TRANSPORTATION OF PUPILS (Taxpavers Assn. of New Mexico)

The taxpayers' Association of New Mexico has completed a tabulation of statistics with reference to the transportation of pupils in New Mexico. These figures were made available in information requested from various counties by Carl D. Comstock, educational budget auditor. Twenty-four of the thirty-one counties of the state submitted their reports covering in all 400 transportation routes. 

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## LOVINGTON WILL GET TWO RAILROADS AS **RESULT OF LATE RULING**

WASHINGTON, D. C .- Authority for the Texas-New Mexico boundary Lovington, in Lea county, New Mexico, was granted Friday by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The commission also permitted the South Plains and Santa Fe Railroad to extend its lines from Seagraves in Gaines county, Texas, to Lovington, 46 miles. Application for construction of a branch line from Lovington south for about 43 miles was denied.

Each of the applicants intervened in opposition to the petition of the other, and the New Mexico State Corporation Commission recommended that both applications be granted.

The Texas-New Mexico, subsidiary of the Texas and Pacific, filed its application first, estimating cost at \$1,825,000. Later the South Plains application was filed. Its branch, which was denied approval, would parallel closely the construction proposed by the other line.

Later Examiner H. C. Davis recommended to the commission that sible for the change. the South Plains main line be constructed but its branch line proposal be not allowed. The South Plains company protested with the assertion that the projected construction should be authorized in full and also held that Davis erred in ruling that the route of the Texas-New Mexico would more adequately serve the affected territory.

#### Ancient Formula Used

by Our Modern Painter We moderns often find ourselves feeling a bit superior towards the poor mortals who eked out an existence back in the Middle or Dark ages, but occasionally we find that some things have not changed so much after all. In ancient times it was the practice of artists to paint their pictures on panels of wood instead of canvas. This necessitated careful preparation of the surface to secure perfect smoothness and protection from atmospheric conditions. It is interesting to note that the following procedure recommended by Braclius in his "First Metrical Book" believed to have been written in the Tenth century, does not differ greatly from the modern method of preparing wood panels for decoration.

"First make the wood very smooth, by scraping and rubbing it down with shave grass. If you cannot shave down the inequalities in this way, and do not wish to cover it with leather or with cloth, grind dry whitelead upon a stone, but not so finely as if you were going to paint with it; then melt wax over the fire in a vase, add tiles finely ground, then mix it with the white-lead you have ground, stirring it frequently with a stick, and so let it cool; then heat an iron, and with it melt the wax into the little fissures until they are level, and then scrape the rough parts with a knife. When you have made it smooth mix plenty of white-lead, very finely ground, with linseed oil, and lay on an excessively thin coat of it wherever you intend to paint with a brush, made of asshair, adapted for that purpose. When this is done lay on, as you did before, another and thicker coat of it-not thicker by having a greater quantity of color but by having less oil in it; for you must take care never to lay on the color too fat, for if you do this, and lay on a great deal of it, when it begins to dry wrinkles will form on the surface of it."

The modern painter, while he uses sandpaper instead of having shave grass and also white-lead putty instead of the mixture recommended by Eraclius, still mixes his paint with "white-lead very finely ground with linseed oil." However, the modern painter has found that after the sandpapering has been done a priming coat should be applied before puttying and the second and third coats then applied. This has been found to be the best method of filling and

## BONDED INDEBTEDNESS OF NEW MEX. REACHES THE \$21,000,000 MARK

SANTA FE-New Mexico and its political subdivisions on June 30, 1929, had a bonded debt totaling \$21,086,471, according to figures released Monday by Rupert Asplund, director of the taxpayers' association. The per capita indebtedness is \$55 for each man, woman and child in the state.

These figures do not include any certificates of indebtedness against the state nor any special district improvement bonds, nor bonds for the construction of irrigation, drainage or conservancy districts, Mr. Asplund

Of the total municipal indebtedness of \$6,382,655, more than half is for the construction of water works range around the sardines on a and some \$1,784,300 is for sewer

This total indebtedness requires \$1,000,000 per year interest, and another \$1,000,000 per year sinking fund to retire the bonds.

Maulecado,-Melt one cupful of sugar, pour over one cupful of shelled walnuts and when cool pound fine. Brown 12 macaroons in the oven, roll and add to a custard made as follows: Two eggs, one cupful of milk, beat the yolks and fold in the whites after the milk and yolks have been cooked. Add one plut of cream, one-third of a cupful of sugar, add to the custard and flavor with maraschino; freeze; when half frozen add one-half of the nuts and serve with the rest sprinkled over the top when serving.

Codfish Balls .- To three pints of boiling water add one cupful of shredded codfish, one pint of potatoes quartered; cook until the potatoes are soft, drain, mash and beat until smooth; add one tablespoonful of butter, salt and pepper to taste; cool and add one well-beaten egg. Shape in a tablespoon and fry in deep fat.

Almond Soup .- Chop fine one cupful of blanched almonds, add one quart of thin cream and simmer five minutes. Bind with two tablespoonfuls of flour and one tablespoonful of butter, cooked together. Serve very hot with a spoonful of whipped cream on top of each cup.

Clove Cake .- Take two cupfuls of brown sugar, one cupful of butter, cream well, add one cupful of sour milk and three cupfuls of flour, three beaten eggs, one pound of raisins chopped, one-half a grated nutmeg, two teaspoonfuls of cloves, one teaspoonful each of cinnamon and soda. Bake in a loaf. Cover with a light icing and it will keep like fruit cake.




