Thus, for this seven month period, imports this year show an increase of 124 per cent over 1929.

Gasoline imported into the United States comes principally from the and tomato, onion cooked in butter, Dutch West Indies with some from the island of Trinidad and with very small amounts from Venezuela and Canada. At present the Dutch West Indies is furnishing about 92 per cent of the gasoline imported into the United States.

The Dutch West Indies includes the two islands of Curacao and Aruba just off the coast of Venezuela. On the island of Curacao is the 175,-000 barrel Dutch Shell refinery and on the island of Aruba are a 15,000 barrel Dutch Shell refinery and a 125,000 barrel Standard of Indiana refinery. The recent completion of this Standard refinery and the recent enlargement of the Dutch Shells' big refinery are responsible for the enormous increase in imports of gasoline. This increase, during the last year.

the last five months of 1930 averages about as much as during the first seven months, the total for the year will be about 17,000,000 barrels, or cramping to the toes. practically twice as much as was im-

Of the gasoline imported into the United States during the first seven months of 1930 about 8,900,000 barrels were delivered along the Atlantic seaboard from Maine to Florida. This is 90 per cent of the total imports of gasoline. About 760,000 barrels or 7.7 per cent were delivered ed at points on the Gulf Coast and 236,000 barrels or 2.3 per cent were delivered at all other points. The Atlantic seaboard is therefore the big market for imported gasoline. As much of the surplus gasoline from the Mid-Continent and California looks for a market along the Atlantic seaboard this imported gasoline comes in direct competition with it.

While foreign gasoline is admitted nto the United States "duty free" the importing companies must declare its value-and this "declared value" the gasoline imported into the United States during the first seven fer. months of 1929 was 15.0 cents a gallon and for the same period of 1930 it was 8.4 cents a gallon.

It is generally understood that the average cost of producing a barrel of crude oil in Venezuela is substantially less than in the United States. And it is also understood that the tanker rates for crude oil and gasoline, from the Maracaibo basin to New York are less than the combined pipeline, tank car and tanker rates from oil fields and refineries of the Mississippi valley to the Atlantic seaboard. Regardless, therefore, of the obviously incorrect "declared value" of imported gasoline, the Atlantic seaboard markets that have long drawn on the Mississippi vailey's gasoline stocks are turning "duty free" foreign gasoline.



### DROUGHT AID TO THE STOCKMEN EXTENDED TO THE 31 ST OF MARCH

The reduced railroad rates on hay and grain into, and livestock out of the drouth-stricken counties of New Mexico have been extended until March, 31, 1931, as the result of the work of the American Farm Bureau Federation, other interested farm organizations and individuals.

By its order of August 9 of this year the Interstate Commerce Commission granted authority to the railroads to establish drouth emergency rates to be effective up until October 31. That order has now been modified on account of the continuation of drouth in the various parts of the country.

A total of 1,016 counties in 21 states have been given advantage of the reduced rates. There are 82 counties in Texas that are affected by the rates, and Chaves, Dona Ana, Eddy, Lea, and Otero counties in

#### Farmers Like "Grasshopper Mouse."

Many farmers are now encouraging the "grasshopper mouse" to make his home in their fields. This husky little rodent takes its name not from any physical characteristics of its own, but rather from its diet. It first got its name in North Dakota when examinations showed that it fed largely on grasshoppers. In Arizona, on the other hand, it is called the "scorpion" mouse for a similar reason. This variety of mouse has been known to science not quite a century, the first specimen having been taken by Maximilian, prince of Wied, at the Mandan villages in North Dakota in 1833. Recently reported studies have demonstrated their importance. In the western United States and adjoining parts of Canada and Mexico they have been found to be holding numerous harmful insects in check and keeping the proper balance among the small animals that infest farms,

The grasshopper mouse is distinguished by its heavy build and short. thick tail. Its short legs and bulky body handicap it in running but it is harder to catch than swifter rodents on account of its quickness at turning and dodging, which enable it, also, to corner its prey easily. It is less nervous and timid than most rodents and gives evidence of unusual hunting instincts. Its quarry includes not only many kinds of insects, but also other rodents. Its chief sport is said to be capturing other mice of its own size or smaller, and it is credited, too, with destroying the young of many burrowing rodents much larger than it-

#### Why Oil on Surface of Water Curbs Movement

The oil is distributed sometimes by pipe, and sometimes by throwing overboard porous bags attached to a rope. The oil slowly filters through these bags.

