

at Farwell and were each fined \$125 plus court costs. **** A two car collision about 5:30 p.m. Sunday at the intersection


of Third Street and Avenue E resulted in the arrest of Raoul Mendoza of Bovilla.

'FATHER OF YEAR'

Deadline for voting for Bovina's "Father of the Year" is Saturday, reminds Mrs. A.M. Wilson, chairman of the CowBelle-sponsored contest here.

Sponsored by the local organization, the contest is being held here for the second consecutive year in conjunction with a project to promote serving beef on Father's Day, Sunday, June 16.

Local organizations have nominated their choice for the honor and residents of the community are invited to vote for one of the men on the ballot.

Ballots may be mailed to Mrs. Wilson or dropped in a ballot box at Bovina Supermarket or First State Bank of Bovina. A supply of ballots is available at both locations.

This year's "Father of the Year" will receive a roast of beef and a copper bell, fashioned after the CowBelle insignia, and inscribed with his j officiating. name and "1974 Bovina Father of the Year." Nominees for the 1974 honor are Oakley Stevenson, Lions Club; Kenneth Whitecotton, Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture; Leon Ware, Bovina Woman's Study Club; Wilbur Charles, Bovina Jaycees; Edwin Lide, Roping Club; and Vernon Willard, BHS Student Council. "The beef certificates work on the same principle as gift certificates," explained Mrs. Wilson, "and would be an ideal gift for weddings, Father's Day, birthdays, anniversaries, or any other suitable occasion." She emphasized that, although the project was formulated by the CowBelles, the certificates are not a fund raising project for the club. "We make absolutely no money from this; it is just another way of promoting the beef industry," she stated.

SAYS ASCS **Crop Certification Due Before Harvest**

By Prentice Mills County ASCS Director

It is time for growers to certify their wheat, barley, oat and rye acreages under the 1974 farm programs.

Any acreage or small grain that a farmer wants [or needs] to have made a matter of record should be measured and certified before harvest and before any other use is made of the land planted to the crop.

Farmers will sign that they intend to participate in the program(s) at the time they certify their acreages. The question has been asked "Why sign to participate in the 1974 farm programs?"

1. It behooves farmers to protect their farm's allotments. They do this by measuring their acreages and reporting them to their ASCS Office during the signup period.

2. A farmer who signs to participate in the programs has automatic insurance coverage on the crops planted on the farm. He will probably receive some benefits in the event that the farm's 1974 production is low due to adverse weather, insects, or other circumstances beyond the farmer's control. 3. A participating farm is eligible for a deficiency payment should such payments be triggered by a low market price. Certainly, it is hoped that the market will never go that low: however, no one can

One other thing, not mentioned above, is that the wheat, feed grains, cotton, sovbeans and other price supported crops produced on a participating farm are eligible for price support through the loan program. This loan program is sometimes a useful

the feed grain or cotton program at any time prior to July 15. July 15 is the final date for enrolling a farm in the feed grain and cotton programs.

What does it take for a farm to be eligible for all program benefits? Farmers must plant a total acreage of crops for harvest equal to the total allotments for their farm or the farm will lose allotments for 1975; however, if a farmer doesn't have enough crops planted to protect the farm's allotments, he may waive deficiency payments on one or more of the crops and protect the farm's allotments for 1975. This applies even if there is actually no payment due in 1974.

What it all boils down to is--if a farmer will make a visit to his ASCS Office, there is a way (in all cases) whereby he can protect his farm's allotments. All wheat, feed grains and cotton growers who have not already done so, are urged to call at their ASCS Office at their earliest convenience.


Rodeo Slated This Weekend

"The increasing costs of lighting and watering the ballpark and the inability to keep the field in playing shape for the regularly scheduled games has necessitated this action," said Stevenson.


The list of rules for the ballpark is as follows: 1. No practice sessions will be allowed on the playing field unless other playing fields cannot be obtained;
