hinder the oil operations in both Eddy and Lea counties. Some leases located on lateral roads have been isolated for the past ten days. Principal activity has been centered in the west edge of the Hobbs field, where two wells have been recently drilled in

awaiting a proration test. A completion has been made in the State No. 26 of the Midwest Refining Co., 660 feet from the south and east lines sec. 33-18-38 and in the A-33, State No. 5, of the Continental Oil Co., sec. 33-18-38. Tubing has been set in the State 26 of the Midwest at 4,165 and a proration test may be given the well today. Little is known as to the possibilities of either well until an official test has been made.

A recent completion of the A 33, State No. 4 Continental Oil Co., sec. 33-18-38, has been somewhat of a disappointment after drilling fourteen feet deeper to a total depth of 4,154 fee. It is understood that the State No. 4 made 3,499 barrels on a proration test with 65,000,000 feet of gas. This test was estimated good for 6,000 barrels of oil with 138,000,-000 feet of gas.

Another well of the Midwest Refining Co., the No. 8, Byers, sec. 3-19-38, which will soon be completed is now drilling below 3,912 feet.

The contest for direct federal appropriations for unemployment

relief, likely to be one of the bit-terest of the season, was opened by Mr. Hoover's political oppo-

Senator Watson, of Indiana, re publican leader, introduced a bill to carry out the president's recnendation for creation of a system of home loan banks; Senator Steiwer of Oregon sponsored his loan plan for refinancing land banks and Senator Walcott, of Connecticut, his proposal for setting up a reconstruction finance

Senator Norris of Nebraska, the republican independent leader, also introduced a bill to authorize a bond issue of \$3,000,000,000 for road construction as a relief

The administration bills were along the lines outlined by the president in his message to con-

The LaFollette and Costigan bills were similar in that each proposed to disburse federal funds thru the states

Costigan's bill would appropriate \$125,000,000 for the current fiscal year and \$250,000,000 for the next fiscal year ending June