### Why Flowers Fade Quickly

There are two mistakes commonly made in cutting flowers for indoor use. One is to wait until they are fully opened, often until they have been open for several days, before cutting them. The other is to cut them during the heat of the day, when they are in ideal condition to wilt. Most flowers are best cut when in full bud or just as they are beginning to open. There are, of course, some exceptions to this, such as dahlias, which do not expand fully until after three to five days after the buds have unfolded. As a general rule, flowers will open more nearly perfect and will last longer if taken just as the buds are expanding and with fairly long stems.

WARN FARMERS OF FALSE CLAIMS FOR NEW GRAIN SORGHUM, "GROHOMA"

Farmers should not accept the claims advanced for a new grain sorghum, called "Grohoma," which has been offered at prices twenty to fifty times those of well-known and adapted varieties, the U.S. Department of Agriculture warns. The claims in regard to the origin and value are sensational and inaccurate, sorghum specialists of the bureau of plant industry say. There is no reilable evidence that Grohoma is superior to or will outyield other well-known varieties which have been tested and which may be recommended on the basis of experimental tests. Present information, says the bureau, does not justify an exhorbitant price for the seed of an almost unknown and untried crop.







## **NEEDS FOR RED CROSS** SAYS CHAIRMAN PAYNE

Disaster Relief and Service to War Veterans Make Heavy Demands-First Aid on Highways New Plan.

Demands upon the public services that the American Red Cross is organized to give are increasingly heavy. and will continue to be so in the future, John Barton Payne, chairman, has announced.

The two major services of the soclety-service to war veterans and their dependents, and relief in disasters-show each year a greater number of persons helped by the Red Cross.

Pension legislation passed recently for World War Veterans, and increased allotments to all Spanish-American War Veterans, have given to Chapters and the national society many thousands of additional cases to handle, Judge Payne said.

In the past year help was given in 108 disasters. Ninety of these were in the United States, twelve in foreign possessions and six were in foreign

countries. Health activities of the Red Cross also are being extended, especially in the rural communities where all health authorities agree the greatest need exists. Red Cross, with 794 nurses in its employ, is the greatest employer of public health nurses in rural areas in the United States.

In its campaign against accidental deaths, begun twenty years ago with its life saving and first aid programs. the Red Cross now has adopted an additional program-that of combating the huge toll of life from automobile accidents on the highways.

Expenditures of the Red Cross in the past year were \$4.254,796.34, of which \$1,208,151.09 was spent in disaster relief, the chairman pointed out.

"The Red Cross depends upon the public for its support, through their memberships enrolled once each year in the period from Armistice Day to Thanksgiving Day." Judge Payne said.

"We do not receive any support from the Government, or through other taxation, although as the President of the United States is president of the soclety, and one-third of its governing members are representatives of U. S. Departments, it ranks as a semi-governmental agency.

"By joining as a member, in the local Red Cross Chapter, once each year, during the annual Roll Call, every citizen will have a part in carrying on this great humanitarian

### A BILLION DOLLARS WILL BE NEEDED NEXT YEAR FOR THE VET BILL

WASHINGTON, D. C .- A billion dollar outlay will be needed next year to meet the government's increasing bill for veterans' compensation and pensions.

Despite efforts of the administration of veterans' affairs to keep estimates below the billion figure. demands for pensions, hospitalization and compensation under the laws created by congress last spring have brought the total to staggering

Preliminary estimates for the veterans' bureau alone for the next fiscal year indicate a probable increase of more than \$100,000,000. Appropriations for the bureau last year amounted to about \$550,000,000, and with the added demands, the numerous new hospitals and attendant expenses, the cost of operation next year is expected to amount to nearly \$665,000,000.

The annual outlay of the pensions bureau, handling Spanish-American and Civil War claims, already has mounted to more than \$200,000,000. With the increased pensions for Spanish-American veterans and their congress, a substantial increase in and female, that come up to the expenditures is anticipated. ### INDIVIDUAL INCOME LESS

WASHINGTON, D. C .- Less income by individuals was indicated Monday by the internal revenue bureau as the major cause of a decrease of \$148,286,921 in income tax collected by the treasury during the first nine months of the 1930 calendar year as compared with the same period of the previous year.

Total collections for the 9 months of 1930 were \$1,779,382,127 as compared with \$1,927,668,848 the year Individual taxes dropped a sigh than to raise a laugh. from \$971,328,259 in the first nine months of 1929 to \$838,355,855 this year while corporation taxes decreased \$15,314,318 from \$956,340,589 in 1929 to \$941,026,271 in 1930. Out of the 72 collection districts

of the country only 12 showed an increase in total income tax col-

The collections by states and districts for the nine months of 1930 included: New Mexico \$594,169.69.

