BILL CLAYTON, our state representative, having took time out to run a local race and be re-elected to a four-year term to the Texas House of Representatives, is now back to his race for speaker of the Texas House.

An article in the San Antonio Express recently said "One of the most intense, longest and gut-fighting political races of the year is going on right now, here and all over the state, and you don't have a thing to say about the outcome."

The article went on to explain that only House members in the 64th Legislature will be able to vote for the new speaker, limiting the eventual number of "voters" to 150. But the number of voters has been the only limit so far.

The race has been on for over a year—since last January, to be exact.

Clayton has told us that the speaker's race is just like waging a state-wide campaign. "Representatives from all parts of the state want you to visit their area, to get acquainted with their leaders. It's quite a race," the Springlake legislator told us recently.

A couple of the candidates have been waging a heated and mud-slinging battle. But so far, Clayton has stayed out of the mud-slinging. And he seems to be one of the front-runners.

One of the surprises to us was that Rep. R.B. "Mac" McAlister, the former Clovis radio man now of Lubbock, also is a speaker candidate. The presence of McAlister in the race might hurt Clayton somewhat, making two candidates from this section of the state.

McAlister only entered the race in the past couple of weeks, which makes you wonder if he really is a serious candidate, or if perhaps one of Clayton's opponents put him up to it to divide up this area's support.

It will be interesting to see the speaker's race develop. Sure wish we had a vote.

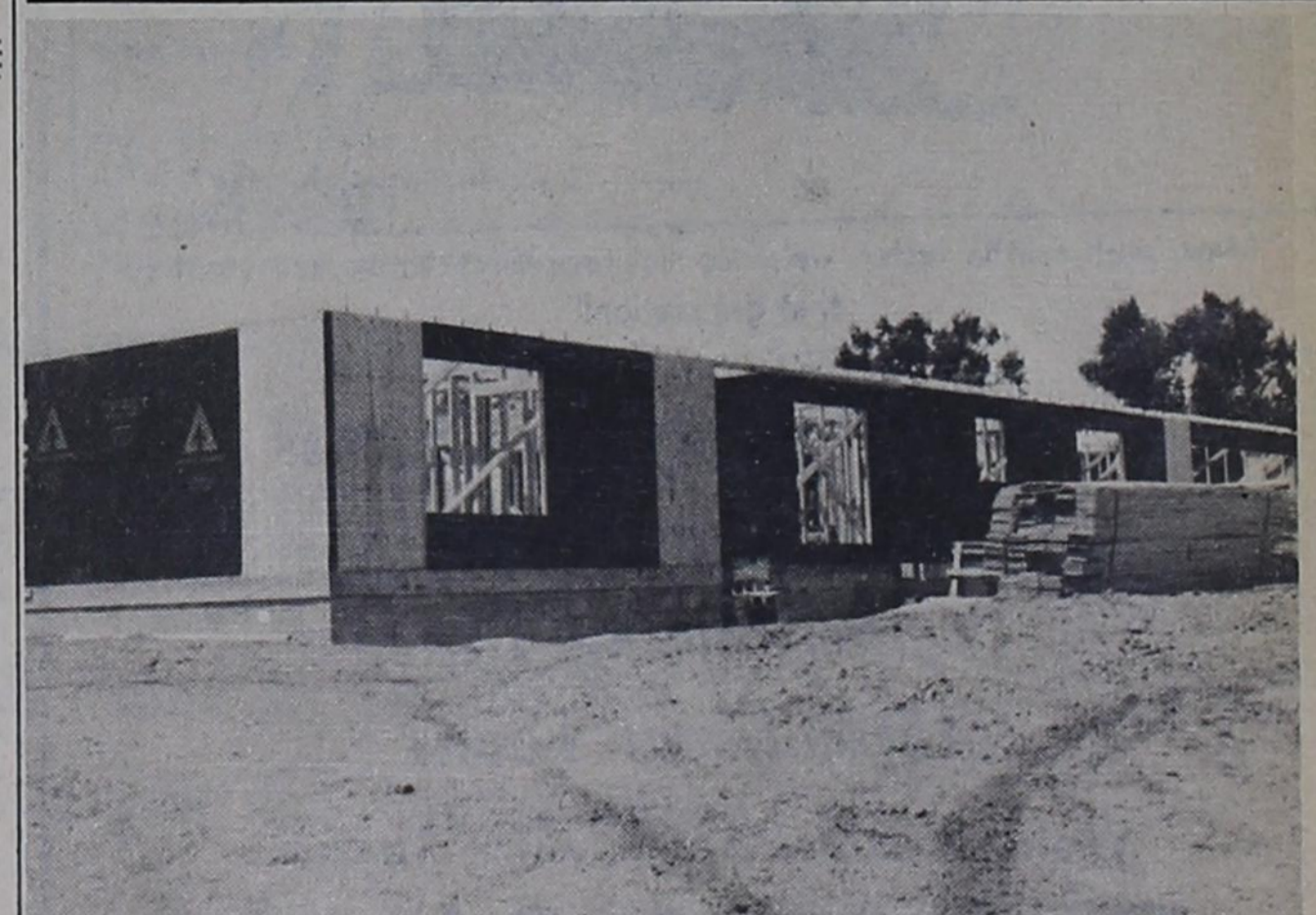
"God's People Today" is theme of the school, said Rev. Platzer.

