

THE GENERAL ELECTION is getting closer all the time, and so far there has not been a great deal of activity, although some shots are beginning to be heard on the state

Gubernatorial candidates John Hill and Bill Clements have agreed to stage a debate on television just prior to the election, and from what we understand, Channel 7 in Amarillo will carry the debate for this area's benefit.

Then, Monday's news carried the details of a charge levelled by Krueger, John Tower's opponent. The charge was serious enough to cause Tower to break his previous agreement to appear with Krueger in a debate.

And in the 18th Congressional District, the Kent Hance camp charged George Bush with attempting to "buy" the election, and pointed out that a big part of his campaign contributions have come from outside the area.

State representative and House Speaker Bill Clayton made a campaign speech on Hance's behalf Monday in Lubbock. A little earlier, former congressman and present state representative Bob Price made a campaign swing with Bush, including a stop in Parmer County.

Those are the main races to be considered by voters on November 7, and of course voters in the Bovina and Rhea precinct will be electing a commissioner for a four-year term. As you would expect, the candidates for commissioner, Jack

Patterson and Vernon Estes, have conducted a very low-key campaign. In addition to the races, voters will also be asked to vote on a slate of proposed constitutional

amendments, including a "watered down" version of proposition 13 which has to do with state taxes. It would behoove voters to make an effort to familiarize themselves

with these amendments between now and election time, and we will make an attempt to study them and interpret them to the best of our ability.

Amendments to the state constitution are always submitted in so large a package that many times some of the proposals do not get much of a hearing-even those which should otherwise be given a lot of consideration. Usually one or two of the amendments gains enough support on a statewide level that they get the attention of at least a majority of the voters.

But on the others--the fate of the proposed constitutional amendments depends most times on the whims of voters who do not even know the nature of the proposals. And in most instances, voters will vote against a change if they do not understand it--and this is probably a good rule of thumb, rather than to vote blindly for a change.

++++ CONGRESS ADJOURNED last weekend, with its usual barrage of last-minute legislation. There has not been sufficient time as yet to examine the last-minute bills which were passed, so that judgment can be made, one way or the other.

Texans were concerned over the energy legislation, as one proposal would have enabled residents of the north and east to buy our gas and oil at a price ceiling, while our own state residents would have no price guarantee.

We don't know how this portion of the bill fared, but like most Texans, we were hoping they would leave our oil and gas alone.

The bad part about last-minute legislation is the fact that often-times, some bad bills are passed when congress doesn't take the time to properly consider the legislation, but votes something through so they can adjourn and go home.

Hundreds of visitors relived the past at the ninth annual Ranch Day at the Ranching Heritage Center, as they watched "pioneers" at their daily chores and occasionally even participating.

Jim S. Kassahn was elected president of the Ranching Heritage Assn., host for Ranch Day at the center, a 12-acre outdoor living exhibit of a score of authentic structures depicting the history of ranching in the American West. The center is located at The Museum of Texas Tech University, Lubbock.

Members of the Ft. Griffin Fandangle entertained guests after a barbecue, and Wray Finney, seventh generation cattleman and former president of the American National Cattlemen's Assn., reminded visitors that "a heritage doesn't happen by accident."

Kassahn is a cattle feeder and rancher who lives in Lubbock. He succeeds Claude Denham as president. He is a director of the First State Bank of Bovina and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Kassahn. Elected to serve with Kassahn

Jim Humphreys, manager of the Pitchfork Ranch, was re-elected chairperson of the association's Board of Overseers. Watt Matthews of the Lambshead Ranch is honorary board chairperson.

Ambulance Service Tops City Agenda

The Bovina City Council met in a marathon five-hour session last Thursday night, October 12. The major item of business before the City Fathers was the establishment of the Bovina Ambulance Service.

The City Council unanimously approved the Ambulance Service's charter and an ordinance establishing the Service as a volunteer agency of the City.

The Council also adopted a unanimous resolution requesting that the Parmer County Commissioner's Court finance a \$3000 grant to the Bovina Ambulance Service for paging and medical radio equip-

The Council also passed a unanimous resolution commending the members of the Ambulance Service for their efforts and proclaimed October 29 thru November 4 as Bovina Ambulance Service

Dick Richards, president of the Ambulance Service, thanked the Council for its support. He reported that full time service will begin on November 1. Richards also reported that the Ambulance Service will host an open house the afternoon of Sunday, October 29, at the Bovina Supermarket with the Panhandle E.M.S. helicopter participating.

The Council also unanimously approved a resolution asking for a grant from the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife for "Phase I" in the new city park located by the highway department building.

Jane Kassahn and Kenneth Cary appeared on the behalf of the park committee and explained that the grant would be for \$18,000 and would be matched by \$6000 in local labor and materials and \$12,000 in local

cash donations. When completed, Phase I will consist of a paved road, paved parking, a complete water line system, "tot park," landscaping, grills and picnic tables.

In other business, John Vaughn was approved by the City Council as deputy marshal. Vaughn is a native of Amarillo and has been employed three years in private security work. He is a recent graduate of the Panhandle Regional Law Enforcement Academy, and is married. He will work under a C.E.T.A. program for one year.

The City Council also approved a request by Texas A&M University to allow City Manager Clayton Williamson to be their guest lecturer for two days in November with A&M paying all expenses. Williamson will also attend the Regional Water Short School in November.

Local Ambulance To Kick Off November 1

At the regular meeting of the City Alderman last Thursday night, the Bovina Ambulance Service received its official charter with operations due to begin the first of November. Currently members of the service are contacting local businesses for help in obtaining additional equipment to make the ambulance fully ready for service.

In the Emergency Care Attendants school which was recently held here to train members of the ambulance service, fifteen local people and five nurses from Dimmitt received state certification. The class, whose average grade on the written part of the test was 89.5, was highly praised by representatives of the State Department of Health, Division of Emergency Medical Services, for their dedication in attending, studying and practicing in order to do so well on the testing.

Johnston and Dale Gunnels. Of this number, all except Norma Whitten and O.B. Johnston plan to work with the service with Mike Dixon and Geneva Johnston being associate members.

Persons already trained who will also be a part of the Ambulance Service include Dick and Mary Richards, full time, and Weldon Moody and Scott Richards, asso-

Officers of the ambulance service who were elected at a training session last week include Dick Richards, president; Don Spring, vice president; and board members Ralph Ramon, Donna Mitchell and Mary Richards. These persons will serve for the remainder of this year and the next year.

Although the ambulance service will not officially begin until November 1, several runs have already been made including service at local high school varsity and junior varsity and junior high football games. While not as completely stocked yet as members would like, the ambulance has received the approval of the state and can be used at the present time

To officially inaugurate the service a commissioning ceremony has been scheduled for Sunday, October 29. At that time the air ambulance from Amarillo will be

here for all citizens to view and services available will be explained to those who come out. According to ambulance service personnel, ev-

eryone in town is invited to come out and see the ambulance, the helicopter and the equipment which will be available to Bovina citizens.
