Diseases of Goldfish

Fungus diseases often attack the goldfish, sometimes so severely that there is nothing to do but make a fresh start. One remedy for the disease is a salt bath, using a heaping teaspoonful of salt to two quarts of water. The patient should be left for about a week in this solution, which is renewed daily. If no noticeable improvement is shown in four days, increase strength of solution to about double, leaving the fish in this for two days. Then reduce the solution to its original proportions after which the fish may be returned to the aquarium.

THE COMMON SCHOOL APPROPRIATION IS OVER HUNDRED MILLION

apportionment among the common schools this year, according to Deputy State Treasurer Harry Fincke.

The treasurer's report for June, the last month of the fiscal year showed \$1,064,438.23 in the common schools income fund and \$190,429.47 in the income fund in addition there may be dissolved with turpentine or will be the June and July receipts of alcohol or may be rubbed off with a the state land office and the unused balance of the land offices maintenance fund.

The apportionment which is about the same as last year will be made this summer by Superintendent Atan-Montoya and school auditor Carl Comstock, on the basis of the school census.

The state closed the fiscal year out of the red. The \$200,000 worth of casual certificates of indebtedness have been taken up and the appropriations account which has heretafore showed a deficit had a balance of \$214,561.30 on the opening of the nineteenth fiscal year.

The appropriations for July however total \$356,000, so the state will be back to normal by August 1, Mr. Fincke said, because the legislatuer failed to provide for running the state from the fiscal year on July until taxes begin to come in December 1.

Treasurer Watts' report for June showed a balance of \$1,230,552.92 in the state road fund all of which is available for construction because the state highway debentures are

retired from a separate sinking fund. Treasurer Watts said there was a balance of \$4,732,875.88 to the state's account in banks.

The appropriations account balance was boosted \$48,555.23 in motor therefore belong in the general fund.

The original intention was to turn this money over to the state road fund but the last legislature omitted that specification from the motor bus act.

The surfacing of State Road 3, between Alamogordo and the White Sand is now underway using road material from local pits. The work will surface 15 miles of road toward the White Sands which are becoming an increasing source of interest to tourists.



OIL INDUSTRY FACING ADJUSTMENT PROGRAM TWO BILLION DOLLARS

Today, the oil industry, with assets conservatively estimated at eleven billion dollars, is facing expenditures that, within the next five years, will porbably aggregate two billion dollars.

This staggering sum will be used to reaadjust the industry to stupenduous changes that have been quietly at work, some of them for years, but that today stand as the most vital factors in the industry's future.

In the next five years unitization, the transportation of gasoline by pipe lines, the hydrogenation will have "made over" the entire oil industry. At a cost to the industry of probably two billion dollars these three great lines of evolution will save the industry untold millions of dollars.

Unitization, or the retarded and orderly development of new oil fields by "pooling" the interests of the different companies and holding production of crude oil to the requirements of the market, will save tens of millions of dollars in the drilling up of new oil fields.

A barrel of gasoline is worth about two and a half times as much as a barrel of crude oil and will travel through a pipe line several times as oil is collected and utilized in the profast as crude oil. In the next five years hundreds of millions of dollars will be poured into pipe line systems to transport gasoline-and the public is going to wonder why this wasn't done years ago.

The old-fashioned refinery with its skimming process recovered about twenty per cent gasoline from the average barrel of crude. Then came the cracking process, widely used for the last ten years, and that increased the total recovery of gasoline to about fifty per cent.

Now comes the hydrogenation process that will turn a barrel of almost any kind of crude oil into a barrel of gasoline. Hydrogenation process refineries will quickly force all other types of refineries to re- dine consumers .- New York Times. adjust their equipment and line of products to a basis that will enable them to survive in the terrific competition that will follow the general use of hydrogenation.

The startling fact in connection with the hydrogenation process is, that when the time arrives that half of all the crude oil run to refinery stills in the United States goes thru hydrogenation plants (estimated to be about the year of 1934) it will require much less crude oil than was run to stills in the year 1929.

Every year hundreds of millions of dollars will be saved in the drilling up of new oil fields-tens of milions will be saved in the cost of transportating gasoline-and hundreds of millions of barrels of crude oil will be saved because of the big reduction in the amount needed for refining

For five years the word "conservation" has been coupled with the oil industry in a somewhat accusing way -as though the industry were guilty of wastefulness in nearly every department. But out of it all emerges these three definite proofs of conservation of the highest type-Stupedous in cost to the oil industryand stupendous in saving.

Why Ideas About Lucky and Unlucky Days Differ

The scarcity of marriages on Friday proves how many people still have a lingering faith in the ill-luck of the sixth day of the week. There never was a more foolish superstition, and Friday is certainly not England's unlucky day, says an article in Pearson's Weekly. It is a funny thing that sallors are more superstitious about Friday than landsmen, yet it is the lucky day of the British navy. The great defeat of the Spanish Armada occurred on Friday, July 29, 1588, and since then at least a dozen of our greatest naval victories have been won on Fri day. What, then, is the worst day of the week? If you ask a tradesmen he will probably say Tuesday, and in the telephone department of the post office, which is a barometer of both business and pleasure, Tuesday is looked upon as less harassing than other business days. Not long ago Lord Ashfield pointed out that Londoners travel less on Tuesdays than on any other day of the week. The only important people who dissent from this view are theatrical managers, who declare that Monday is their worst day.

Why Windows Steam

One of the main causes of the steamng of windows is lack of proper ventilation. The main thing is to insure circulation of air. The application of gelatin is often helpful. Wipe down the windows with a rag squeezed out of gelatin, or use a soft potash soap to which sufficient glycerin is added to make a thin paste. When a thin film of either of these is applied to the glass the condensed moisture spreads out to a film and does not collect in fine drops, which cause the dimming of glass.

