# POTASH MINE SHAFT IS COMPLETED--CRUSHER PLANT BEING ERECTED

The shaft for the mine of the American Potash Co., in southeastern Eddy county has been completed at a depth of 1,062-feet, it was learned here recently. The shaft, eight by twenty-two feet was sunk to just below the level of the potash stratum and it may be possible that the shaft will be run parallel to the potash bed as the mining operations progress. The mine will be worked just as the coal mines and the materials carried out of the shaft by skips to a crushing plant, which is now being erected near the mouth

Preliminaries are underway for a rail connection to be made probably below Carlsbad. The mine will not be ready to operate full time before several months.

Apple betty and others made with fruit are usually popular with the family and are easy to prepare. Mix soft bread crumbs from the center of the loaf with enough melted butter to moisten, and place them in alternate layers with fruit, spices, or hard sauce or custard. Apricots, prunes, and in season, rhubarb, make especially good "betties."

Biscuit dough is useful in many ways other than for hot bread. Fruit shortcakes of fresh or stewed fruits, chicken shortcake, crust for mea pie or fruit cobbler suggest som of these uses. Sweetened and spiced with raisins or nuts or both added biscuit dough is transformed into tea cakes. Pinwheen buns are made by sprinkling the surface of the rolled dough with sugar, cinnamon, nuts and raisins, and then rolling

Some improvement in the price trend of eggs may be expected during the first half of 1931. Poultry prices for the first half of 1931 are expected to be somewhat above those of the same period a year ago.

Increased supplies of potatoes in prospect in the 1931 crop year will more than offset any improvement in demand. A large increase in sweet potato production is expected. Cabbage growers in the late states will receive lower prices than in 1930 unless acreage is reduced. Lettuce growers must guard against over expansion in proudction. Late onions should be reduced and the maintenance of the 1930 acreage of tomatoes for canning and manufacture this season may result in excessive supplies.

Market prospects for apples justi-

fy the maintenance of the present numbers of trees in commercial apple orchards, and possibly some increase. Although the trend of orange production is upward, the increase now in prospect does not appear excessive grape-fruit production is increasing in all areas and promises to lead to serious over-production unless consumption should be increased much more than is expected. In most peach producing areas outside California the prospective changes in bearing acreage are moderate. Commercial strawberry acreage for harvest in 1931 promises to be considerably smaller than 1930. Grape growers face difficult marketing conditions for the next several years. The general market outlook for tobacco is less favorable than it was a year ago. Domestic demand has weakened and the foreign demand is only fair.

Rice acreage in the southern states can probably be maintained at about the present area without depressing prices. Flax has brought high relative returns as compared to wheat and other small grains the last few years but these levels are not likely to continue during 1931.

# SENATE COMMITTEE SHOWS HUGE VALUE OF THE U. S. WILD LIFE

Recommendation of a new federal department to carry on a greater program of wild life restoration in the United States is being considered by the Senate's Special Committee on conservation of wild life resources, the committee has revealed in its first report.

The committee reported findging convincing and undisputed evidence of a rapid disappearance of wild life" on the one hand, while on the other "a corresponding increase in the number of hunters and fishermen amounting to 400 per cent in the last decade." It presented a survey of 14 states by the southern newspaper publishers association which disclosed that hunters and fishermen equal the number of baseball, football, golf and tennis fans combined.

The report blamed the serious de crease of wild life on "the failure of federal and state legislative bodies to be guided by the ordinary rules of sound business practice which require that the sums used for research, protection, administration, development and upkeep must be in due proportion to the income derived from its resources."

"The enterprise of wild life conservation and increase viewed solely as a business matter has been grievously underfinanced, and small acknowledgement or recognition has been had of its value in dollars to the people of our commonwealths," it said.

Basing its estimate on actual figures, the committee declared the total expenditure in hunting and fishing alone in 1929 doubtless amounted to three-quarters of a billion dollars, and added:

'It is impossible to estimate, even approximately, the tremendous sums annually invested and spent by that other vast group of recreationists who are attracted by the ennobling and inspirational qualities associated with all varieties of wild creatures any totals so far presented in conures are compiled they will dwarf ermen and hunters."






