Employed for a while in the bank as assistant cashier, later, Mr. VanArsdol became accountant at the Pecos Valley Alfalfa Mill, holding this position until



In 1919, he was married to Cora Haskins, of Logan, Iowa, who was his companion until the time of his passing.



WASHINGTON, D. C .- Treasury reconsideration on taxes and the decision that it had been wrong in a good many instances put \$69,476,930 in refunds back into taypayers pocketbooks in the 1931 fiscal year ending June 30.

Secretary Mellon reported Monday to congress that the sum in-cluded all taxes illegally collected and returned but he did not list credits and abatements. The latter are deducted from taxes assessed but not yet paid. Refunds are actual cash payments. The year before refunds totaled \$126,836,333, abatements \$176,-398,377 and credits \$36,535,245. Only two separate refunds were for more than \$1,000,000, in which

class there were twelve a year earlier. The Illinois Central railroad got \$1,158,675; the Prairie Pipe Line Company of Independence, Kansas, \$1,784,494.






