ATWOOD REHEARING IN MALONE LEASE CASE

SANTA FE-The state supreme court Tuesday granted Attorney J. D. Atwood of Roswell permission to file a motion for a second re-hearing in the J. D. Malone oil lease case against State Land Commissioner A. D. Crile.

The Malone case involves interpretation of the New Mexico oil leasing code with regard to preferential rights to re-lease. This case has been decided against Malone in the district court of Judge Reed Holloman, who has so far been twice

The supreme court, on the appeal from district court, denied the mandamus sought by Malone. Then a first re-hearing was granted, and the court a second time denied the mandamus. The motion Tuesday asks the supreme court to make a third consideration of the case.

The supreme court and district court both both have held that to exercise a preferential right, the lessee must meet the highest bid offered on the land when it is re-submitted at public auction, in case in which the lessee has made no attempt to desister-in-law, Mrs. Hazel Payne Mil- velop the land held under the original

NOTICE OF APPEAL OF STATE OIL LAND CASE TO BE FILED SATURDAY

U. S. District Judge Colin Neblett of Santa Fe, has handed down a decision which may be far reaching in its effects on the drilling for oil and gas on various homesteads in this state. The court holds that when Uncle Sam reserves "coal and other minerals" in granting a patent to a homestead, he also reserves oil and gas underlying these lands. The decision is in the equity case

of Ivan L. Skeen vs. Beulah V. Lynch, et al, the various defendants residing all over the west from Oklahoma to California and Colorado. The Court's Decision

The court's decision is as follows: "No. 1977, equity-Ivan L. Skeen vs. Beulah V. Lynch et al; Order:

"Defendant's motion to dismiss in the above entitled cause having heretofore come on for hearing, and after listening to the arguments of counsel the court took said motion under advisement as submitted; and now having considered said motion, including briefs filed by both parties and being fully advised.

"The court is of the opinion that for the purpose of constructing the language 'coal and other minerals' as used in the act of December 29, 1916, the United States of America is not a necessary or indispensible party; and the court is further of the opinion that the words 'coal and other minerals' as used in said statute reserved to the United States all of the oil and gas underlying lands embraced within a homestead entry under such statute. "The court does not determine

whether or not plaintiff had a preference right to obtain from the United State a permit to prospect for gas and oil for the reason that it is without jurisdiction in the absence of the United State or the secretary of the interior as a party to the suit.

"Therefore, it is ordered, adjudged and decreed that defendant's motion to dismiss be and the same is hereby sustained for the reasons given, to which ruling of the court plaintiff by his counsel duly excepts."

This was a suit to quiet title and was removed from the district court of Lea county. The attorney for plaintiff was Tom W. Neal of Lovington, and for the defendants were Reid, Hervey, Dow and Hill of Roswell; Emmett Patton of Roswell, G. U. McCrary of Artesia .- Santa Fe New Mexican

Lemon Crumb Pudding .- Pour two cupfuls of milk over two cupfuls of bread crumbs, add one-fourth of a teaspoonful of salt, one-fourth cupful of sugar, one beaten egg, the grated rind of a lemon, three tablespoonfuls of the juice of a lemon and one tablespoonful of melted butter. Pour into a buttered baking dish and serve with a creamy pudding sauce.

Creamy Sauce.-Beat one egg, add three-fourths of a cupful of powdered sugar, one cupful of cream whipped, two tablespoonfuls of orange juice and one tablespoonful of lemon juice. Serve ice cold. This sauce may be

used for various puddings. Maple Biscuit.-Make ordinary baking powder biscuit, roll thin, spread with butter and finely shaved or grated maple sugar. Roll as a jelly roll cut into slices and bake in a hot oven. Serve hot. Nice served with a sauce for pudding.


FERTILITY OF ARMENIAN LANDS MAY BE HELPED .-The droughty fields of Russian Armenia may have their crops increased by water from Lake Sewang, a great body of water with a surface area of 464 square miles. It has often been proposed to use this water for irrigation, but the authorities have always hesitated to take action, because of the general impression that the lake was of volcanic origin and comparatively shallow, and hence that its water resources were relatively limited, Recently, however, a special commission of the Russian Academy of Sciences has made a careful examination of the geology of the lake, and has discovered that it occupies a natural deep rock basin, simflar to that in which Lake Superior lies. Its average depth is more than 300 feet, and since it receives not only numerous surface streams but also the discharge of large subterranean rivers, it is believed that it contains so much water that the removal of a part for irrigation will not seriously affect its level. The erroneous impression that the lake was of volcanic origin arose from the presence along its shores of numerous lava masses which have been proved to be of more recent date than the rivers that flow

into and out of it.

How Ruling on Patents Affects the Inventor

After receiving a patent on an article while employed for a manufacturing concern, can that concern claim

your patent if it will benefit thereby? The rule is that in the absence of an explicit contract to the contrary such an invention belongs to the employee. If, however, the invention pertains to the work in which the employee is employed, the invention belongs to the employee, but the employer is entitled to a "shop right"that is, the right to use the invention in his shop or factory. If the invention is outside the line of the employee's work and is made in his own time and without his employers tools or material, the invention belongs to the employee exclusively. If the employee is employed to work out a specific problem or to design a machine and the employee thereby makes an invention, such invention belongs to the employer. In many large establishments employees are required to sign agreements to assign to the employing company all inventions made relating to the business of the company. In each case application for patent can only be made by the actual inventor, if living, regardless of the ownership of the invention.— Washington Star.



