100,000 VETERANS ARE BENEFITED BY ORDER

One hundred thousand World War veterans are favorably affected by the enactment of the amendment to extend the fiveyear term government life insurance, according to advice received from national headquarters of the American Legion.

The information quotes the Legion's national rehabilitation committee as saying that while the amendment does not provide for those veterans who converted their five-year term policies prior to the date of the amendment, an interpretation of the law has just been made which might benefit some of them. This interpretation is that the veteran who converted only part of his insurance, dropping some because of the higher rate necessary to conversion, can now go back and renew that lapsed portion of his old five-year term insurance for another five years.

The amendment approved June 24 provides for the renewal of a five year term level premium policy for a second five-year period at the premium rate for the attained age without medical examination.

Many veterans, formerly carrying \$10,00 policies under the five year term, reduced their insurance to \$5,000 because of the higher rate. Now such \$5,000 insurance that was dropped can be renewed for another five years at a slightly higher rate than formerly, due to the advancement in age.

DIABETES

We do not know how to prevent people from getting diabetes. And yet there were thirty-two deaths reported as due to diabetes in New Mexico in 1931. How could these thirty-two lives have been saved?

In the first place it is important to find out that a person has diabetes so that proper treatments may be given. Many people have diabetes without knowing it. that he has diabetes he should study the disease and learn how to live in spite of it, what he may eat and how much insulin he must take. It comes when patients overeat or break their diet or neglect taking their insulin. "Coma comes on slyly," says Professor Joslin of Harvard University. "Therefore if you are diabetic and feel sick you should always (1) call the doctor (2) go to bed (3) drink a cupful of hot liquid every hour (4) get someone to take care of you (5) keep warm and (6) move the bowels with an enema." Be sure to begin by calling the doc-

Another danger is gangrene. A clean diabetic rarely contracts gangrene. Dr. Joslin teaches his patients to keep their feet as clean as their faces.

Although I cannot tell you for certain how you may avoid getting diabetes I can say that you are much more likely to get diabetes if you eat too much and exercise too little. Diabetes is especially a disease of high and lazy livers. Watch your weight.