FOR CLOVIS DEATH

Garcia Draws Prison Term

Eugene Garcia, 45, of Bovina was sentenced last week in Ninth District Court in Clovis, N.M., to serve a 10 to 50 year sentence in the New Mexico state penitentiary for second degree murder and drew two two-to-10 year sentences for aggravated battery.

Garcia, represented by public defender Les Williams, had pleaded guilty recently to a second degree murder charge, reduced from first degree murder. He was charged in the Oct. 6, 1973, shooting death of Julian Rodriguez of Bovina in a bar on West Grand in Clovis. Four other men were injured in incident, however, aggravated battery charges in two of the cases were dismissed.

Accepting a recommendation from the parole and probation office in a presentence report, Judge James Compton ordered that the pair of two-to-10 year sentences run concurrently, but that the major sentence and the others run consecutively.

Garcia received credit for time he has spent in custody since last Oct. 7, thus providing a possible minimum time in confinement of three and a third years under New Mexico's indeterminate sentence system.

Three individuals—jailer Monte Hamilton, assistant jailer Bill Burch and Rev. Melvin Sasse—made brief comments to the court concerning

Garcia's conduct in jail. Hamilton and Burch told the court that Garcia had been a model prisoner and had helped quell disturbances among other prisoners. Sasse said Garcia appeared to be sincere in his religious faith during services in jail.

Detective Lance Somers of the Clovis Police Department read a letter to the court, however, in which he pointed out that Garcia had a record of violent crime. He recommended the maximum sentence.

Garcia told Judge Compton he shot the men because "they had been charged and convicted for a number of crimes beginning with burglary in 1947. Other charges included assault and battery, assault with intent to kill, robbery, other assault cases and an additional burglary charge."

The judge said Garcia's record indicates that his trouble stems from drinking and when he gets into a fight, he "fights to kill."

After pronouncing sentence, Judge Compton urged Garcia to make constructive use of his prison time and "when you get out, don't drink any more liquor."

Road Projects Set In County

The Texas Highway Commission announced last week that a number of projects had been approved and contracts let for construction and improvement of highways in

the South Plains area.

The work is part of a statewide program designed to improve safety and convenience on existing highways and to help prevent possible costly damage to traveling surfaces during the winter months.

Projects in Parmer County include US 84 from Seventh Street in Farwell southeastward to the Bailey County line, additional base and surfacing; and the construction of a bridge and approach on Farm to Market Road 1731 at Catfish Draw, 0.5 mile north of US 60 in Bovina. Estimated cost of the bridge project is \$52,000.

In a contract let in May to Boswell and Crafton, Inc., and Austin Bridge Co., grading, structures, flexible base, one and three course surface treatment, seal coat and grade separations will begin on State Highway 214 from the Bailey County line to Friona (Junction Spur 270) and from 0.2 mile south of the Parmer County line to the Parmer County line.

Low bid on the project, which will require an estimated 350 working days, was \$3,703,589.67. The project will be under Highway Department Engineer Rhea E. Bradley of Littlefield, and supervised by District Engineer George C. Wall Jr.