ROAD FROM MONUMENT UP TO JAL COMPLETED SAYS HIGHWAY REPORT

A large crew is at work at the state line south of Jal building an plated road over the heavy sand in that section. This work will be finished shortly after the first of the

Roads in this section have heretofore been "miserable cow trails" to quote the engineer's report. With the coming of the heavy oil field traffic the condition had to be remedied in order to facilitate oil field development, which is proving one of the state's biggest assets. Good graded roads are now leading out into the oil fields with the resultant acceleration of traffic and cheaper transportation, he states.



FIVE YEAR OIL LEASE UNDER 1929 LAW IS UPHELD IN DECISION

SANTA FE-District Judge Reed Holloman Friday held that lease holders who convert their old leases under section 14 of the 1929 oil lease code are entitled to a new lease for a full five-year period.

Judge Holloman, therefore, granted the mandamus sought by the Atlantic Oil and Producing company to compel State Land Commissioner A. D. Crile to grant it a full five year lease in place of its old lease and instead of a lease for the unexpired

Dr. Crile had held that section 14 entitled the holder to a new lease the state of Missouri. The Hampbut only for the unexpired term.

Judge Holloman views this oil lease' case as one of the most important which has confronted the state in many years, and the construction of section 14 affects some 500 oil lands lease-holders immediately and more than 300 whose oil leases expire during the next year.

How to Make Glass Shine

When you wish your windows, mirrors or the glass doors of bookcases or china cabinets to look exceptionally nice, take a clean chamols skin and rinse out a basin of lukewarm water to which a tablespoonful of household ammonia has been added. Begin at the top and wash downward in long, straight strokes. Never wash around or upward. The point is to keep the strokes downward only. Repeat until the surface is clean, and let dry. No wiping will be necessary, and the knack of having a lintless, sparkling and clear glass with a minimum of effort is easily learned.

Do not wash the window when the sun shines upon it, as it is more likely to be streaked;

How Human Brain Grows

At birth the brain weight is about one-third of the weight at maturity. The increase is very rapid during the first year; quite rapid during the next seven and eight years; after this it becomes very slow. The maximum weight is attained in man between the an between the fortleth and fiftleth years. A premaximum of thirteen to fifteen for males and of about fourteen for females indicating a too vigorous growth seems to be the most important cause of death at this age. At the end of the eighth year when the brain has almost completed its growth, the body has reached to a third of its mature weight. At birth the brain forms 12 per cent of the total weight of the body, while in the adult it forms 2 per cent or less.

How Bell Is "Toned"

The McShane Bell Foundry company says that the "toning" of a bell is considered by practically all bell founders as a secret process; the fundamental requirements, however, are based on perfect mathematical calculations and acoustics. In other words, a bell to be of perfect tone chould be perfectly proportioned in relation to its diameter, height, width across the top and wall thickness. If the proportions are correct the resultant tone of the bell will be likewise correct to the note for which the bell was designed. 

WOULD MAKE LIQUOR PURCHASERS GUILTY UNDER PRESENT LAW

WASHINGTON, D. C .- A test before the supreme court of the culpability of purchasers of liquor under the present law was advocated Tuesday by Senator Jones of Washington, republican dry leader, in connection with the legislation now pending to make purchasers equally guilty with bootleggers.





NOTICE OF APPEAL OF STATE OIL LAND CASE TO BE FILED SATURDAY

" U. S. District Judge Colin Neblett of Santa Fe, has handed down a decision which may be far reaching in its effects on the drilling for oil and gas on various homesteads in this state. The court holds that when Uncle Sam reserves "coal and other minerals" in granting a patent to a homestead, he also reserves oil and gas underlying these lands.

The decision is in the equity case of Ivan L. Skeen vs. Beulah V. Lynch, et al, the various defendants residing all over the west from Oklahoma to California and Colorado. The Court's Decision

The court's decision is as follows: No. 1977, equity-Ivan L. Skeen vs. Beulah V. Lynch et al; Order:

"Defendant's motion to dismiss in the above entitled cause having heretofore come on for hearing, and after listening to the arguments of counsel the court took said motion under advisement as submitted: and now having considered said motion, including briefs filed by both parties and being fully advised.

"The court is of the opinion that for the purpose of constructing the language 'coal and other minerals' as used in the act of December 29, 1916, the United States of America is not a necessary or indispensible party; and the court is further of the opinion that the words 'coal and other minerals' as used in said statute reserved to the United States all of the oil and gas underlying lands embraced within a homestead entry under such statute.

"The court does not determine whether or not plaintiff had a preference right to obtain from the United State a permit to prospect for gas and oil for the reason that it is without jurisdiction in the absence of the United State or the secretary of the interior as a party to the suit.

