

JUDGE, TREASURER

THERE'S NOTHING like contested races to perk up voter interest in primaries. This was very evident in Parmer County last Saturday, when 48.8 per cent of the eligible voters marked their ballots.

While this still won't qualify the county for a Valley Forge medal, it was some ten percentage points above the 1972 primary, and the increase over that primary turnout in numbers was 26 per cent.

Clearly, it was the presence of more local names on the ballot that made the difference.

At Lazbuddie, for example, where a hometown product, Archie Tarter, was involved in the county judge's race, and where three names were on the Democratic ballot for county commissioner and one more on the Republican ballot, the precinct turned out to the tune of 61.2 per cent. That led the entire county in percentage of registered voters participating in the election.

BOVINA'S PRECINCT, unfortunately, was at the other extreme, with just 40.8 per cent of the qualified voters making it to the polls. This still was up by eight percentage points over the 1972 turnout.

Eight per cent more turned out because of a county judge's race, but the lack of strictly local races kept the turnout lower than other precincts.

The Rhea precinct was next to Lazbuddie in percentage of voters voting, with a 59.2% turnout. Next came Black, with 57.5 per cent. Perhaps it's easier to get a better percentage in the smaller voting boxes. Also, it was at Black that Paul Fortenberry managed an elevator for a number of years.

At Friona, the turnout was about three points below what had been anticipated. With a hometown man, Paul Fortenberry, making his bid (successfully) for the judge's position, a total of 47.6 per cent of the voters turned out. Local leaders there were hoping for a 50 per cent vote, but the 47.6 was still 13 points above their 1970 turnout, when there also was a Friona candidate seeking the judgeship.

Farwell, although not having any local races, still was one of the four voting boxes to top the 50 per cent mark, with 51.7 per cent of the voters making it to the polls. The judge's race undoubtedly figured heavy in this turnout, along with the county treasurer's race, which also helped the county total.

We personally had predicted a primary vote of 2,000 this year, due to the county races and the hot precinct race at Lazbuddie. We missed that total by only 38 votes, which was less than one per cent above the actual turnout.

If the county's turnout had kept pace with the Lazbuddie vote, there would have been 3,459 voters last Saturday, instead of the 1,962. However, they still might be counting ballots if that had been the case.

BOVINA VOTERS went in the Fortenberry column by an even 57 per cent, and this was within one point of Fortenberry's countywide margin, which was 58.3 per cent.

BIG NICK Treinen, referring to the race for the city council recently, where he failed to win, place or show, out of a field of six candidates, says it's only the second time for a Treinen to run for public office, and his was a better showing.

"I had an uncle who ran for sheriff once. He only got one vote. Even his wife didn't vote for him," Nick laughs.

The next three are the daughters and son of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Willard, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Corn and Mrs. J.E. Sherrill Jr.

The five honor students will participate in commencement exercises Friday, May 31, in Bovina Schools auditorium.

Serving as honor guards in the baccalaureate and commencement exercises will be the top ranking boy and girl in the junior class, Joe Steelman and Dora Villarreal.

Ushers for the events will be chosen in the near future, Cox says.

Honor students in the graduating class are named on the basis of grade averages for the four years in high school. Scholarships will be awarded the honor students.

Baccalaureate services have been set for Sunday, May 26, in the school auditorium.

All five high-ranking students have been active in school and community activities, in addition to their outstanding accomplishments in the classroom.

Miss Trimble has been a member of the National Honor Society for the past three years, serving as vice president this year; secretary of the Student Council this year, has

participated in basketball four years and was an honorable mention at forward her junior year.

She was Bull Town Days Queen in 1972, FFA Sweetheart her sophomore year, received the Betty Crocker Homemaking Award this year, and served as first vice president of the Bovina FHA chapter. She has been a member of the Mustang Band five years, a cheerleader three years and was a candidate for Football and Basketball Queens. Miss Trimble plans to attend West Texas State University in Canyon where she will study to be a medical lab technician.

Miss Rhodes has also been a member of the National Honor Society for three years and served as secretary this year. A member of the Bovina FHA four years, she served as president this year. She has been a member of the band five years, cheerleader three years and was a candidate for Football Queen and Band Sweetheart this year.

She is vice president of the Student Council and was named Miss BHS earlier in the school term. Miss Rhodes plans to attend Lubbock Christian College, majoring in elementary education.

Miss Willard has been a member of the NHS three years, the band five years, a cheerleader four years, FHA three years and active in basketball and track four years.

She was head cheerleader this year, a candidate for Basketball Queen and FFA Sweetheart. Miss Willard plans to attend West Texas State University, studying computer science.

Miss Corn has also been a member of NHS and Student Council three years. She served as president of the council her

junior year, was Girls' State delegate in 1973, was chosen Basketball Queen this year, was named Best Actress in District 3-A this year and has competed in regional literary events the past two years.

A member of the Filly basketball team four years, she received honorable mention as guard her sophomore year, all-district honors her junior and senior years as guard and forward, respectively, and was a Football Queen candidate three years. She plans to attend WTSU, majoring in physical education with a minor in speech.

