521.8 pounds of fat and 16,073 pounds of milk, came in third this year with a record of 572.0 pounds of fat and 16,193 pounds of milk.

This record of Mandell's Beauty was made at the age of ten years. She was in milk but eleven months of the year's test and produced \$442.06 worth of milk over the cost of her feed.


