They are the king-doms of this world, ruled by the Prince of this world, "who now work-eth in the hearts of the children of disobedience." Nevertheless, Messiah's Kingdom will be inaugurated; Satan's Fundre or Mountain deceiving man-Empire or Mountain, deceiving man kind through ignorance and supersti-tion, will be brought to an end. Satar will be bound for a thousand years while Messiah's Kingdom, equally in-visible, will dominate the world, chas-ing away ignorance and superstition and filling the whole world with the ledge of the glory of the Lord.