Sherrill is president of the NHS, of which he has been a member three years, and vice president of the senior class. He has played football four years,

A total of 275 voters in Bovina went to the Democratic Primary polls Saturday, among 1928 in the county, and elected Paul Fortenberry county judge in one of the two county-wide contested races on the ballot.

In his bid for election to the

post, Fortenberry carried five of the eight boxes in Parmer County, defeating Archie Tarter—who was seeking his second consecutive term as county judge—by a county vote of 1107 to 789. Bovina went for Fortenberry, 154 to 116.

The former grain elevator manager was given a landslide lead in his home box at Friona, 650-52. He also carried Black, 42-4; Lakeview, 28-5; Rhea, 31-17; and the absentee box, 56-40.

Tarter, who was a convincing winner four years ago in his race against W.L. Edelman, carried the Farwell, Oklahoma Lane and Lazbuddie boxes.

He was given a large percentage of votes at Farwell, 259-28; carried Oklahoma Lane, 76-28; and won his home box at Lazbuddie, 128-84.

The race for county treasurer went right down to the wire with Benna Felts, the county-appointed treasurer edging Jenoyce Ford, 958 to 858.

Although the race was close at most boxes, Mrs. Felts carried Black, 22-19; Farwell, 224-158; Lazbuddie, 108-90; Oklahoma Lane, 68-34; Lakeview, 18-13; and the absentee box, 60-31.

Mrs. Ford was given narrow margins at Bovina, 142-124; Friona, 336-321; and Rhea, 35-13.

In the commissioner's race, Precinct 4, Roy M. Miller won that election with 119 votes over incumbent Raymond Treider Jr. with 48 and Pete Jesko with 45.

Miller will now face Jimmy Briggs in November's general election. Briggs was on the Republican ballot.

A total of 1963 ballots were cast in the primaries, some 400 more than in 1970 and '72, but still two per cent less than half of the registered voters in Parmer County.

In the governor's race, Parmer County gave Governor Daryl Briscoe even more

DiCuffa urges parents who have children in those age categories to register them on that day. He will be at his office in Ridgelea School until noon that day.

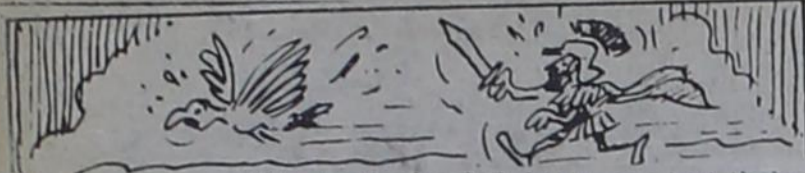

overwhelming support than in '72. This year, over three other candidates, Briscoe tallied 1490 votes for 80 per cent of the total. In '72, he captured 62 per cent of the vote over six other candidates. Winning by a landslide in the state, Briscoe carried each of the county's eight boxes.

The other major item of interest on the ballot, the pari-mutuel wagering referendum, failed to pass in Parmer County by a county vote of 451 for and 1125 against.

Parmer County voters gave overwhelming support to Representative Bill Clayton, seeking his seventh term in the Texas House, with 1555 votes. Harvey Floyd of Vega received 226. Bovina went for Clayton, 220-39.

All other county officials, whose terms expired this year, ran unopposed, including Dorothy Quickel, district clerk; Bonnie Warren, county clerk; C.H. Jefferson, county commissioner, Precinct 2; Ray Mears, justice of the peace, Precinct 1; Frances Euler, justice of the peace, Precinct 2; Wilbur Charles, justice of the peace, Precinct 3; Hollis Horton, Democratic county chairman; Ethel Bengler, chairman, Precinct 1; Bessie Holt, chairman, Precinct 2; Johnnie Horn, chairman, Precinct 3; Albert Smith, chairman, Precinct 4; Wyle Bullock, chairman, Precinct 5; Wendol Christian, chairman, Precinct 6; Raymond Schueler, chairman, Precinct 7; and Otho Whitefield, chairman, Precinct 8.

Republicans in the county voted at four boxes—Bovina, Farwell, Friona and Lazbuddie.

They favored Jim Granberry of Lubbock as their gubernatorial candidate over Odell McBrayer, 30 to four. Gaylord Marshall received 28 votes to four for Troy Skates as the candidate for lieutenant governor. A total of 34 votes were cast in the county Republican Primary. None of the three referendum votes were carried on the Republican ballot here.

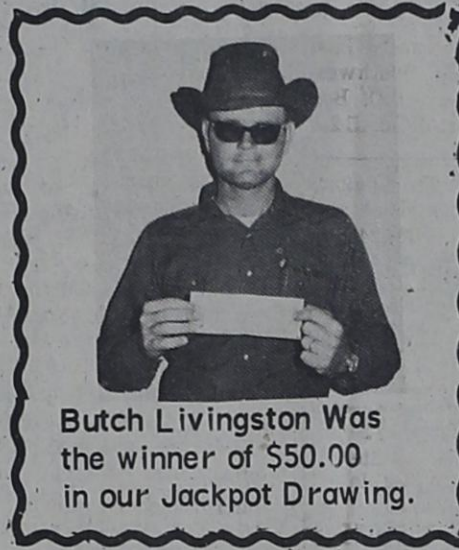
The excellent crop year enjoyed by farmers, coupled with record farm prices, were given credit for the sizeable increase in deposits.