### SET ASIDE AREAS

SANTA FE-The Forest Service of the United States Department of Agriculture is making plans and preliminary surveys for setting aside within the national forests distinctive areas that will permanently represent the national conditions of all the major forest regions of the United States. The program calls for the setting aside of three classes of areas, each having a different and clearcut purpose. The three classes will be know as "Natural Areas," "Primitive Areas," and "Experimental Areas."

Culling of poultry breeding flocks r the 1931 hatching season is unway at the present time. Over 100 flocks are being culled, totalling ver 30,000 birds. are represented in this work, which takes in practically all the commercial hatcheries of the state.

This work of the New Mexico State Poultry Association has grown to a point where it was found necessary to employ an inspector to do the culling. The association was very fortunate in being able to secure the services of Dr. C. E. Ackerman, a icensed A. P. A. judge. Not only has he a reputation as a poultry judge but also a very wide experience in culling for egg production.

It will be but a few months until the hatcheries of New Mexico will be turning out baby chicks by the thousands. Whether or not these chicks will develop into profitable birds depends largely on the breed-

ing back of them. The association has as one of its main objectives, improving the quality and increasing the profits of the poultry flocks of the state thru a system of rigid culling and proper breeding. This system is known as the accreditation plan.

In order for a flock to become accredited, it must be culled by an authorized representative of the state association. All birds, both male required standards of laying ability, are permitted in the breeding flock during the hatching season.

ORDINANCE NO. 55

LICENSES

OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF HAGERMAN:

Secton 1. All licenses shall be igned by the Mayor, and issued by the clerk, under his hand and the official seal of the corporation upon payment of his fees and the receipt the sum provided and assessed by this ordinance for such license.

Section 2. The Town Clerk hall sue all licenses fixed by this ordinance. No license shall be issued for less than a quarterly payment, except as herein otherwise provided. Quarters shall begin July first, October first, January first and April first. For each part or fraction of quarter, license shall be issued until the first of the next succeed-

Section 3. The Town Clerk shall shal and charge him with the amount thereof; and the said Marshal shall collect such amount and deposit the Treasurer, taking his receipt therefor, and such receipt shall be filed with the Town Clerk and the Marshal credited therewith.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful for Charitable institutions and any person to conduct, pursue or carry on, in the town of Hagerman, Common schools any occupation or business named in the following section without first Public welfare

having paid the license fee thereon. Section 5. All persons, firms or corporations shall be subject to and pay an annual license authorizing Public debt the pursuit or conducting of such occupation, at the rate in the amount specified in the following schedule, to-wit:

in Formation of Nibs All pen-nibs have a slit running the point from a little round or ovn hole which is cut in the middle of the nib where it begins to taper Were It not for this slit, and the fact that the whole body of the nib is curved we should be unable to write. The curvature causes the nib to hold a considerable quantity of ink when it is dipped in the pot, and the slit causes the point of the nib to open into two sections when it is pressed upon the paper, and the ink between these sec tions is then left on the paper, form Ing a line or letter, as the case may be Steel nibs also have two little stits in their sides or shoulders. These are to give greater flexibility to the nib Gold nibs, being softer, do not need these side slits.-Montreal Family Herald.

The \$5,000 Red Cross contribution to Newfoundland, following the tidal wave, which took twenty-six lives and destroyed many homes and fishing boats, was the first from an outside country to reach the distressed people.

The sum of \$5,000 was given to the fund for the relief of the Mennonite refugees of German descent, who had letermined to leave Russia for new ands. About 13,000 passed through Germany, where the German Red cross, aided by Red Cross societies of her nations, helped them. The marity are being transported to new ntries in the western world and American Red Cross has transmitd contributions from individuals in is country.

#### How Currents Differ An alternating current is defined as

a succession of electric currents which rise and fall in strength and flow alternately in opposite directions at regular intervals. The currents or impulses vary in intensity from a plus maximum to a negative maximum, and they are separated by points of zero pressure, as distinguished from a direct or continuous current. A direct current is an electric current constant in direction, though not necessarily so in value. It travels in one direction along a conductor, and if this conductor joins the terminals of a source of energy such as dynamo, the current is said to flow from the positive pole to the machine along the conductor to the negative pole. While it is usually more economical to transmit electricity in the form of A. C., it is often more conveniently utilized in the form of D. C., and to transform the current from one form to the other a converter or transformer is employed.

### How Radio Waves Spread Death

Victory over one of man's most dangerous and destructive enemies, the insect, and an important new use for radio are promised as a result of interesting tests with high-frequency radio waves at the New Jersey agricultural experiment station, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. Investigators found that such waves killed cockroaches, beetles, house files and other insects in short order. The invisible impulses, emitted on a wave length of about 24 meters and with a frequency of nearly 12,000,000 cycles a second, developed heat of a deadly degree within the bodies of the insects, producing death in a short time.
