## WM. JAMES PIONEER HAGERMAN RESIDENT DIES MONDAY EVENING

Hagerman-Where the spring

The entire community was saddened Monday evening by the death of one of its pioneer and best loved residents, Mr. William James, who passed away at the family home at Seven o'clock after an illness of two weeks.

Mr. James, who was born in Coulterville, Illinois, September 5, 1846 was eighty-three years of age. He had lived in Hagerman for twenty years, managing a productive farm during this time, and being ever ready to lend hearty support to religious or civic work.

Pioneering in Nebraska in 1872, he early learned to meet the hardships of life with a smile of strength that characterized his life to the end. ### THE CHAUTAUQUA

Several years ago citizens of Artesia refused to give the chatauqua managers a financial guarantee and the chatauqua quit coming. Now citizens of Roswell and Carlsbad are about to do the same thing. Talking moving pictures and the radio it seems have almost sounded the death knell of the chatauqua. Automobiles too have played a part in the undoing of this form of entertainment. Smaller towns unusually got second rate performers. Citizens who really cared for this sort of entertainment preferred to drive to the larger centers where better performers were available.

We do not believe, however, that the radio and modern mode of travel is wholly responsible for the decline of the chatauqua. Its principle of operation platform. was wrong. The lyceum and the chatauqua are the only two institutions, which demanded a financial guarantee before they would consent to appear in a community. Other entertainments were willing to take a chance.

Regardless of how public spirited a citizen or group of citizens may be, they will finally tire of digging up from \$5.00 to \$50.00 each time the chatauqua or lyceum rels. comes around.