"Therefore, it is ordered, adjudged and decreed that defendant's motion to dismiss be and the same is hereby sustained for the reasons given, to which ruling of the court plaintiff by his counsel duly excepts.'

This was a suit to quiet title and was removed from the district court of Lea county. The attorney for plaintiff was Tom W. Neal of Lovington, and for the defendants were Reid, Hervey, Dow and Hill of Roswell; Emmett Patton of Roswell, G. U. McCrary of Artesia.-Santa Fe New Mexican.



ECONOMICAL DISHES



Meat Pie.-Cut fine or chop any left over meat, add any cooked vegetables and gravy and mix with a good white sauce, season well with onlog, salt and pepper, cover with a biscuit dough or small biscults, or a layer of leftover mashed potato brushed with egg. Bake in a moderate oven until well heated through.

Poverty Puiding. - The wealthy need not spurn this pudding for it is good: Take six cupfuls of milk, one-half cupful of rice, one-half cupful of sugar, one teaspoonful of salt, one-half teaspoonful of nutmeg and one-half cupful of rasins. Put all together in a baking dish and place in a moderate oven. Stir frequently at first, then occasionally. Butter or finely minced suet will add to the richness of the pudding.


HOW:

LANDS MAY BE HELPED .-The droughty fields of Russian Armenia may have their crops increased by water from Lake Sewang, a great body of water with a surface area of 464 square miles. It has often been proposed to use this water for irrigation, but the authorities have always hesitated to take action, because of the general impression that the lake was of volcanic origin and comparatively shallow, and hence that its water resources were relatively limited, Recently, however, a special commission of the Russian Academy of Sciences has made a careful examination of the geology of the lake, and has discovered that it occupies a natural deep rock basin, simflar to that in which Lake Superior lies. Its average depth is more than 300 feet, and since it receives not only numerous surface streams but also the discharge of large subterranean rivers, it is believed that it contains so much water that the removal of a part for irrigation will not seriously affect its level. The erroneous impression that the lake was of volcanic origin arose from the presence along its shores of numerous lava masses which have been proved to be of more recent date than the rivers that flow into and out of it.

How Ruling on Patents Affects the Inventor

After receiving a patent on an article while employed for a manufacturing concern, can that concern claim

The rule is that in the absence of an explicit contract to the contrary such an invention belongs to the employee. If, however, the invention pertains to the work in which the employee is employed, the invention belongs to the employee, but the employer is entitled to a "shop right"that is, the right to use the invention in his shop or factory. If the invention is outside the line of the employee's work and is made in his own time and without his employers tools or material, the invention belongs to the employee exclusively. If the employee is employed to work out a specific problem or to design a machine and the employee thereby makes an invention, such invention belongs to the employer. In many large establishments employees are required to sign agreements to assign to the employing company all inventions made relating to the business of the company. In each case application for patent can only be made by the actual inventor, if living, regardless of the ownership of the invention,-Washington Star.

Roads in this section have heretofore been "miserable cow trails" to quote the engineer's report. With the coming of the heavy oil field traffic the condition had to be remedied in order to facilitate oil field development, which is proving one of the state's biggest assets. Good graded roads are now leading out into the oil fields with the resultant acceleration of traffic and cheaper transportation, he states.



SANTA FE-District Judge Reed Holloman Friday held that lease holders who convert their old leases under section 14 of the 1929 oil lease code are entitled to a new lease for a full five-year period.

Judge Holloman, therefore, granted the mandamus sought by the Atlantic Oil and Producing company to compel State Land Commissioner A. D. Crile to grant it a full five year lease in place of its old lease and instead of a lease for the unexpired Hampshire ewe lambs were purchased

Dr. Crile had held that section 14 entitled the holder to a new lease but only for the unexpired term.

How to Make Glass Shine

When you wish your windows, mirrors or the glass doors of bookcases or china cabinets to look exceptionally nice, take a clean chamols skin and rinse out a basin of lukewarm water to which a tablespoonful of household ammonia has been added. Begin at the top and wash downward in long, straight strokes. Never wash around or upward. The point is to keep the strokes downward only. Repeat until the surface is clean, and let dry. No wiping will be necessary, and the knack of having a lintless, sparkling and clear glass with a minimum of effort is easily learned.

How Human Brain Grows

At birth the brain weight is about one-third of the weight at maturity. The increase is very rapid during the first year; quite rapid during the next seven and eight years; after this it becomes very slow. The maximum years. A premaximum of thirteen to fifteen for males and of about fourteen for females indicating a too vigorous growth seems to be the most important cause of death at this age. At the end of the eighth year when the brain has almost completed its growth, the body has reached to a third of its mature weight. At birth the brain forms 12 per cent of the total weight of the body, while in the adult it forms 2 per cent or less.

How Bell Is "Toned"

The McShane Bell Foundry company says that the "toning" of a bell is considered by practically all bell founders as a secret process; the fundamental requirements, however, are based on perfect mathematical calculations and acoustics. In other words, a bell to be of perfect tone chould be perfectly proportioned in relation to its diameter, height, width across the top and wall thickness. 
