

In the Town of Gallup a tax committee has been organized to study bugets and bond proposals. It would be well for every county, municipality and school district to have such a committee-not to prevent necessary expenditures, but to investigate all matters involving of a criminal being arrested and punished that reform taxation and public finances. With such a committee, a community could rest in greater assurance that their tax contributions would be economically and efficiently expended.

Bond issues mean increased tax levies. It would be unfortunate if expenditures should be increased in this manner at the time when every effort is being made to bring about a revision of assessments on a more equitable basis. If expenditures were kept level with the previous year, the increased valuations would result in lower tax rates. Heavier levies for interest and sinking funds, however, will nullify any decrease and make the equalization of assessments more and more difficult.

The bonded indebtedness of New Mexico and its subsidiaries has increased by leaps and bounds. If special improvement bonds and the burden of irrigation and drainage districts are disregarded. New Mexico property is still pledged for \$21,000,000 according to compilations made by the Taxpayers' Association of New Mexico--debts which the taxpayers of this generation must pay. With tax rates mounting to four, five, and six per cent of the assessment, it is clear that the addition of numerous apparently insignificant levies has several of the bond proposals about to be submitted. already increased the load to staggering proportions. NEW MEXICO PLANS \$18,000,000 PUBLIC WORK


More than \$17,500,000 in public works, including highways and the Middle Rio Grande conservancy district, are planned in New Mexico, said Governor Dillon in a letter to Secretary of Commerce R. P. Lamont Friday.

December 18, the governor sent Secretary Lamont a report on building contemplated in this state to carry out President Hoover's plan to speed up building. Including roads he gave the total as \$6,639,312 at that time.

In Friday's letter the governor lists additional roads and works, bringing the figure up to \$7,761,312. The Middle Rio Grande conservancy district accounts for the remaining \$10,000,000.

In the Town of Gallup a tax committee has been organized to study bugets and bond proposals. It would be well for every county, municipality and school district to have such a committee-not to prevent necessary expenditures, but to investigate all matters involving taxation and public finances. With such a committee, a community could rest in greater assurance that their tax contributions would be economically and efficiently expended.


Bond issues mean increased tax levies. It would be unfortunate if expenditures should be increased in this manner at the time when every effort is being made to bring about a revision of assessments on a more equitable basis. If expenditures were kept level with the previous year, the increased valuations would result in lower tax rates. Heavier levies for interest and sinking funds, however, will nullify any decrease and make the equalization of assessments more and more difficult.

The bonded indebtedness of New Mexico and its subsidiaries has increased by leaps and bounds. If special improvement bonds and the burden of irrigation and drainage districts are disregarded. New Mexico property is still pledged for \$21,000,000 according to compilations made by the Taxpayers' Association of New Mexico--debts which the taxpayers of this generation must pay. With tax rates mounting to four, five, and six per cent of the assessment, it is clear that the addition of numerous apparently insignificant levies has several of the bond proposals about to be submitted. already increased the load to staggering proportions. 

A poultry house for sitting hens should be secluded, slightly darkened, and separated from the houses for layers and breeders. Place the nests so that the hens won't have to fly or jump into them.

Cowpeas for hay are better if grown with other crops than alone. The sorghums (sorgos and kafirs), Sudan grass, Johnson grass, soy-beans, and millet are suitable. Sorgos or kafirs, when grown with cowpeas make a good hay or silage. This mixture cures more easily than cowpeas alone, makes a well-balanced ration, and is relished by all kinds of livestock.

If the dairyman buys all his feed, hires all his labor, and disposes of the milk at current wholesale prices he will make little if any money. If he buys all his feed and does all his own work he may make day wages. To make the greatest profit raise most or all the feed and market it

through the dairy cow at a price at least equal to what the same feed would cost on the market.

Poultrymen always used to cool the eggs hatching in an incubator by ops. The chief peril of taking them out for a short time each day. It has been found that this practice is unnecessary, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture, except

when the temperature of the incubator has been running too high. To decide whether to cool eggs or not, notice the size of the air cell, which should gradually increase in size. If the development is too rapid, cool the eggs until they feel slightly cool to the touch.

It's a good idea to make a small outdoor seedbed, with specially prepared soil, in a corner of the farm garden, to start the plants. They will be more stocky if started here and later transplanted. A good soil mixture for the seedbed is one part of well rotted manure, two parts of **BRINGS MANY INQUIRES** one part of sharp, fine sand. The addition of leaf mold or peat makes the soil better. Mix the materials well and sift the soil.





Interest in our training school is growing. The text books have arrived and can be secured from Mrs. J. W. Campbell.


