STRENUOUS POLITICAL PICKWICK GREY HOUND CAMPAIGN UNDERWAY BUS LINE IS SUED FOR SUM OF \$54,770.50

Six suits asking \$54,770.50 in damages jointly from Pickwick-Greyhound Incorporated and the United States Casualty company, as a result in the wreck of a Pickwick bus 65 miles west of Roswell on the night of September 17, in which one man lost his life and 12 others were injured, were filed in district court at Roswell Friday by G. L. Reese, Sr., attorney for the plaintiffs.

Negligence on the part of the driver, Paul Trammier, loss of personal property, shock and disability from injuries were in the allegations of the suits filed.

HIGH COURT REFUSES PASS ON OIL ORDER

WASHINGTON, D. C .- The supreme court Monday refused to pass on the authority of the secretary of the interior to fix a minimum price at which oil taken under lease from government land may be sold. Roy O. West, then secretary of the interior, issued an order in 1928 under which the Cody Petroleum Company having a lease from the government, on land in the Oregon basin oil field in Park county, Wyoming, was prohibited from selling oil to the Texas Company at a price fixed by contract made between the two companies. Under the lease the government received a royalty or all oil produced.

In July 1928, the secretary of the interior announced that the government royalty on all oil produced in the Oregon basin oil field would be based on a minimum price of 85 cents a barrel.

OIL LEASE TRACTS BRING STATE \$10,000

SANTA FE-Out of 37 oil lease tracts offered at public auction at the state land office Friday, 19 were sold for a total of \$10,279.44. The highest bid was \$4,554.10 by Martin Gardesky of Santa Fe, which amounted to approximately \$7 an acre for that tract.

How to Purify Quicksilver

pinhole in a paper cone. However. If the mercury is contaminated with metallic impurities dissolved in it, it will soon become dirty again if left in contact with air. Such mercury should be shaken with dilute nitric acid for several hours, or even days. in order to dissolve the base metals.

How Neon Is Obtained

The process by which neon is made today is very similar to that by which Sir William Ramsay first found it. When he distilled liquid air, chilled to a temperature of more than 400 degrees below zero Fahrenheit, he observed the gas boiling off, and named it neon. In factories today it is made by chilling air until it becomes a clear, bluish-white liquid and then capturing the neon as it evaporates.

How Water Forms Rain

Drops of water formed in the atmosphere by condensation of aqueous vapor and falling rapidly by virtue of their weight are known as rain. Smaller, finer particles, falling more slowly, are known as mist or fog. Drops of rain one-formth to three-tenths of an inch in diameter have been measured, The smallest drops of rain measure one-twentieth of an inch in diameter.

> The most effective way of dealing with sheep killing dogs is through legislation rigidly enforced. Proper legislation greatly reduces losses of livestock, danger of rabies, and at the same time protects licensed dogs. Many states have enacted good dog laws, but some state still have practically no regulations controlling the dog.

> Seed prices are apt to be lower during the fall and winter than at planting time, says the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which advises farmers to buy their seed early if they can decide upon the crops and the acreage before spring. The quality of seedsmen's stocks is usually better early in the season, seed obtained early is sure to be one hand when needed for sowing, and it may be tested and replaced by other seed if found to be unsatisfactory.

Straws and stovers produced annually in the United States have an aggregate livestock feeding value about equal to that of the hays and fodders, yet 96 per cent of the latter roughages are utilized as feed and only 27 per cent of the former. Good oat straw, for example, is equal to corn stover and compares well with the poorer grades of clover and linseed meal to sheep, was found to be worth one-third as much as good quality clover or alfalfa hay. Sweet clover chaff, a by product of the sweet clover seed industry, reduced 20 per cent the cost of wintering a band of ewe lambs at the U. S. Sheep Experiment Station at Dubois, Idaho, when fed at the rate of 2 pounds of chaff and 2½ pounds of alfalfa hay per head daily. The edible portion of well-cured corn fodder compares well with timothy hay as a feed for dairy cows.



BALE AND STORE HAY AT A PROFIT

Agricultural economists at Ohio State University, believe that two periods of relatively high prices for hay may be expected during the coming feeding season. The first is One with a jealous disposition at the beginning of the season and is should be careful not to care much reflected now in a strong price for good quality hay. A second period of higher prices is likely in late winter when numerous farmers have exhausted their supplies of hay and roughage which they now estimate will carry their livetsock through till spring pastures appear.

Those who will have hay to sell, will in all probability get a higher price in late winter, provided they cannot sell now without endangering their own feeding plans, the research department of the National Association of Farm Equipment Manufacturers suggests. Hay to be marketed in late winter or spring If you would have a faithful serv. may well be baled now and stored under cover. It will then be in read iness for market at once if the owner decides he has a surplus.

How Tracks of Running Rabbit Deceive the Eye

The triangle formed by the tracks of a rabbit in the snow points in the opposite direction from which the animal was running, says an article in Pathfinder magazine. When a rabbit runs it touches the ground with both small front feet close together and then strikes with the two large hind feet apart and ahead of the front feet, forming the base of the triangle with the hind feet and the apex with the front ones.

In other words, the hind feet strike the ground last and leave it last with each leap, but they strike far ahead of the front feet, consequently the two foremost and most widely separated tracks are made by the hind feet not by the front feet as so often supposed. Unless one understands the relative position of the feet while the rabbit is in motion it is sometimes hard to tell by its tracks which way it has run, because the feet are so covered with hair that often the toes do not show in the track.