Why Cord About Arm

The wearing of a cord looped about the left arm and fastened at the shoulder is a French military decoration, presented to : unit of troops for distinguished service or conspicuous gallantry in time of war. It is worn by all the men of the troops thus honored and borne on the colors. Fourrageres are in three colors, red, green and yellow, corresponding to the color of the ribbons of certain French military medals. Combinations of these colors are used to form the double fourragere.

RESERVE SYSTEM'S **DIVIDENDS ANALYZED**

Bankers Find Increased Payments to Member Banks Would Be Small Inducement.

Various proposals that member banks in the Federal Reserve System should participate more largely in its net earnings through an increase in the dividend rate above the present fixed 6 per cent "would be a very small financial inducement" to them, it is declared in a recent study of this subject by the Economic Policy Commission of the American Bankers Association. This is shown, the commission says, by a theoretical forecast, on the basis of the past six years, of additional earnings that would be disoursed to member banks during the next six years under two plans introduced in bills before the United States

"The Fletcher bill provides that present 6 per cent dividends to members and completion of a 100 per cent surplus, should all be distributed as extra dividends to the stockholder banks," the report says. "If the earnings of each Federal Reserve bank were distributed among its own members there would be no extra dividends in the Boston, New York, Philaadelphia, Cleveland, Chicago and San Francisco districts during the next six years, but the other six Federal Reserve Banks would pay annual extras at the following rates: Richmond, 6.08 per cent; Atlanta, 4.09 per cent; St. Louis, 3.50 per cent; Minneapolis, 9.51 per cent; Kansas City, 5.48 per cent: Dallas, 4.83 per cent.

"If the earnings were pooled and paid out to all members in all districts each member would receive an average annual extra dividend of .78 per cent. Under this plan no franchise tax as now would be paid by the Federal Reserve Banks to the Federal Government

Another Pian Analyzed

"The Glass bill would provide that, after present 6 per cent dividends, one-half the remainder should be paid to member banks as an extra dividend with the residue going to surplus and Federal Government as franchise tax. The average annual extras to members would be as follows: Boston District, 2.51 per cent; New York, .48 per cent; Philadelphia, 2.05 per cent; Cleveland, 2.09 per cent; Richmond, 3.26 per cent; Atlanta, 4.67 per cent; Chicago, 3.20 per cent; St. Louis, 2.02 per cent; Minneapolis, 4.75 per cent; Kansas City, 2.74 per cent; Dallas, 3.31 per cent; San Francisco, 1.87

"If these extra funds were pooled the result would be an extra average annual dividend of 1.73 per cent for each member. Under this plan the system would still pay as now an annual franchise tax, amounting to \$1,941,996 on the average."

By way of concrete instance, the report says, a member bank having capital and surplus of \$200,000, therefore holding Federal Reserve Bank stock amounting to \$6,000 on which it is receiving \$360 under the present 6 per cent dividend arrangement, would with the addition of each 1 per cent to the dividend rate receive an addi-

tional income of \$60 a year. "If each member bank will figure out for itself the dollar-and-cents gain it would enjoy we are confident it will be agreed that the gains are small as against the economic disadvantages which can be pointed out," it conTREASURY SURPLUS \$200,000,000

FRIGHT ACTUALLY CAUSES HAIRS TO STAND ERECT .-Hair-raising by fright is a reallty and not a mere figure of speech. Each hair on the bodles of mammals, including human beings, is equipped with a tiny muscle capable, when prop erly stimulated, of pulling the hair erect. These muscles are all connected with the sympa thetic nervous system by means of nerve fibers and they can act simultaneously in response to a single stimulus. They are especially well developed on the backs of cats and certain other animals. When a cat is sud denly frightened or infuriated the hair on its back rises with an explosive-like rapidity. Per haps this ability to make the nair stand on end was original ly a protective feature in all an imals, similar to the porcupine's ability to raise its quills for defense. Be that as it may, the hair muscles in the human race have been dormant so long that they will respond only to a severe fright or other extraordi nary stimulus. These vestigial muscles with which the hairs are provided have been cited as corroborative evidence of man's evolution from lower animals.-

How Word "Capital" and "Capitol" Should Apply

It is surprising how many people fail to distinguish between "capitol" and "capital" when used in relation to governments. According to Ameri can usage, a capitol is a building in which the legislative branch of a government holds its sessions; a capital is the seat of an entire government and the city where the capitol is located. Thus the United States capitol. where congress holds its sessions, is at Washington, D. C., which is the capi tal of the United States. Both words are derived from the Latin "caput." meaning head, or one of its forms But "capitol," like French "capitole," is borrowed directly from "Capitoli um," which was the name of the na tional temple in Rome dedicated to Jupiter. It was so called because it was at the head or top of Saturnian or Tarpelan hill. Apparently Gov. Francis Nicholson, who built a government building at Williamsburg, Va., in 1698, was the first to apply "capitol" to a statehouse in America. "Capital" as applied to the chief commercial or political city of a state or nation was originally an adjective used elliptically and meant "capital city."-Pathfinder

GARLIC ODER FINDS GAS PIPE LEAKS

closet and a colored woman made her husband take a bath. No divorces were reported. This all came about because the bureau of mines was trying out a new method of finding leaks in gas mains and house connections. The results are reported in its bulletin R. I. 3007.

The material used in the test, called ethyl mercaptan, is not harmful in the quantities required, but does give a "loud" and persistent warning to the nose, if a leaky pipe is anywhere about. When a gas flame is burnings, this substance is destroyed by the heat and no odor is given off. In two towns where these experiments were made, several hundred leaks were found in the home of customers, many of which had not been previously suspected.


