We all need to work together in all



# Little Buckaroo Rodeo

**Slated By CowBelles** 

Fun, food and entertainment for the entire family will be on tap at the Second Annual Little Buckaroo Rodeo, sponsored by the Bovina CowBelles, to be staged at the Bovina Roping Arena Saturday, Sept. 13.

NEXT WEEK

The rodeo will begin at 4 p.m.

Four horseback and 16 foot events for youngsters 12 and under are scheduled. Entry fee is 50 cents for each event and entry blanks may be picked up at Don's Medicine Chest and Bovina Supermarket.

All-around trophies, based on points, will be given contestants in



four age groups. Ribbons will be awarded through sixth place in all events with the exception of the scrambles.

Six money ribbons will be awarded in each calf scramble with the winner in the pig scramble keeping the pig.

The CowBelles will have a concession stand at the roping arena and will be selling fresh, homemade barbecue sandwiches, Frito pies, hot dogs with homemade chili, brownies, cookies, soft drinks and coffee.

A baby animal auction will be held following the final event in the rodeo. A pony, calf, lamb, bunnies and Banties will be auctioned by Tiny Walling of Bovina.

Events on the Little Buckaroo Rodeo slate include goat ribbon races, 7-9 and 10-12 age groups; stick horse races, three and under and 4-6 (bring your own stick horse); father-son three-legged races, 4-6, 7-9 and 10-12 (for this event, youngsters may "adopt" a father); mother-daughter three-legged races, 4-6, 7-9 and 10-12 (for this event, girls may "adopt" a mother); potato races, 4-6, 7-9 (horseback event);

## Enrollment Totals 587 This Week

Enrollment in Bovina Schools increased by 46 last week after the opening day total was announced, according to Superintendent L.F. Jacobs.

Total number of students as of Tuesday morning was 587 as compared with the total of 541 on opening day last week.

The enrollment this year is off 16 from the same time a year ago when the count was 603 and down 31 from the enrollment of 618 at the same time in 1973.

Jacobs says he expects the number of students enrolling here to increase for the next several weeks. **Tuesday's enrollment showed 277** 

in grades kindergarten through fifth, up 32 from last week; 146 students in junior high, up nine from last week; and 164 in high school, up five from last week.

## **AT MUSTANG FIELD** Ponies, Roughriders Battle In Opener

The 1975 football season will be officially launched Friday night for Bovina's Mustangs when the Maroons host the Boys Ranch Roughriders at Mustang Field.

Kickoff will be at 8 p.m. In the Mustang camp, enthusiasm is at a high pitch among the over 40 candidates for the squad and the almost all-new slate of coaches.

The Ponies will be attempting to regain their supremacy over the Roughriders, losing last year's opener, 19-0, to the Class AA team. In 1970, Bovina outscored Boys Ranch, 32-7; in '71, the Ponies won, 27-18; won again in '72, 16-0; and lost their first game to the Roughriders, 14-0, in '73.

Although Bovina has been given the nod over the AA Roughriders in the past, Boys Ranch will probably be given the edge in this year's contest based on the results of the past two years.

Head Coach Joe Christian, in his first year at the helm of the Bovina Mustangs, and his staff watched Boys Ranch in their only scrimmage of the year--against Friona--and came away impressed by the

HORSEMANSHIP

Mustangs' first opponents. "We were real impressed by the

Roughriders," said Christian, noting that Boys Ranch scored one touchdown in the scrimmage while holding the AA Chieftains scoreless. "They have a real aggressive team with a front line that averages about 170 pounds, probably five to 10 pounds more than the Mustang line."

The Roughriders will run a Power I offense and a 5-2 or 6-1 type defense, according to Christian.

"They threw pretty well for a scrimmage and we expect Boys Ranch to develop a good passing attack," Christian commented. "They will probably throw the ball against us, however, they may not have to if their running attack works--but we hope they have to throw."

Boys Ranch fans are still talking about the 1974 season when the Roughriders, seldom blessed with a winning season during the past several years, compiled a stellar 7-3 record. The Ranchers lost only two District 1-AA games-17-10 to Dalhart and 29-19 to Spearman, the

eventual Class AA state runner-up. This year, 10 lettermen return, including four offensive and three defensive starters. If the Ranchers

can fill the vacated quarterback slot, they could be headed for another winning season. Three of the returning starters went both ways in '74, including Butch Bawcom (5-10, 170), expected to fill the quarterback role; Brent Langley (5-10, 170), fullback-cornerback; and Daniel Rains (5-9, 165), running back-noseguard. Mike Tay-

lor, who started at center last year, is the remaining veteran back this year. Rancher Coach Ben Adams

expects good things from Boyd Garrett at back, Joe Maloy at end, Brad Hood at tackle, David Rattan as a quarterback prospect, Roland Lopez at back, Johnny Roland at tackle and Brad Silver at back.

The Ponies will run a basic wishbone offense and a 5-2 defense with a number of variations, according to Christian.

Christian, a graduate of West Texas State University, is assisted this year by Zane Reeves, Texas Tech; Greg Marshall, Sul Ross; Ric Smith, West Texas State University; and Joel Nelson, McMurry. Reeves is the only returning member of the coaching staff.

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
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

How about some good news on the canning lid situation? We were recently informed by our state food specialists that canning lids are available through Goodwill Industries and the Commerce Department on a mail order basis. We encourage you not to order more than what you need for this year's canning season

as manufacturers are catching-up with the need so next year's supply should be adequate. You might want to get together with a friend or two to order these if an order is more than you need this year. The address is: Goodwill Industries of

is accurate. Noting ways to be sure foods are processed at the correct temperature in the pressure canner, she suggests:

--test pressure gauge so that the temperature is at 240 degrees F. at 10 pounds of pressure

--exhaust pressure canner 10 minutes after flow of steam from petcock --keep pressure accurate. Less than 10 pounds of

pressure won't kill bacteria in vegetables and meats. --make adjustment for

high altitude in areas about 2,000 feet or more above sea level. She advised homemakers

using a waterbath canner to have water boiling when jars are placed in the canner. Water should be one inch or more above the top of all jars throughout entire processing time, and it must be kept at a rolling boil.

The processing times for various products can be checked in the publications that I have mentioned above. At this time I have a maximum thermometer to check the temperature and gauge of pressure cookers and will be glad to test any cooker if you will call or stop by and make arrangements with me.