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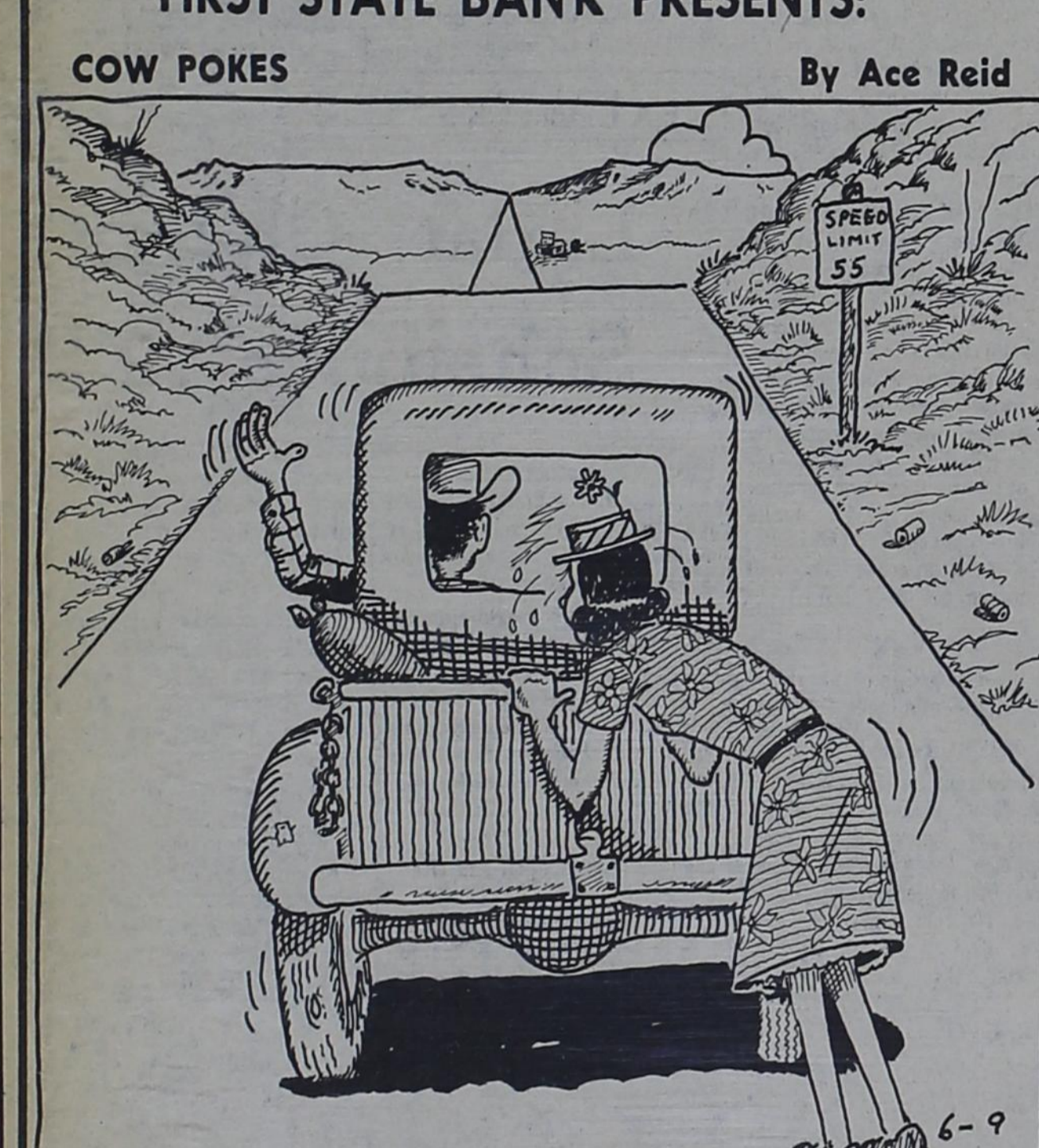

SAYS ASCS

Crop Certification Due Before Harvest

It is time for growers to certify their wheat, barley, oat and rye acreages under the 1974 farm programs.

Any acreage or small grain that a farmer wants (or needs) to have made a matter of record should be measured and certified before harvest and before any other use is made of the land planted to the crop.

Farmers will sign that they intend to participate in the program(s) at the time they certify their acreages. The question has been asked "Why sign to participate in the 1974 farm programs?"

There are at least three

reasons which are (or can be) important.

1. It behooves farmers to protect their farm's allotments. They do this by measuring their acreages and reporting them to their ASCS Office during the sign-up period.

2. A farmer who signs to participate in the programs has automatic insurance coverage on the crops planted on the farm. He will probably receive some benefits in the event that the farm's 1974 production is low due to adverse weather, insects, or other circumstances beyond the farmer's control.

3. A participating farm is eligible for a deficiency payment should such payments be triggered by a low market price. Certainly, it is hoped that the market will never go that low; however, no one can

predict what might happen in the coming marketing year.

One other thing, not mentioned above, is that the wheat, feed grains, cotton, soybeans and other price supported crops produced on a participating farm are eligible for price support through the loan program. This loan program is sometimes a useful measuring tool.

If a farmer has a disaster strike his crop, he should contact the ASCS Office and report the situation before doing anything to the land where the crop is planted. He should know (by carefully measuring) the acreages involved before contacting the ASCS Office.

There have been approximately 600 farms signed up to participate in Farmer County up to this date. This leaves about 700 of the county's 1300 farms to be signed up before wheat harvest. Of course, a farm that has no wheat allotment (and no small grains for harvest) can be signed up in

the feed grain or cotton program at any time prior to July 15. July 15 is the final date for enrolling a farm in the feed grain and cotton programs.

What does it take for a farm to be eligible for all program benefits? Farmers must plant a total acreage of crops for harvest equal to the total allotments for their farm or the farm will lose allotments for 1975; however, if a farmer doesn't have enough crops planted to protect the farm's allotments, he may waive deficiency payments on one or more of the crops and protect the farm's allotments for 1975. This applies even if there is actually no payment due in 1974.

What it all boils down to is—if a farmer will make a visit to his ASCS Office, there is a way (in all cases) whereby he can protect his farm's allotments. All wheat, feed grains and cotton growers who have not already done so, are urged to call at their ASCS Office at their earliest convenience.

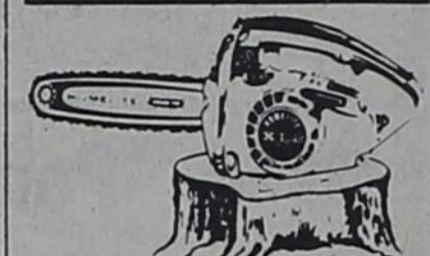

Ballpark Rules Set By Lions

A list of regulations concerning the use of the baseball park in Bovina has been adopted by the Bovina Lions Club, according to Oakley Stevenson, commissioner of the Lions-sponsored Little League program.
