With the ground covered with more than thirty inches of snow and a greater depth at various points it has been necessary to feed these turkeys and as a result more than 1000 pounds of feed had been put out in James canyon while feeding parties have gone to Cox and Silver Spring

Mr. Stevenson said that these turkeys, known as the wildest of all game birds, were so hungry that they would go for the feed with men of the feeding party still in sight.