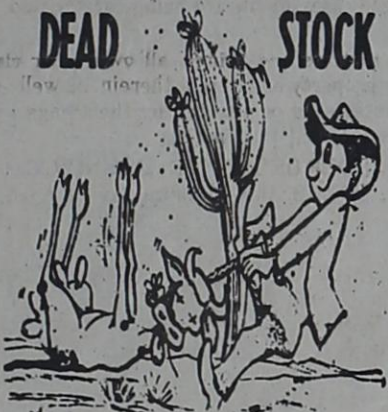

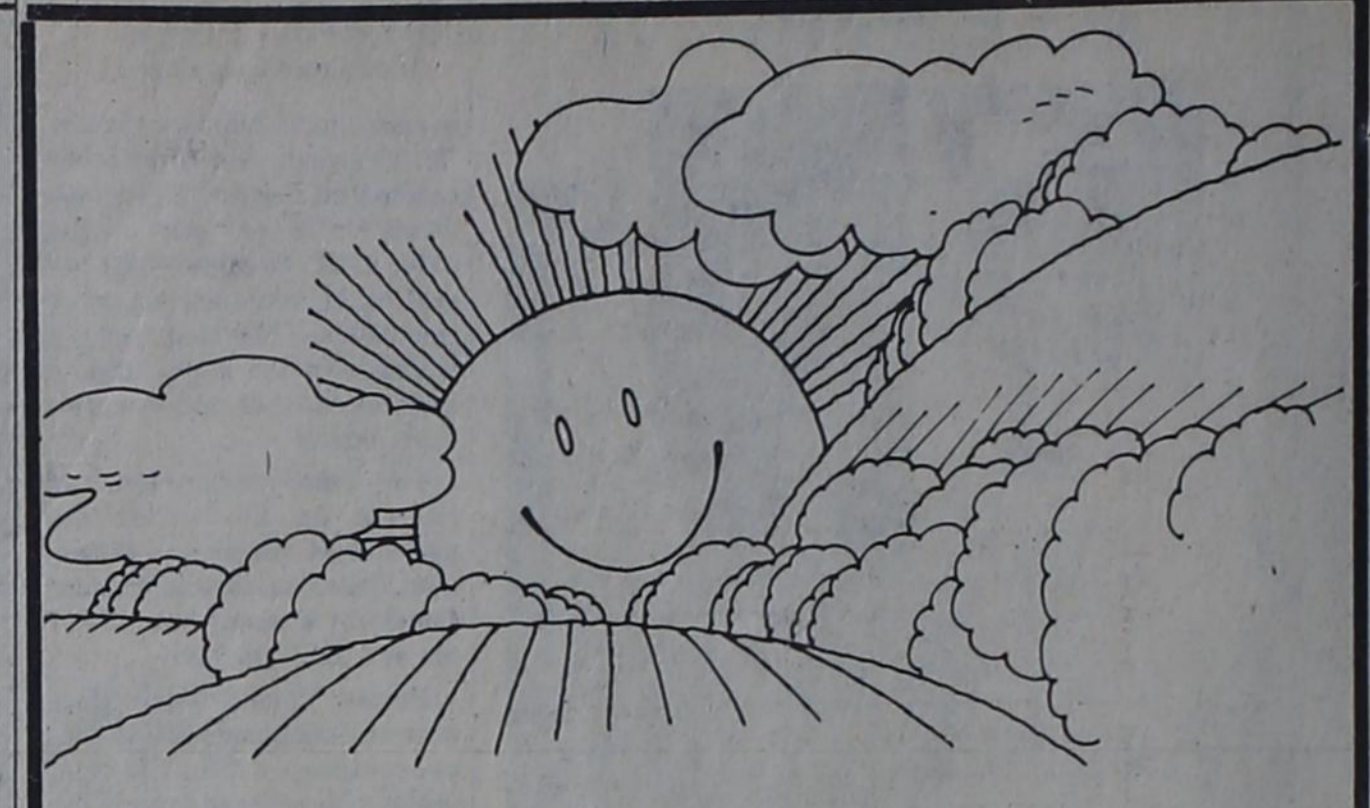

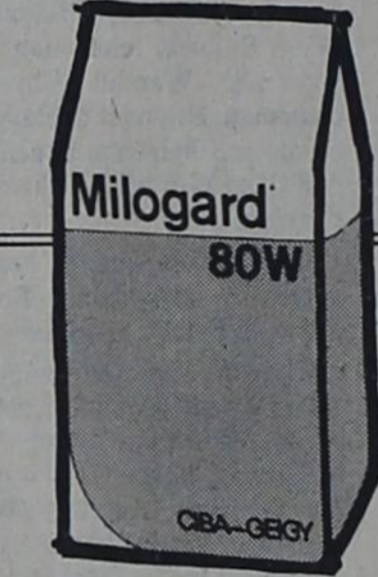
