


First Floor Plan.

IMMIGRATION TO BE Here's to Beauty! RESTRICTED TO AID THE LABOR SITUATION

WASHINGTON, D. C. - Further restrictions upon immigration to prevent increased unemployment will be imposed by the state department at the direction of President Hoover.

The chief executive announced yesterday American counsular officers in Europe will examnie future applicants for immigration visas with a view to rejecting all who might become public charges and add volume to those already out of work in this country.

In adopting this course Mr. Hoover said it would be similar to restrictions placed upon Mexican and Canadian within the last 15 months.

The state department informed the president it had become apparent in March, 1929, that many seeking entrance from Mexico were laborers who ran a risk of becoming public charges, and consequently, the restrictive policy was adopted. Labor immigration from that country, has now practically ceased, the department added, and similar steps have brought a considerable falling off in Canadian immigration.

Mexican immigration had dropped in July to 324 persons. Last year, 6,280 persons came from that coun-

More than a quarter of a million bales of raw cotton go into the manufacture of cotton bags each year in the United States. Most of these are used in the wholesale grocery trade. There is a large opportunity, says the U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics to substitute cotton bags for jute bags or bagging.

Growing animals not only need an abundant supply of protein, but the protein should be of the right kind. For example, experiments carried on at the U. S. Department of Agriculture farm at Beltsville, Md., show that vegetable or plant proteins are not so valuable in an egg-laying ration for hens as animal proteins such as meat scrap and fish scrap.

The first few weeks in the feed lot is a critical time for feeder steers. Start with limited quantities of concentrated feeds and increase them very gradually during the first 30 days. Roughages of good quality may be fed in any quantity without harm. However, they add bulk to the ration and the more roughage the steers eat the smaller will be the daily gains and the longer the fattening period.

Vetch is less likely to winterkill if seeded early in the fall. Late seedings are injured more because the plants are small and tender, often resulting in poor or thin stands and low yields of hay or seed. Some growers seed heavily, but where the winters are mild a thick stand injures the yield of seed. Winterkilling of vetch may also result from an excessive amount of moisture in the soil due to poor natural

Most asparagus growers cut the dead tops of the plants in the fall and burn them to destroy any disease germs or insects that may be present, but it is doubtful if this practice is advisable in regions where severe freezes occur. The old tops hold the snow and prevent deep freezing and blowing of the soil. Some growers harrow the bed or throw slight ridges over the rows, in the fall, but where land is inclined to wash, cultivating and ridging are objectionable.

To fatten the farm turkey for November 27 next, begin about the first of October, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. At first feed just enough to keep the bird a little hungry, and gradually increase the feed until it gets all it will clean up three times a day during the week before killing. Some turkey growers feed equal parts of corn, wheat and oats in the first part of the fattening period and gradually change to corn alone as the weather grows cooler. Old corn is a much better feed than new corn. The old corn should not be musty.

Rats are particular about food served to them in traps. Bread or doughnuts should be fresh, as rats will usually ignore them if even a little stale. Raw or cooked meats, bacon, fish, apples, melons, tomatoes, carrots and nut meats also are good baits. Cheese is an excellent bait for mice but is generally not attractive to rats. Use fresh baits and change them daily. A variety of baits used in successive traps gives better results than only one kind of bait. Baits are sometimes made more attractive to rats by sprinkling rolled oats, corn meal, or powdered milk lightly over the trap.

Some poultrymen think that poultry lice are a necessary evil, but there is no reason, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture, why a flock can not be freed from lice and kept free. Late summer or early fall is a good time of year to treat the flock. It is probably better to do it before the molt. Sodium fluoride will kill all species of poultry lice. The Department of Agriculture recommends the "pinch method" of application. Put small pinches of the material among the feathers next to the skin; one pinch on the head, neck, breast, below the vent, on the tail, on each thigh, and on the underside of each wing when spread, and two pinches on the back. One application will destroy all the lice. Reinfestation occurs usually from stray fowls coming into the poultry yard and from stock added to the flock.

NO FEDERAL AID ADVANCE

SANTA FE-The reports emanating from Washington, D. C., that two million dollars of federal aid highway funds would be immediately available for New Mexico's use to help the unemployment situation have not been interpreted correctly, a highway bulletin released recently

Advices from the bureau of public roads to the highway department state that the 1932 fiscal year funds which are the funds supposed to be made available at once will not be paid until July 1, 1931, or at the beginning of the 1932 fiscal year. This means that New Mexico has in reality no more funds now than previous to the order advancing the 1932 funds but that the state can enter into an agreement with the bureau of public roads for the con-struction of projects and actual work started before July 1, 1931 if the state has enough cash available to

New Mexico's share for the fiscal year 1932 will be \$1,984,363 or roughly two million dollars. If the state matches this allotment \$1,125,-000 would be required, or if all these funds were used New Mexico would have to make available over three million dollars.

HOBBS SCHOOL ROW SETTLED

LOVINGTON-Judge G. A. Richardson denied the injunction sought by A. C. Chester of New Hobbs against the issuance of \$250,000 in certificates of indebtedness authorized by the state for raising school building funds at Hobbs.

The controversy was then settled out of court late Monday to the satisfaction of both parties.

J. A. Chapman of Santa Fe, attorney for the defendants, announced the settlement was made on the basis of New Hobbs receiving \$75,000 of the \$250,000. Hobbs will receive the remainder.
